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



Biplane Outclassed Carrier Pigeons.

Amiens, France, August 16. -The first aerial race between birds' and man's production took place in the course of the great aerial cross-country competition and was easily won by man.

A flock of forty-seven carrier pigeons, was released at Douai yesterday at the same instant that Leblanc in his Farman biplane started from the mark on his fifty mile flight to

Rushing without a tremor through the calm air, the biplane soon outdistanced the birds, and when Leblanc reached Amiens the flock was not yet in sight, the first pigeon arriving six minutes and twenty seconds after.

Before the last of the flock had come in Legagneux who had started at the same time as Leblanc but consumed nine minutes more on the trip, arrived, beating the last pigeon by twelve minutes.




