## City Council Declines to Hear Hon. Mr. Rollo, Minister Labor, With Reference to the Firemen

### While Wishing to Show No Discourtesy to Him, Pointed Out Council is Quite Able to Transact Its Own Business and Had No Part in Bringing Him to City.

Moved by Ald. Riffer, Ald. Dakers seconded.

That this Council without desiring to be discourteous to the Hon. Mr. Rollo is of opinion that all matters relating to the city fire department are within the sole control of the Council to deal with as may be necessary and it is unnecessary in connection with the settlement of the present matters relating to the department and the employees thereof to invite other authorities or bodies to address the Council, or in any way to take part in the settlement of any questions arising as the Council feels that it can deal with the same satisfactorily to the electors of the city and in their best interests and no purpose will be served by any discussions with outside authorities, and also it may be pointed out to the Hon. Mr. Rollo so he may thoroughly understand the attitude of the Council the inconvenience caused to him in visiting St. Catharines is through no fault of the Council as no suggestions or requests of his presence in the city comes from this Council.

The above resolution was passed by the City Council last night, Aldermen Avery and Murphy voting against it, the Mayor did not vote.

Hon. Mr. Rollo, Minister of Labor, and Frank Greenlaw, M.P.P., were both present on invitation of Ald. Riffer, Chairman of the Fire and Light Committee. Ald. Avery explained that he had consulted Mayor Lovell and Ald. Murphy before extending the invitation to Hon. Mr. Rollo. It was an embarrassing situation that Mr. Rollo felt his position keenly. After the meeting he told the reporters he had not come to address the Council as he knew that would be unparliamentary, but he thought he might do something to straighten out matters in conference with a committee. He supposed when Ald. Avery asked him to come over that was the wish of the City Council. He said the last thing he would think of doing was to interfere in any local affairs.

All the members of the Council were present and when Mayor Lovell called the meeting to order Ald. Riffer, chairman of the Finance Committee read the following report: "Your Finance Committee has had under consideration the question of limitations imposed on the borrowing power of the City in view of the necessary capital expenditures which will have to be met in the near future and having regard to the fact that a special limitation upon capital borrowings was imposed on the City in 1905 under conditions which exist at that time and no longer exist, and that other municipalities are not subject to such limitations under the Municipal Act, and also having due

## Army in Canada Heads Are Conferring About the Work Here.

Com. W. J. Richards, head of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, and Col. John McMillen, chief secretary, are conferring with Commissioner Higgins, chief of staff and second in command of the Salvation Army for the world, arrived in Boston from London recently. Commissioner Higgins is accompanied by Commissioner Lamb, International Secretary.

Commissioner Higgins came to America to discuss matters pertaining to Salvation Army affairs in Canada and the United States with Commander Eva Booth, head of the Salvation Army in the United States, and with the Canadian officials. He was for many years chief secretary of the United States and recently succeeded Commissioner Howard as chief of staff and second in command.

Many matters having an important bearing upon the future policy of the Salvation Army, and its reconstruction work are to be taken up at this meeting, and it is expected on his return Commissioner Richards will have something to say in regards to the questions affecting the policies to be followed in Canada.

## To Solve Exchange

## FAMOUS TALKING MACHINE RECORD ARTISTS COMING

The opportunity to hear personally singers and artists whom one has heard for years only through the medium of "His Master's Voice" records is an experience of a rare kind. Unlike the artists of the opera or concert stage, their appearance before the public is a rarity, for although they have all experience as concert artists, or on the stage, they have become even more famous through their records. There are eight members who compose this concert party, and they will appear in person at the Grand Theatre Tuesday, March 2nd.

They are: Henry Burr, tenor, whose real name is Harry McGlaskey, and was born in Eastern Canada, is possibly one of the best known American tenors. While Burr's name is a household word in every home where there is a talking machine, few people, aside from his personal friends, know him when they see him. Henry Burr has devoted practically all his time to making talking machine records.

The humorous work on the evening's program will be carried by Billy Murray and Monroe Silver, both of whom have been before the public for years, and both of whom have won repeated success. Murray will sing some of the songs which made him famous, such as "You'd be Surprised," and "Wait Till You Get Them Up in the Air, Boys," and Silver, who is probably best known for his "Cohen on the Telephone" stories, will tell several of his Jewish dialect stories and sing some original parodies.

John H. Meyers and Frank Croton, the baritones of the party, have made music a life study, and each sings solos in addition to taking part in the trio and quartet numbers. Rollo is rated by many American critics as one of the best American concert and oratorio baritones. He has sung with much success with the leading choral clubs and oratorio societies of the country, and has also appeared as special soloist with the Chicago, New York, Boston and Philadelphia Symphony orchestras and the New York Philharmonic orchestra.

A feature of the evening will be the banjo selections by Fred Van Eps, his mastery of difficult banjo technique being a revelation to all who hear him. Frank Banta, the youngest member of the party, has a hobby for "jazzing" at the piano, and he has received many flattering press notices, both as an accompanist and a soloist.

An interesting program is being arranged, and will be announced at a later date.

## St. Catharines Policemen Are Given An Increase in Pay; No Policewoman Now

The St. Catharines Police Commissioners at a meeting yesterday afternoon decided to increase the salaries of the members of the city police force. Probationers who now receive \$2.75 a day will get \$3.25; third class men \$3.50 instead of \$3; second class men \$3.75 instead of \$3.25; first class men \$4 instead of \$3.50; sergeants \$4.25 instead of \$4, and the chief will receive \$2,000 instead of \$1,750.

There was a surplus of \$8,000 over from last year and it was decided to ask the City Council for \$14,500 more to get through the year with.

Judge Campbell, the chairman, called attention to the fact that the medical health officer had stated in his report that the cells at police headquarters were in an unsanitary condition. The commission obtained a report from the chief of police who stated that the cells were in a perfectly sanitary condition, and as up-to-date as could be found anywhere.

The commission considered the question of the appointment of a policewoman, but came to the conclusion that owing to the high tax rate in the city and the urgent need for more men on the force, it would not be advisable just now to make such an appointment.

## Three Injured In Collision

G. T. R. Passenger Train Rams Coal Car at Ridgeway, But No One Killed.

RIDGEWAY, Feb. 17.—The Grand Trunk passenger train arriving at one o'clock yesterday collided with a coal car and freight train. The engine, mail coach and smoker were completely demolished.

Tobias Baer of Sherston was the only passenger in the smoker, and escaped uninjured.

John Stewart, a brakeman, sustained a broken leg; Adam Stevenson, a fireman, of Stratford, was badly scalded; John Coningham, of London, conductor, was badly burned. Dr. George R. Stewart, medical officer of health, and Dr. George B. Snider rendered medical assistance.

The wrecking crew of Hamilton came to clear the track. The cause of the collision is unknown.

During the blinding snowstorm of Sunday an engine, westbound, on the Grand Trunk tracks, collided with a freight train near the freight sheds. As a result three cars were burned, one containing furniture, another coal and one caboose.

It was late yesterday morning when through the hard labor of a gang of men the flames were extinguished. No one was injured. Orders from the Ridgeway agent were given to Bridgeburg before the train left, but owing to the severe storm the eng-

## Dutch Diplomat Believed to Be Arranging For Home For Former Kaiser

CALGARY, Feb. 16.—On his way to the Dutch East Indies, ostensibly to become a planter, but in reality, it is believed, to prepare a future home there for the ex-kaiser, Count Uan Taak Krahen, of the Dutch diplomatic service, and a nephew of Count Bentinck, the kaiser's present host in Holland, passed through the city last evening on his way west. The only statement he would make was that he was buying a plantation, but in view of the fact that he was engaged in important missions by the Dutch government during the war, it is believed that he has been sent to buy the kaiser's future home, when Holland decides to exile the ex-ruler, on pressure from the Allies.

JOHN TANSY, BELIEVED TO HAVE RELATIVES HERE DIED SUDDENLY AT FALLS

Chief of Police Greene was notified today that John Tansy, aged sixty-five years, had died of heart disease in the Commercial Hotel at Niagara Falls, N.Y. He was apparently a blacksmith and was of short, stout build with dark complexion. It is believed there are relatives in St. Catharines.

## CITY COUNCIL AS A COMMITTEE WILL MEET THE FIREMEN IN THEIR HALL TO-NIGHT

### Difference of Opinion As to Treatment of Hon. Mr. Rollo, But Consensus of Judgment is That it Was the Only Thing Possible Under the Circumstances.

UNFORTUNATE CIRCUMSTANCE.

The action of the majority of the City Council in carrying a resolution last night not to hear Hon. Walter Rollo, Minister of Labor in the Drury Cabinet, will be interpreted by some, who allow their prejudices to animate their speech, as a discourtesy toward a Minister of the Crown. The admission, however, of Hon. Mr. Rollo himself would dissipate this view. He stated after the Council meeting was over that he had been placed in a wrong position and that he had not come over with the intention of going before the Council to address it. He was led to believe that he was simply coming to sit around a conference board in an informal way.

In writing what it did yesterday the Journal felt certain that the Minister of Labor must have been under a false impression. Crown representatives do not, as a rule, exceed the proprieties that belong to office, and we did not think that Hon. Mr. Rollo would do so. His explanation justifies this opinion. On the other hand the three Labor members of the fire and light committee may have felt that as a majority of that committee they were justified in asking the minister to come. Experience teaches, however, that the greatest tact and diplomacy should always be exercised in such matters.

THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Feb. 17.—Pressure is quite low in Ontario and Quebec and highest in the North Pacific States. Light snow falls have occurred from Saskatchewan to the Maritime provinces. The weather has become very cold again over Lake Superior.

Find James Hill Dead in Sand Pit At Niagara Falls, Ont.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Feb. 17.—James Hill, aged sixty, was found dead in the sand pit at the cemetery yesterday. He had filled a wagon and when the team had gone was left all alone. On the return of Mr. Murray, for whom he was working he was lying dead. Mr. Hill had been a resident of Niagara Falls for 35 years.

## ANOTHER BLOCKADE OF THE MAIN LINE OF THE N. S. & T. R.

The N. S. & T. R. main line is once more blocked between Thorold and Niagara Falls, the snow having drifted into the bag cuts. Workers were once more unable to get to their work on the Hydro canal except by going by Grand Trunk.

## Report in Circulation That The Hydro Commission Will Take Over N. S. & T. at Once

There is a report in circulation in the city today that the Ontario Hydro Commission will take over the Niagara, St. Catharines & Toronto Railway immediately, in fact, that the transaction may take place this week.

There is no confirmation of this report, but the threatened strike of the railwaymen which it is stated is set for Friday next, may hasten action on the part of the Hydro Commission.

If the lines are taken over they will form part of the Hydro-Radial system. W. R. Robertson, superintendent of the Hydro radials and the Hydro officials, have been here recently, so that it is possible there is something in the report.

Certain it is that unless some action is taken the N. S. & T. R. lines will be tied up by a strike, as the men are determined not to accept the award of the conciliation. It is also stated that the National Railway Board which controls the road, is not satisfied either.

During the election, it will be recalled, the present Mayor and one or two other candidates said that they did not approve of "blue rain" talk and that there were ways of getting money if it was wanted. Only six weeks have gone by and we find the Council admitting that what the public was told is the case, and that in the judgment of the new administrative body there must be special legislation secured to allow the city to get what it wants. It is now quite clear that the suggestion of "imaginary difficulties" was ill-founded and that the city is actually in the position that was foretold.

**MR. DRURY'S SUCCESS.**  
 The success of Premier Drury in Halton yesterday is perhaps greater than was expected, but it cannot be said that his defeat was seriously expected by those who follow public events closely. It would be a distinct reversal of good judgment to leave out of the Legislature a man, who however theoretical his policy may be, is an able man, a promising legislator and a gifted speaker, and to put in his stead one who cannot lay claim to these qualifications in a similar degree. What the country needs today is the best men that can be secured for our Legislative and Administrative positions. To fill seats with persons of unknown parts is a doubtful experiment, to say the least, and examples to prove it are not few.

So far as his leadership is concerned, it has not yet been established that Hon. Mr. Drury is a Ross, a Whitney, a Mowatt or a John Sandfield Macdonald, but he has been given a task to perform, and it is but just and fair that he should be also given an opportunity to perform it.

The Journal is among those that do not fully endorse the attitude of Mr. Dewar, who is using all his wiles, and they are not few, for he

is admittedly one of the cleverest men in the Legislature, to embarrass the United Farmers in the transaction of public business. The platforms of the farmers and of the Liberals are not very far apart. If after the session opens the conduct of the Government is such that it merits criticism and caustic analysis it should come with force from an opposition to point out the defects and suggest remedies. In the meantime while the government is getting its legs, let it be given a fighting chance. If the chance is not given it could always be said that petty jealousies defeated the will of the people before there was a privilege extended to show what could or could not be done. If

**NO CLOTHING TO COVER NAKEDNESS**  
 Destitute Jewish Children of Eastern Europe Suffer Terribly From the Cold.

The destitute Jewish children of Eastern Europe are almost entirely without clothing to protect them from the ravages of the winter, according to Samuel Charney, a Jewish writer and critic of Vilna, Poland, who has recently arrived in New York.

It is not a question of their being without shoes, or without underwear, or without any one thing," he reported. "It is a question of their being altogether without clothing to cover their nakedness, and to protect them from the cold. There is almost a total lack of linen, cotton or woollen clothing in Eastern Europe, and what there is sold at a prohibitive price. The rage that the poverty-stricken Jews have worn all through the war are falling from them. The clothing problem is almost a greater issue than the food problem today.

"The help already given by the Joint Distribution Committee of Jewish Funds, the Red Cross, and the Canadian and American Relief Administration is almost nil. It has kept our race alive this long in Eastern Europe. I was an eye-witness to the suffering there and can say that, except for America, they would all be dead now, except a very few. Only America can keep them alive through the winter that confronts them now. There is almost no wood in Poland, even for those who have the money to buy it, and thousands of refugees and families whose homes have been destroyed are living almost on the street. Almost none of them have sufficient clothing.

M. Charney, who was the editor of a Jewish paper in Vilna, came to America with his family by means of a special passport which was secured for him by Samuel Gombay and endorsed by such prominent Jews as Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Oscar Straus, and Nathan Straus. He was thrown into prison in Vilna along with many other prominent Jews of Vilna. Four days later he was released and went with his wife and two small children to Paris, from where he called for America.

**SIX MILLION JEWS HAVE LITTLE FOOD**  
 Heart-Rending Stories of Suffering and Death Come From Eastern Europe.

The cans in which oil was sent to the destitute Jews of Poland are being turned to still another use, according to reports brought back to the Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee by relief workers abroad.

For several months these cans have been serving in a number of light-glass exchange canisters, ranging from chocolate containers to sheet-iron stoves. Now that the epidemic of typhus is such a menace in Poland, where there are 700,000 cases, and throughout Eastern Europe, the old cans serve as portable bath tubs, and Canadian Jewish relief workers and Red Cross nurses are striving to combat the dread disease with cleanliness. All through the stricken lands of Eastern Europe little Jewish children are receiving their daily baths in these old oil cans.

Conservation is whittled to a fine point of necessity in these countries, where 6,000,000 Jews are at the point of starvation, and even the damaged cans are not allowed to go to waste. They are used to patch holes in the roofs and walls of the devastated houses. Cold is as much of a problem as disease in Eastern Europe this winter, since the Jewish population, almost without exception, is clad in rags, and the wretched places in which so many of them live are slight protection against the weather.

**BLACK TYPHUS IS KILLING THOUSANDS**  
 Hundreds Upon Hundreds of Children Become Orphans and Wander Until Overcome by Starvation.


The tragedy of the wandering little orphans of Poland and the sorry efforts of the mothers of that war-stricken country to care for the homeless ones, is an appealing phase of the big heart-breaking story of destitution that relief workers bring back from abroad.

Thousands of youngsters, motherless and fatherless through the ravages of the "black typhus" trudge wearily from village to village over the desolate country seeking what food they can find to keep life in their starving bodies. Sometimes bands of refugees and the little folks and take them in charge. Now and then some almost equally poor peasant gives them shelter and divides his small portion of food. And then, in the course of a day or two, the children take up the tramp again like so many small sables. Once in a while a woman will mother the little travelers and aid them until starvation overtakes them.

Jacob Bashein, who had been in charge of a relief unit for the Joint Distribution Committee, which handles funds collected by the American Jewish Relief Committee and other Jewish fund-raising relief organizations, told of these tragic pilgrimages.

"The Canadian Jewish War Relief Committee is appealing for funds to alleviate this terrible suffering.

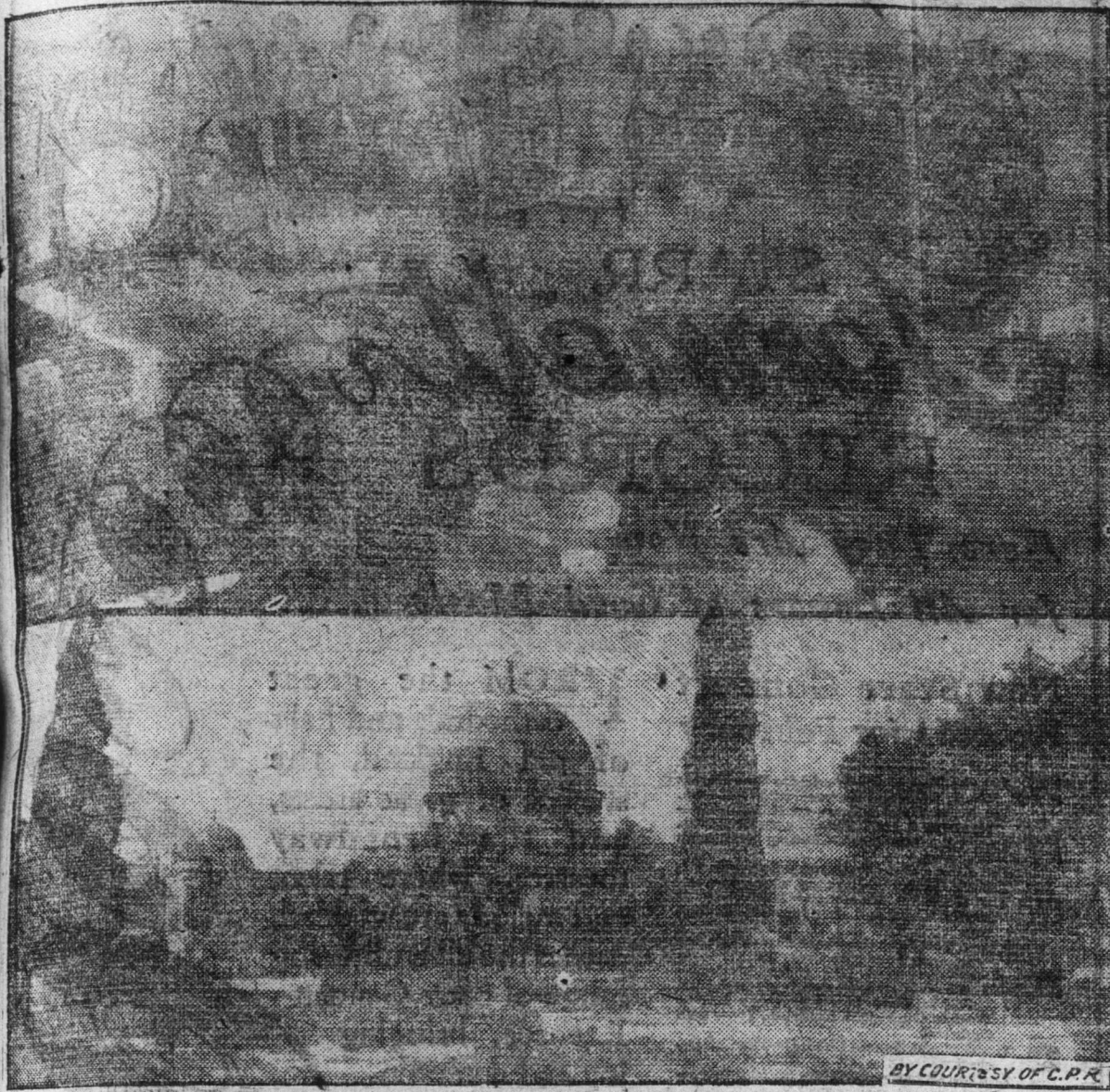

How Officers Are  
Chosen For the  
Commerce Chamber

Methods to be followed in the selection of the officers and directors of the St. Catharines Chamber of Commerce and the plan of control emphasize the democratic nature of the organization whose membership will be next week at 450 or more. The campaign director to-day described these methods.

His first pointed out that "because the corporation which may subscribe to 25 memberships will have only one vote, no more than the smallest store-keeper who may join, it will be apparent that the citizen, if there is such, who regards himself as the most obscure in the Chamber, will have just as much to say about who shall run it as the most influential interest in the community.

"When the election is to be held," he continued, "a primary ballot will be mailed to every member. This

ballot will bear the names of every man and woman of a representative of a firm or corporation which is a member. Assuming that the number of directors is to be 12—the actual number has not yet been fixed—the recipient of each ballot will be asked to so mark it as to place in nomination the 12 individuals who, in his opinion, are the best equipped to be directors.

"When these primary ballots are canvassed, the 24 who are found to have the highest votes will be declared nominees for the 12 places to be filled. The purpose in naming 24 candidates is to offer the members a considerable range of choice.

"The next step will be the sending out of the final ballots, bearing the 24 names, with instructions to the members to vote for 12 and the 12 receiving the highest votes will be declared elected.

"Immediately the 12 directors will organize by choosing a president, one or more vice-presidents, a treasurer and a secretary. The usual method is for the directors to elect the president and other officers except the secretary from among their own number. The reason for this is found in the will of the membership in fixing the number of directors. If this is 12, it would obviously be improper to add two, three or four men as officers, giving them the right to vote in board meetings, and thus actually increasing the size of the board beyond that fixed by the members.

"The full democracy of this election system will be apparent when it is added that all ballots will be secretly marked and cast. This system has been tried in the hard school of experience and found to be the most satisfactory method yet devised to secure truly representative management of a Chamber of Commerce. In some Chambers a by-law has been adopted to prevent the re-election of a director for a successive term.

"In addition to a board of directors, a modern Chamber of Commerce has what is called a member's forum. In some respects this is as important as the board of directors, its chairman as important as the president of the Chamber.

"It is a means of direct and quick communication with the entire membership. Its other functions are to keep a check on the progress of work by the committees, to encourage good-fellowship among the members, to initiate movements for the community good; in short, to keep the membership alive and interested."



## City Council Declines to Hear Hon. Mr. Rollo

(Continued from page 1.) would not get anywhere.

Ald. Graves wanted the whole Council made the special committee to deal with the question.

Ald. Murphy said it looked like a one-sided arrangement.

Ald. Avery moved an amendment that the Committee consist of the whole Council. Ald. Murphy seconded.

Ald. Dakers was quite willing to have the whole Council but he wanted the wording the same. This was agreed to and the resolution appointing the whole Council was passed.

Ald. Avery asked that Hon. Mr. Rollo, Minister of Labor, be allowed to address the Council which might be of value to the Council in dealing with the firm's question.

Ald. Riffer and Dakers the coupon brought in their resolution as given at the beginning of this article.

Ald. Avery said he had seen fit to bring in any outside help which might hasten a settlement of the difficulty which had arisen. He had consulted the majority of the Fire and Light Committee.

Ald. Riffer said he opposed outside interference. He thought the City Council big enough to deal with its own business. If it wasn't it had better resign. He understood Ald. Dakers, who is a member of the Fire and Light Committee, had not been consulted.

Ald. Dakers and Ald. Veale both confirmed this. They said they had not been consulted.

Ald. Avery said he had consulted Ald. Murphy and the Mayor, the ex-officio member of the Committee. That represented a majority of the Fire and Light Committee.

Ald. Graves thought there had been too much outside interference already. He thought this had only served to pull the two sides farther apart. He thought the matter had arrived at the time when this question should be settled privately. The more the matter is agitated and taken up in public, the less chance there is to bring about a settlement.

Ald. Dakers wished to know if the Mayor had a vote on a committee and was shown by the rules that he had.

Ald. Dakers said he knew that if he went over to the Legislature and asked to speak on some question, Hon. Mr. Rollo would object to it as he had a perfect right to do. He considered that there had been too much publicity and outside interference in this question. Let the Council settle it itself as it is perfectly capable of doing.

The Mayor said he could see no objections to outside help being brought in. He had agreed with Ald. Avery to ask Mr. Rollo to come to the city.

Ald. Graves said he had no doubt the Council would be glad to discuss the matter in private with Mr. Rollo. He knew the Council meant no discourtesy to the cabinet minister.

Ald. Veale thought private discussion would bring about a settlement sooner than to have further publicity given the question.

Ald. Avery contended that the public had a right to know all that was going on.

Ald. Graves repeated that too much publicity had been given the matter already.

The Mayor wished the mover to withdraw the resolution but Ald. Riffer refused to recede from his stand.

Ald. Avery asked for the yeas and nays. Aldermen Avery and Murphy voted against it.

Then the Council adjourned.

  - (b) A series of luncheons which ultimately become schools of organization, to be held; these luncheons open to non-members. At these luncheons specialists will present the steps, necessary in successful organization management.
  - (c) The speakers to be aided by charts and other methods of graphic presentation. Everything reduced to a common sense basis and hip-horah methods avoided.
  - (d) This definite and methodical way of presenting a sometimes misunderstood field of activity fortifies the optimist with a mass of intelligent arguments and smother the pessimist under a mass of carefully collated facts that leave no ground for just criticism of a real Chamber of Commerce.
3. The development of a program of work.
  - (a) With the completion of the membership and educational campaign, the development of a program of work will be the next step.
  - (b) Each member will be asked to express himself on what he thinks the organization should undertake for the welfare of the city as a whole and for the promotion of his line of work.
  - (c) The expressions thus received will be collated and written into concrete paragraphs, these forming the planks of the program of work.
  - (d) This method brings unity of action in the shortest possible time and enables the officers to reach out intelligently to the individual members for support and help.
4. Installation of committee organization and control.
  - (a) Special instead of standing committees.
  - (b) Careful analysis of work to be done.
  - (c) Definite schedule of action, preparation of needed data, limited committee appropriations, conferences between committees and directors at frequent intervals.
  - (d) Outline of office system.
5. Disbursement sheet and authorization of expenditures.
  - (a) Disbursement sheet and authorization of expenditures.
  - (b) Budget for proper distribution of expenditures.
  - (c) Card index for membership record and for proceedings of the directors and committees.
  - (d) Filing records for industrial, commercial and other information, photographs and data for publicity requirements.

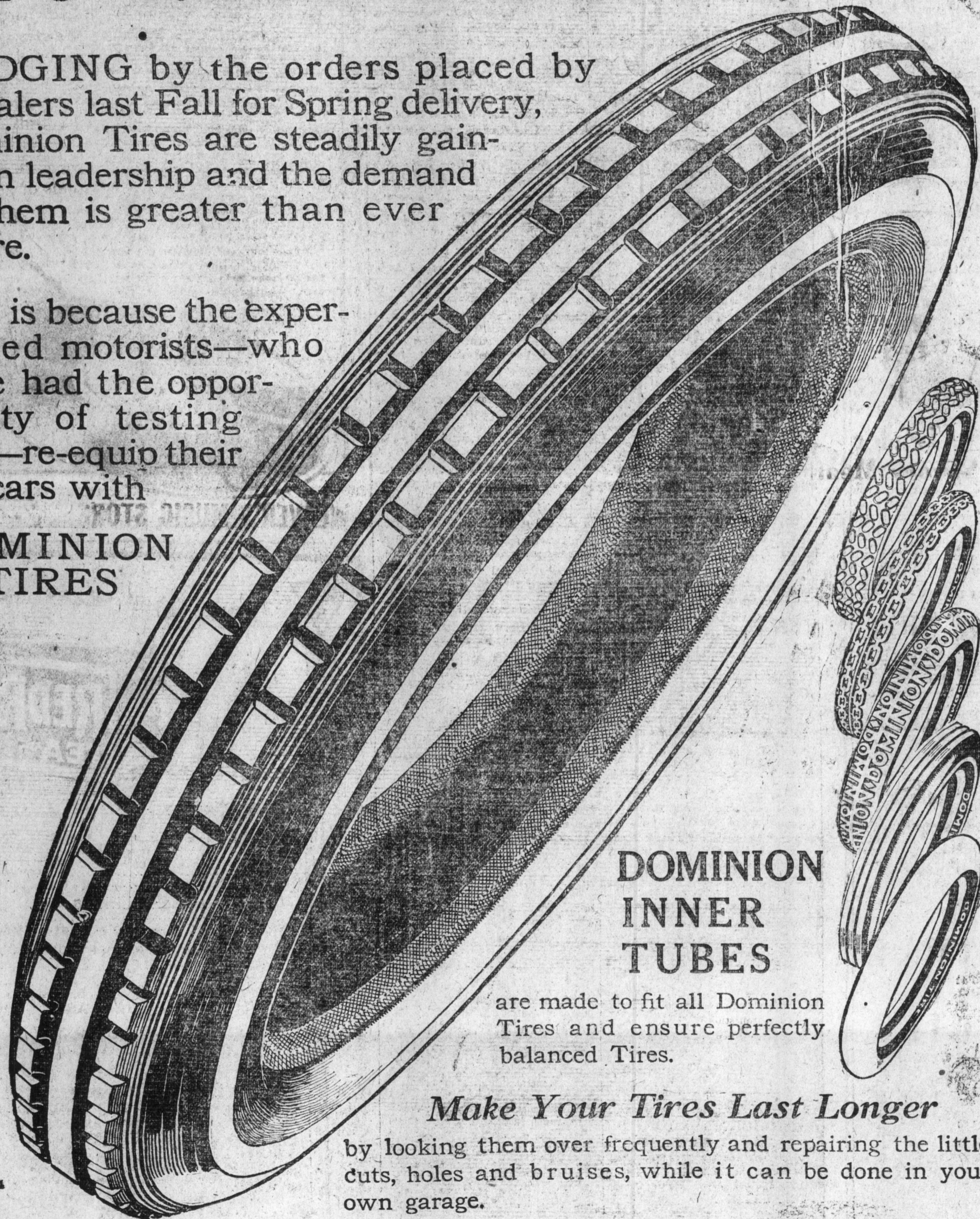
