LOOKING FOR WIFE FOR BRITISH HEIR

Belfast, Jan. 2—(Toronto Telegram cable)— Full plans of concerted action by the Sinn Feiners were disclosed at a court martial in Dublin yesterday when John Kennan, hotel-keeper at Baltinglass Wicklow was charged with having in his possession a document containing information likely to be of use to the enemy. The plans included the capture of a large number of postoffices, police barracks and places that could be entrenched, destruction of bridges, railway rolling stock, roads over which troops might advance in Wicklow and Wexford.

Details of ammunition supply needed at a commandeering of motor transports and similar requisites were included in the plan.


