He read from the reports ments which showed that several bands had received agricultural implements to several times the amount owned by the best farmers, and yet these Indians pro-duced mothing; and Mr. Cameron challenged the Government to give him a committee and he would establish every charge that he had made against them. In fact, the administration of Indian affairs is one of the most scandalous things to be found in the history of any civilized country. In 1880 \$14,524 was aid farm instructors, \$19,867 as farm

The following is from the report of the The following is from the report of the president of the Ontario Agricultural College: In my last report, I alluded to the effect of smoking on young men at college. A very considerable number of our students smoke, and not a few of them are confirmed in the habit. At present I shall not discuss the question, but simply state one or two facts regard-ing the record of smokers and non-amokers in this institution. In 1824 and smokers in this institution. In 1884 and 1885, 58 of our students received departmental honors; and 45 of these were non-smokers. Within the last five years, 67 have taken diplomas, and 48 of them thern have been non-smokers; 14 have won medals, and 12 of them have been non-amekers and non-drinkers.
