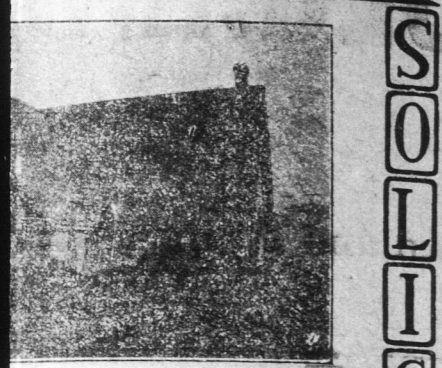

Sidewalk Sketches.

SHAKESPEARE.



WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE whose name will be familiar to a good many of our readers, was a well-known author who flourished in the Elizabethan era. He was the son of a justice of the peace, but he did not mention

it in any of his writings it has never influenced the sale of his books. William was given an early start in literature by being apprenticed to a butcher, from whom he gained much of the language used in his plays. He later became the driver of a bus, which caused the envious-minded of the day to refer to him as a literary back. Thinking of this, he accepted a flattering offer from a leading stock company, taking tickets at the door and doubling as the ghost in "Hamlet." All this time Shakespeare was doing a little desultory writing, amounting to about three reams of foolscap per day. He would go out and do the chores and then come into the house and tear off an ode to somebody. Shakespeare was so full of odes that he never got entirely out of debt until he began to sell his books on the subscription plan. Several days after Shakespeare died it was discovered that as a matter of fact he never wrote anything but I. O. Us and due bill, and that Lord Bacon was the author of everything attributed to him that didn't have to be fumigated before being admitted to the mails. A great many people believed this and immediately took Shakespeare's bust off the parlor mantel and put it in the hired girl's room. Considerable coldness sprang up between Shakespeare and his wife on account of her refusal to accept the presidency of the C. L. S. C., her excuse being that one celebrity in the family was enough, and thereafter whenever Shakespeare went away on a trip his correspondence was confined to souvenir postal cards and night letters telling where to forward his mail. Shakespeare died leaving an immortal memory and an epitaph which is a good sample of reformed spelling.

Solway Returns.

The S. S. Solway returned from Labrador at 9.30 last night. Capt. Parsons was down as far as Cartwright and had a stormy time especially on the return trip. A terrific gale raged from the S. E. on Saturday, the 18th, accompanied the next day with snow which fell to a depth of six to nine inches. On Friday and Saturday last the ship experienced even a worse gale but managed to get into a good harbor till the storm was over. The storm of last Wednesday night was weathered in Carbonear. The ship brought a few packages of freight and two passengers. Capt. Parsons says that it was his hardest experience on the Labrador route. Winter has set in all along the Labrador coast, the ponds and rivers are frozen over—fit to walk on, and the land is covered with snow to the depth of two to four feet from Cape Charles to Cape Percennes. The livers are all well provided for the winter and most of them have gone in the bays furring for the winter.

Storm at Placentia.

From Mr. V. P. Burke who arrived here by last night's train we find that the recent stormy weather did considerable damage both at Placentia proper and around the Bay. At Placentia a stage came down with a crash in Wednesday's gale and smashed up three dories and a punt underneath making kindling wood of them. A schooner owned by Mr. Brace went ashore at Argentea and was badly wrecked. There was a tangle amongst other craft in the roadstead and damage done them. Several others drove from their moorings and only with difficulty were secured. The breakwater was partially swept away. The Argyle while rounding Harbor Buffett Head was hit with a sea which checked her speed as if she had run up against a cliff, and but for the staunchness of the ship she must be badly damaged. Along the Cape Shore-fakes were damaged and boats destroyed. It was the worst period of weather for years in that section.

Broken Pledges.

Yesterday we quoted a written promise signed by Premier Morris to find a means before the spring of 1910 of securing to the sealers their share of the catch, actual or prospective, of any sealing steamer, which should be lost. He averred that this would be a simple matter and he promised that he would have his plan ready for operation in the spring of 1910. Since he made the promise, he has continued in power two years and seven months and has met the Legislature for three sessions, and his simple plan has not yet seen the light of day and is not yet in operation.

He promised also a reduction of taxation.

On March 4th, 1908, Sir Edward Morris in accepting the invitation of Mr. Morrison, Capt. Winsor, Mr. S. D. Blandford and others to lead them, set forth as one of the planks of his policy:

"Reduction of taxation so that it may bear equitably on the fishing and labouring classes."

In his Manifesto of October 3rd, 1908, he repeated the pledge of the spring in these words:

"Reduction of taxation, so that it will bear equitably on the working classes, can be best accomplished by placing on the free list such items as tea, sugar, pork and the other prime necessities on which very high taxes are now imposed."

Then he went on to show how easily it could be accomplished. Over three years have passed, and yet duty is collected to-day at the rate of \$1.50 a barrel on Mess Pork and at \$2.00 a barrel on Loin Pork. Tea is still charged 33 per cent. duty ad valorem; and the duty on sugar varies from 2 to 4 cents per lb. according to class.

This promise was made a third time in the spring of 1909, when Sir Edward Morris was Prime Minister, and yet nothing in these directions has been done in the three sessions of the Legislature which have been held since that time. But a policy of extravagance, givings-out, picnicking,

and creation of new offices for the benefit of followers and supporters has been rampant all this time.

Supreme Court.

(Full Bench Present.)

Whiteway Exors. vs. Government.
The judgment in this suit was delivered this morning by Mr. Justice Emerson. The Exors. of the late Sir William Whiteway claim balance between \$21,228.85 and \$2,560 which was paid to him in his life time.

The claim falls under five heads:

- (1) \$10,000 for services in connection with the suit of the Mtd. Railway Co. vs. the Government. On this claim \$2,500 was paid shortly after the suit. The judge allows an amount which will be found after the taxation of bill of costs by the taxing master, D. M. Browning Esq., K.C.
- (2) \$7,308.53 for commission the sale of Newfoundland Railway, etc. This item is disallowed.
- (3) \$271. Out of pocket expenses. Allowed.
- (4) \$100. Services for appointment of judicial officer. Disallowed.
- (5) Claim of \$3,050 for services in connection with drafting of railway contract of 1891 and 1893, etc. Disallowed.

Judge Emerson held the claim "under heads 2, 4 and 5 were for services for which were included in the duties of the offices the late Sir William Whiteway held and which were paid for by the salary of his offices."

LONDON, To-day.
A remarkable scene was witnessed in the House of Commons last night, when the Government applied the guillotine to 470 amendments in the report stage of the Insurance Bill. Mr. Bonar Law, leader of the Opposition, heatedly accused the Ministers of acting in obedience to the Redmondites, and thus flooring Parliament in order to clear the road for Irish Home Rule. Mr. Lloyd George replied as body that the Government was only following the example set by the Unionist Government. The excitement was intense, and the Government faced the prospect of a division on each amendment. But when the Speaker was putting the first amendment, the entire opposition made a dramatic exit from the Chamber, pursued by derisive ministerial cheering. The Speaker then began formally putting the amendments. When he became fatigued, the Deputy Speaker relieved him and the entire 470 amendments were disposed of. Only in a single case was a division challenged by the Labourites in the Chamber of the Bill; the remaining parts will be guillotined to-day.

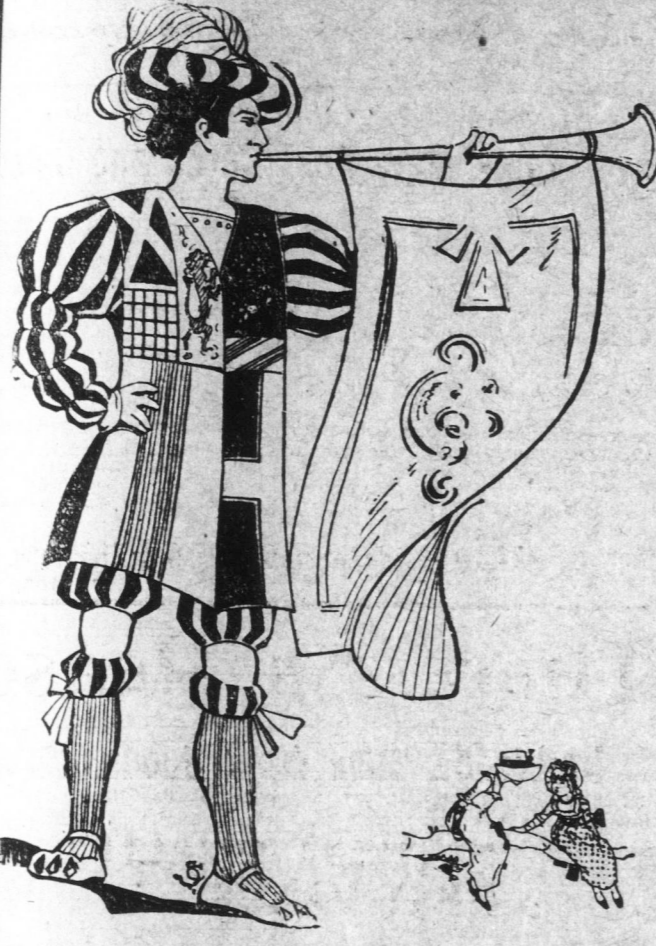

Fatal Drowning Accident.

TWO BROTHERS MEET DEATH TOGETHER.

On Sunday morning, about 8 o'clock, an awful accident occurred here, resulting in the death of two men—brothers Patrick and John Viscount. The younger brother, John, seeing a wild duck in the cove, fired and killed it. Then the two went out in a small boat to secure the bird. When they were returning the sea, boisterous and seething from the dreadful gale of the preceding day, threw their boat on Iron Rock, overturning it and casting the occupants into the water. (The place of the accident was Beachy Cove, lying about one mile west of the entrance to Little Merasheen, and where only the Viscount family lived.) Mrs. Viscount, wife of Patrick, was the sole observer of the accident, and in reply to her husband's call started over the hills to obtain assistance. When the men had gathered round the maddening violence of the sea all along the shore, was compelled to make a long circuit before turning to aid the drowning man. Before she reached the place the poor fellow, exhausted by the heavy seas beating against him and numbed by excessive cold, had slipped his hold of the boat and sank. Efforts were made during the day to recover the bodies—seen frequently in the surf—without success. Early yesterday, the sea having calmed, no difficulty was experienced in securing them. Early Monday news of the sad accident reached St. Kyran's, and at once the pastor, Rev. Fr. Doutey, left for Merasheen to assist at the funeral. Before reading the beautiful service for the dead, the rev. gentleman made a most telling discourse on the necessity of being ever ready to answer to the call of the angel, and referred in affecting terms to the awful occurrence of the previous day. After the prayer were read, the funeral procession wended its way to the cemetery, where silently and mournfully the brothers, so united in life, were laid to rest, side by side in the one grave. The tragedy has cast a gloom over the whole settlement, and the hearts of all have gone out in sympathy with the bereaved widow, orphans and friends. Merasheen, Nov. 26, 1911.

Mr. English Replies to Mr. McGrath.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—My letter of a couple of days ago has elicited from Mr. McGrath the statement that he is not responsible for what appears in his book, or what is equal to such a statement. It is interesting to know this. The book contains nothing original but is merely, in a manner, a collection from official reports, etc. Nobody would ever know this did not Mr. McGrath tell us so in this evening's Chronicle for the author of the words does not quote his authority. He tries to get up over the shoulder of Mr. Howley, but fails utterly. He wants to make Mr. Howley responsible for the assertion that "large areas within its confines are occupied by igneous and eruptive materials evidencing extended volcanic action in the formative periods of its history." What Mr. Howley does say is this: "It has passed through the fire so to speak, and large areas are found to be occupied by igneous, eruptive and igneo aquerous materials, other wise highly metamorphosed, sedimentary, indicating prolonged volcanic action at different periods of its structural history." From this it would seem that the origin of these metamorphic rocks is uncertain. There is nothing to prove that they are altered sediments or plutonic or eruptive. The fact that they are highly metamorphosed does not indicate volcanic action. I do not think that Mr. Howley will differ from me here, I am assured, without fear of successful contradiction that evidence of volcanic action on any great extent, if at all, is not furnished by the rocks of this country. Before taking up any of Mr. McGrath's mistakes, I should like to ask that gentleman if Mr. Howley is his authority for the statement that "the geology of the country is very simple." I am of the opinion that the idea originated in Mr. McGrath's mind, and is altogether disproven by the fact that there are large rock sections in this country that up to date have not been referred to in any definite epoch or era, for that matter, era. We have not to go away from the neighbourhood of this town to find proof of this. The best that can be done is to call them precambrian. What about those highly metamorphic rocks, is it a simple matter to make out their horizon? I wonder if Mr. Howley is responsible for the new name for seals in Mr. McGrath's book they are called "ice-riding pinnipeds." Surely the author of the book must have been thinking of crabs when he wrote "pinnipeds." So far I have confined my criticism to the passages relating to geology and minerals mainly. Those pages hold so many mistakes as to cause one to wonder how the author ever had the temerity to inflict it on the public. Its nearly every page contains something to offend against good taste. As the author very humbly admits that the body of the work has been ditched, he is inclined to let the subject drop. I am not anxious to prove to Mr. McGrath that I do know something about geology. Mr. McGrath's opinion is a matter of indifference to me. Mr. McGrath throws slurs at me; of those I take no heed. If he is anxious to cross swords with me intellectually I think I can take very good care of myself. With your kind permission, Mr. Editor, I intend to point out a few other glaring defects in "Newfoundland in 1911," and shall offer you another article on the subject to-morrow. Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
Sir William Grantham, Judge of the King's Bench Division of the High Court of Justice, is dead of pneumonia, aged 76.

ROME, Nov. 30.
At the public consistory this morning fourteen cardinals received their red hats.

PERIM, Nov. 30.
The fortified seaport of Mocha, in the province of Yemen, Arabia, in the Red Sea, was bombarded this morning by Italian warships. No details.

ROME, Nov. 30.
A party of officers, surgeons and reporters has been searching the places in Tripoli, taken by the Italians on November 29th and has found many bodies of Italians, who were the victims of the fighting on October 23rd, the day before the Italian massacre by the Arabs. These bodies had been atrociously mutilated. Some of the victims had been crucified, and their eyelids stitched so that they could not close them. Some were buried up to their armpits, their hands lopped off and their eyes gouged out. The agonized faces of many of them suggest that they had endured awful tortures while still alive. An Italian, who escaped by hiding for three days in a ditch, pretending that he was dead, and witnessed the mutilations, declares that Turkish officers and women were present. Five of the Italians were buried alive up to their shoulders and allowed to starve to death.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
The probability of a big naval loan in the near future is revived by the "Mail" Gazette, which anticipates that \$150,000,000, and possibly more, will be required as supplemental to the usual naval estimates. It is argued that in view of the campaign in Germany for an increased navy for the recent speech on the Moroccan question it will be necessary for Britain to show that she is determined to preserve the 2 in 1 standard. The provision of adequate docks or Dreadnought battleships also necessitates heavy expenditures.

BERLIN, Nov. 30.
Chancellor Hollnagel and the Foreign Secretary will reply in the Reichstag in the course of next week to the recent speech on the Moroccan question by Sir Edward Grey. It is said that one or both of the German statesmen will indicate the opportunity for England to manifest goodwill to Germany, either in connection with the Bagdad railway or with the consolidation of the German colonial empire in Africa by concessions of Belgian or Portuguese territory.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
In reply to an inquiry, the Foreign Office says that Britain, Japan and the United States are in "close communication regarding the situation in China. They would be glad to offer mediation should the opportunity arrive. For the present, however, they are observing strict neutrality between the parties. The British Government is now consulting the British minister at Peking regarding the desirability of sending troops, but it does not seem that foreigners are now in greater danger than hitherto.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.
Admiral Murdoch of the United States Navy in the Asiatic Station, has sent two of his ships up the Yangtze River, from Shanghai to Hankow, where General Chang, who is the flower of the Imperial army, is engaged by the revolutionaries. As many warships of other nations are also there, if the bombardment of the city cannot be prevented, the remaining foreigners there can find refuge on the warships during the fighting. It is not expected that the troops will be despatched from Manila to China until another meeting of the Council of Ministers at Peking.

Here and There.
HERRING PLentiful.—Herring are reported very plentiful in Conception Bay and good hauls were made yesterday, especially in the neighbourhood of Portugal Cove.

A LARGE FREIGHT.—The s.s. "Rospero" took a full freight north yesterday, and is now bound for Cape Shore, came in by last night's train to enter the General Hospital. He will get treatment for a sore foot.

POOR WOMAN'S LOSS.—A poor woman named Fitzpatrick lost \$5.50, which she could ill afford, yesterday between Military Road and the Crosbie Hotel via Victoria Street. The finder will do a charitable act by leaving it at the police station.

DISASTROUS FIRE.—The fire at Bell Island a few mornings ago destroyed two tenements owned by Andrew Murphy, now residing at Port au Port. The families living in them barely escaped with their lives and had to leave in their night clothes. They lost nearly all their belongings. The houses were insured.

TROUBLE WITH CREW.—To-day the police had to arrest two of the crew of the Maggie, now ready for sea. The men were being brought to Baird's wharf when they became very disorderly, attacked the officers and gave them a hard time. They were then arrested and will likely be severely punished. The vessel will get a new crew.

A WONDERFUL COLLECTION.—Last evening a night, Officers Byrne and Tobin were again engaged in assorting small goods found in Mrs. Butler's House. The collection comprised such things as paper weights, dolls, pipes, India rubber balls, skipping ropes, and the articles are so varied and numerous that the police will not wear out if they find time to properly list them.
