ARRIVAL OF THE ENGLISH MAIL.

ARRIVAL OF THE EXPEDITIONARY FORCES
OFF SEBASTOPOL.

VENICE. Wednesday.—The combined fleet, which has left Varna on the 1st, had appeared off Sebastopol on the 10th. A flotilla of transports, transports, and steamers of all sizes, covered the sea in the vicinity of Balaklava.

A letter from Odessa says that at Sebastopol the intention is to resist vigorously. Forts are being built to protect the coast at a distance of four leagues from Sebastopol. A mass of fire-ships are being prepared to be sent against the vessels of the enemy. In addition to the usual garrison at Sebastopol, there are 60,000 men in the camp established near the town, and reinforcements are constantly arriving. The Russian fleet is armed, and it appears will not remain inactive during the operations. The best pilots are distributed among the vessels. Prince Menschikoff directs in person the measures of defence.

The allied troops once ashore will immediately begin to entrench themselves and will repel with the bayonet all the assaults of the Russian troops. The landing effected, the possession taken of the heights which command the city. The amount of the Russian forces in the Crimea is unknown. It is possible that their plan will be to retire, ravaging the country as they pass through it, in order to destroy its resources. But the invading force will be provided for, and they will be in a climate which is the best of those regions. The Russian troops having been overcome, Sebastopol will be invested. It is possible that the Russian engineers have constructed formidable entrenchments with redoubts, surrounding and commanding the city. But the Russians having not the command of the sea; and besides there are several points beyond the circuit of Sebastopol, from which both the city and the port are assailable. It appears that the besieging artillery can enfilade the port in a manner that will compel the Russian fleet either to remain to be destroyed, or to go out and fight; and it appears also that the capture of fort Constantine, which is not less probable than the Bomarsund, will promptly terminate the siege. Whether these projects can be more or less rapidly and exactly realised, the general opinion is that the expedition, once commenced, will be prosecuted with vigour and success.

THE EXPEDITION TO THE CRIMEA.

Admiral Niapier is now almost exclusively directed to the Crimean, the great expedition against which had sailed on or about the 5th instant. The army are said to be in the highest spirits, and a few days will probably place us in possession of the Emperor to Prince Albert and the English soldiers and statesmen who accompanied him. But whether the sentiments are literally reported or not, the spirit of them was reflected in the entire proceedings, and the visit of the Prince cannot fail to have a most beneficial effect on the relations of the two countries—enamoured, as it will be, by the return visit of the Emperor, and Empress at no distant day.

Affairs in Spain are not proceeding so satisfactorily as could be wished. The Republican party in Madrid have organised an extensive conspiracy against the throne and monarchical institutions, induced to the step by the inaction of the Government. Queen Christina had entered Portugal, and was about to embark at Oporto for France. The Junta of Seville had, before separating, signed an address to Espartero, protesting against the reactionary policy of his government.

In the province of Malaga, we read that the rights of private property during the recent outbreaks were disregarded, and pretensions equivalent to communism put forward. All this shows an uneasy state of public feeling, with which the Government may not possess the power or the capacity to deal. The conduct of the court has evidently produced deep dissatisfaction in the capital as well as in the provinces, and it is very likely that, before things sink down to quietude, the country will have to pass through a series of very distressing, if not fearful character.

RUSSIAN RETREAT IN ASIA.

TURKEY, Sept. 14.—The mail steamer, which had just arrived from Constantinople, brings word of a sudden and hurried movement on the part of the Russian army corps which was lately operating under Prince Bobutoff against the Turks on the frontier of Georgia. The Ottoman Muechir ordered the advance of eight regiments of cavalry, desiring to draw on an engagement on the open field. The Turks approached nearer and nearer to the Russian camp, until they discovered that it had been abandoned as if in great haste. The Turks found in the enemy's camp ten spiked guns, ammunition, and a large number of wagons, besides mules on the ground. It is ascertained that the enemy has retreated to the shelter of the walls of Gurji. The reason of this strange proceeding is not known, but it is supposed to be the presence of Schamyl with a large force near Tiflis; or it may be that Prince Bobutoff heard that a large hostile force was embarking at Varna for some unknown destination, and fears an attack in Asia.

RETREAT OF THE RUSSIANS FROM MOLDAVIA.

AUSTRIA, Tuesday.—The Russians are quitting Moldavia with all possible speed. It is said that the Turks have entered Bessarabia.

An correspondent writes from Odessa that the English war-steamer Retribution ran right under the guns of the battery, carrying a flag of truce. Word was immediately sent to General Aumakoff. Meanwhile, the attitude taken up by the audacious Retribution excited much interest. The adjutant of the commandant went on a boat and received a letter sent by Admiral Dundas to the governor, requiring the remaining officers of the Tigris. The officers, sixteen in number, were next day forthcoming, and the Retribution having received them over to her greatly to the satisfaction of the people here.

Letters from Constantinople of the 4th state that a steamer bound for Persia had been carried off by the American pirates. A treaty of unity passed

between the two countries.
