What a common thing it is to find a clerk who does not know one thing about the speciality he sells except the stock he has on hand! Of course he knows the names of the goods, but he does not know enough about the subject to really sell anything. He answers any questions we ask by money-making, and finally gets us to buy a make whose points we had gotten from advertisements and from advertising alone.

He knew something. In the third shop, famous throughout the country for its development of real salesmanship in its personnel, the clerk sold me a watch. He had none of American make, and none with a radium dial, but he countered my two objections by explain-

that he could have a radium dial on and that, as regard parts, the shop kept a full line of all parts of the foreign watches they sold and would guarantee to repair for a reasonable price. As the shop has a perfect reputation for good faith I bought the watch and arranged to have the dial put on. That man knew something about his business besides the tray of watches in his show case. He knew what people were likely to ask for, he knew what watch makers were advertising.

To Get Somewhere.

It seems to me that if I had a shop of any kind I should supply my clerks with all the advertising and the catalogues of various makes of whatever specialty they handled and insist that they read them. Sometimes it is possible to order what the shop does not have and thus hold the customer's trade and good will. Again, if a clerk understands the whole situation he can answer questions. It also seems to me that if I were a clerk I should do this sort of thing on my own account. But maybe I wouldn't. It is very easy to say what one would do if—

But I know this. If I did, I should stand three times the chance of advancement that I should if I hadn't.

Protection of Minority.

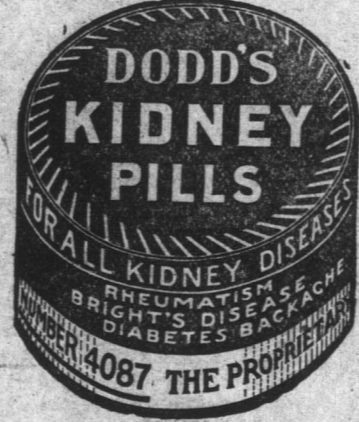
GRIFFITHS PROMISE TO SOUTHERN ISLAND.

DUBLIN (Associated Press)—The promise of protection made to the southern minority by Arthur Griffith, is the subject of considerable speculation here, for it is not definitely known what provisions the new Irish Free State constitution will make for carrying them out. The possibilities of a second chamber in the Irish parliament have been discussed, as well as the powers such a chamber would have, therefore the public is anxiously awaiting some authentic announcement to clear up the hints dropped by political leaders from time to time. Some importance has been attached to a public utterance by Mr. Darrell Figgis who was acting chairman of the committee formed to draft the constitution. He stated that the question of a second chamber had been tackled and answered "satisfactorily and strikingly" and in a way never attempted by any country in the world before. Mr. Figgis said that there were men in Ireland of eminent worth and service, judgement and wisdom, who because of the qualities would be reluctant to pass through the ordeal, but who ought, nevertheless, to be called into the national service, and would be chosen if the people had an opportunity of choosing them. They would never be chosen by any one of the acknowledged political machines.

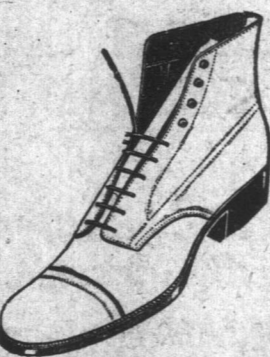

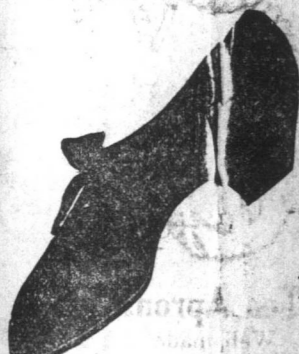

Oxonian Adrift. The Broken Spectacles.

TOWING LINES PARTED.
Owing to the strong wind and heavy sea prevailing during the past twenty-four hours, the S.S. Winifredian with the disabled freighter Oxonian in tow is having a hard time making port. During last night the steel towing line parted and the Oxonian, owing to her damaged rudderhead, went adrift. The ship is steaming but it is impossible to keep her head up to the wind. At noon hour to-day she was 10 miles N.E. of the narrows. The S.S. Cabot was out this morning taking two pilots. One was put on board the Oxonian after great difficulty. The Winifredian was obliged to steam into the narrows before the pilot could be put on board. After receiving her pilot the Winifredian steamed north to pick up the Oxonian. Owing to heavy cross seas all attempts to connect up the tow lines failed and the Cabot returned to port shortly after one o'clock.

AMUSING ASSAULT CASE.
Who broke the spectacles? This was the question which Judge Morris had to decide this morning when two women of Colonial Street who had each emerged from a fight with her eyeglasses broken, blamed the other for doing the damage. The Judge gave it up and dismissed the case. The complainant, in the box, said accused had had an argument with her and broke her spectacles in the friendly bout which followed. She produced the fragments of her glasses to prove her case. Then the accused was sworn and gave similar evidence. She too produced a pair of broken glasses. Neither party had witnesses to the fracas.

Kyle at Louisburg.
S.S. Kyle arrived at Louisburg at 10 a.m. to-day having occupied thirty-three hours in crossing Cabot Strait. The ship was delayed by heavy ice which filled the Strait. The Kyle left Port aux Basques at 1 a.m. yesterday. She was unable to make North Sydney which is again ice bound. The Kyle leaves Louisburg on Monday for Port aux Basques and will have a very large foreign mail. If she should again be delayed in crossing, no mail will arrive here before Thursday or Friday.

Interesting Lecture.

CANON SMART ON "THE CHALLENGE OF ISLAM."

Rev. Canon Smart lectured before a large audience in the Canon Wood Hall last night on "The Challenge of Islam." He gave a graphic description of the history of Mohammedanism and the manner in which it spread itself westward to be stopped in 732 A.D. by the great battle of Tours. A description of the Mohammedan beliefs and how the religion had spread over all the East was also given. The lecturer spoke of the various methods taken by the Christian people to counteract the influence of the religion. Firstly, the influence and example radiated by medical missions; secondly, the preachings and teachings of Evangelists; and thirdly and most important, that of education. With the exception of Turkey, the entire Mohammedan world is noted for its gross illiteracy and the educational methods adopted by Christians have done much to improve the state of mind of the infidels and cure them of their superstitious belief in the Prophet. Turkey in Europe has a large number of students of University standing. Americans have established 400 schools, whose pupils are being taught the difference. Reference was made to the work performed by Bishop Valpy-French, who at 75, after labouring all his time in India, dedicated his remaining years to Mohammedan Missions in Arabia. Many similar references were made. The lecture was illustrated with many beautiful slides. To-morrow night Canon Smart will lecture on "The Way of the Cross" at the Nickel Theatre. The Passion Play pictures will be shown.

BLACK "FOX SKIN" STORY CONTINUED.

During the month of September in last year Mr. Ryan chartered a vessel to take a load of fish to market from King's Cove. The captain of the vessel was a Welshman. Now the Trading Season was over, and the vessel became a general cargo vessel. It did not take long for the Captain and Michael to become friends, and they spent many pleasant evenings in the vessel's cabin. On those days when it was too hot to handle fish, Michael's duties would keep him in the office, and the captain would spend the greater part of those days with Michael. One day he noticed the "beautiful skin" on the wall, and without saying a word he made up his mind that he would buy it if he could get it cheap. He found that Michael owned a fox skin, he invited Michael to visit his cabin more frequently, and Michael was surprised and pleased to find how hospitable the captain had been all at once, and the vintage in which they pledged eternal friendship was older and finer than Michael had ever suspected as being the captain's stores. This sudden change in the captain's attitude towards the liquid hospitality on the vessel of the captain was a "sprat upon the nose" to catch a mackerel. The captain in this case was the black "fox skin" that the captain wanted, and he was a miff for his wife. He, however, set upon the skin by Michael was prohibitive to the captain—who was decidedly penurious—so he began to despair of being able to buy it, especially when Michael told him that he was planning himself to have it made up into a muff for his manager's wife, in token of gratitude for many favors received.

In spite of all this the captain continued the skin, and as the days went on his hospitality to Michael increased. At last the vessel was ready and ready for sea the next morning, and Michael told the captain that he would have the men in the "room" all ready to come on board to assist in getting the vessel out to sea. This being his last day in port, Michael and a few other friends gave the captain a "good send-off" and during the many pleasantries of the evening the captain told Mr. F. "I do hope I shall not have to leave King's Cove without a fox skin for my wife." Michael looked up his forehead, and gave some facial evidences of a conflict of opinion within. Then he said, "Well, since you have been so kind to me on your vessel, I suppose I will have to sell you that skin." The captain grasped Michael's hand and said, "Oh, thank you, thank you Mr. F. How much you want for it?" Michael said, "I could not think of asking you a big price for it

nearly two hundred years. Probably, the people during the first one hundred years after the stone was placed there knew all about it, and its inscription; but within the last one hundred years, no one has given it sufficient thought to find out to whose memory it was erected, or what is the wording on it. The moss covered it, and only those few distant relatives remembered who was buried there. A few weeks ago my curiosity got the better of me, and upon careful removal of the moss, I found that the inscription on the stone reads thus: "To the memory of Thomas Newell, Sr., who departed this life on ye 14th of June, anno domini 1724." There is a verse or a sentiment of some kind underneath this inscription, which I have not been able to decipher. Some day when the stone is put upright, I shall get it, and then I shall publish it. This date 1724 makes it the oldest headstone in Trinity Bay; as the oldest that can be found in St. Paul's Churchyard, Trinity, is 1746.

Nobody seems to know very much about this Thomas Newell, Sr., and those who thought they knew something about him, are surprised to find that he died two hundred years ago. The men and women of the past generation took with them the details of his life, other than the fact that he owned Newell's Point, and nearly all the land in Pease Cove. The following entries in the registers of St. Paul's, Trinity refer to the Newells of succeeding generations. 1839—Interred Mary Newell, daughter of Thomas and Christian Newell. 1838—Interred Christian Newell. 1838—Interred Thomas Newell, aged 78 years. 1842—Amelia Newell married Joseph Purchase (or Perchar). Eventually Jonah Newell became heir to the property of Thomas Newell, Sr., and he in turn left it all by will and deed, to Jonah Jones because he was called after him. Jonah Jones was my mother's father. The Jones and the Newell families became united for the first time, when Robert Jones of Liverpool, England, married Mary Newell, a daughter of Jonah Newell, in 1788. The Newell and the Jones families had their beginning in Newfoundland, from ancestors of distinctly good social standing in England. Jonah Newell is always given the title of Esquire in the old Church Books; and the first Jones, viz: Robert Jones, who married Mary Newell in 1788, was a midshipman on H.M. Ship "Snap," when Rev. William Bullock was Lieutenant on board and his brother was the Commander.

When the "Snap" left Newfoundland waters, Midshipman Robert Jones was left behind in Trinity, in charge of men who were fortifying the Fort Point at the entrance to Trinity Harbour. A few years afterwards he got his honourable discharge from the Navy, and then he married Mary Newell. After he had been married some years, he wished to return to England, but as his wife was not willing to leave Newfoundland, he went alone, to bring out the money that was to his credit in the Bank of England. On his way out to Newfoundland, the vessel on which he was a passenger was seized by pirates; his money was taken by them; the vessel was sunk, and he was drowned. A few days afterwards the pirate was captured by an

English man-of-war, and amongst the booty found on board the pirate was a bag of gold marked Robert Jones. This was brought to England and placed in Chancery, and it is still there. Efforts were made some years ago by relatives in Trinity to recover it, but like many such efforts on the part of others in like circumstances—they were unsuccessful.

A few years afterwards, Robert Jones' widow married Dennis Kitt. Dennis came out to Newfoundland as an Irish youngster, and worked with Thomas Newell Jr., as a cooper. In his old days he owed the Garlands a hundred pounds; but being unable to pay it, grandfather Jones went over his little property to my grandfather Jones, and Dennis spent his last days in quietness and private devotions. Just before he died he expressed a wish that his body be laid to rest beside that of his old master. This was done, and his unmarked grave is beside that of Thomas Newell, in the old field of the Jones' at Trinity East, whilst that of his widow lies in the old Churchyard in Trinity. When Robert Jones was drowned at sea, he left two boys—Jonah and Robert. Jonah was sent to his aunt, Mrs. Alexander at Bonavista. She sent him to school there, and then he came back to Trinity East and served his time with Dennis Kitt as a cooper. Robert was sent to his uncle at Han's Harbour, and from thence he went to England, and after a few years at school he went to sea for some years.

Twenty years after Robert left Trinity he came back to Trinity from Poole, England, in one of his grandfather's vessels consigned to Garland & Co. When it became known that the captain of the vessel in port was Robert Jones of Trinity East, poor old Mrs. Kitt thought he must be her husband, and as she was married again, she wondered what she was going to do about it. Her fears, however, were dispelled and she was glad when she found that Captain Robert Jones was her son.

(This outline history of Trinity East will be continued next week.)

I have just been handed a copy of The Weekly Record, published at Trinity on February 22nd 1896. It is from the careful keepings of a friend of mine, who like myself has a penchant for putting away things of the present, and then enjoying them in reminiscent mood in years to come. Mr. J. A. Barrett was the Manager of the Record at this time; and because of the many deeply interesting references that it contains I forgive him his official mistake in referring to Trinity as "Trinity West." The editorial is headed "New Markets Wanted for our fish," and in it Mr. George Knowling advocates the sending of our Labrador fish to the Midland Counties of England, and offers \$200 towards the expenses of an experiment. (Was it ever done?)

Notice is given in its columns that Messrs. Job Bros. & Co. have imported a number of trained pigeons, which are to be taken to the icefields by Capt. Sam Blandford, and liberated with a message, when anything of importance warrants it. (We have improved on that.) The local columns are filled with accounts of "A Sale of Work" and "A Literary Entertainment" in aid of the proposed Parish Hall in Trinity. All this was only twenty-six years ago, but the young people who took part in those things remind me of the fact, that literary talents were more in evidence then than they are now. (This is to be regretted.)

Several of the young folks who rendered all kinds of unselfish assistance at that time, have either passed away, or have changed their names; whilst some of those who were then the older people are still with us, and though twenty-six years older, are still helpful at such times. Rev. Frank and Mrs. Smart were the makers of the outline plans, and the driving force of it all, and this accounted largely for its success. Among the names of those who took part are: George Oakley, George Gent, John Lockyer (Geo.), Harry Earle, John Green, Nathaniel Morris, W. Brady, W. Williams, M. Jackson; Mrs. Joseph Morris, Mrs. N. Morris, Mrs. F. Collis, Mrs. A. Gardner, Miss Peo. Collis, Miss Earle, Miss Eva Morris, Miss Hannah Myers, Miss Freddie White, Miss Gertie White. The accompanists were Miss

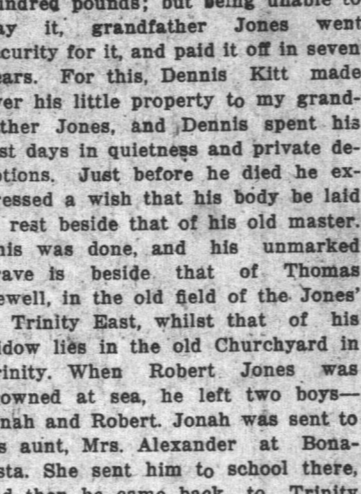

The Outbreak at Chauri Chauri.

SANGUINARY FIGHTING—STORY TOLD FOR FIRST TIME.

LUCKNOW, INDIA.—(Associated Press)—One of the British officials stationed here gives the following version of the sanguinary outbreak at Chauri Chauri, which has been briefly mentioned by cable. "Chauri Chauri is a police station in the district of Gorakhpur, United Provinces. In pursuance of the Gandhi non-cooperation policy of boycott, bands of volunteers have been going round the village markets, intimidating and forcing people to avoid foreign cloth and liquor shops. The police officer of Chauri Chauri, whose duty it was to keep the peace in his circle, warned these volunteers on a market day against the consequences of intimidating people, but the picketers paid no heed to this warning and threatened to punish the police officer. "On the date of the tragedy, Feb. 4, a large number of volunteers, followed by thousands of ignorant and credulous villagers, came in a procession and made a demonstration before the police station. A howling mob of nearly 4,000 people, whose feelings had been worked-up by the oratory of the volunteers, surrounded the building. The staff which consisted of two Indian officers and 18 men, tried their best to reason with the rioters but were pelted with bricks and stones. The police officers were picked up from the railway line. "Nine of the policemen who were armed with muskets fired cartridges in the air to scare away the mob. When the fire ceased the volunteers shouted: "Thanks to Gandhi, the bullet's won't hurt you, and are all changing into water."

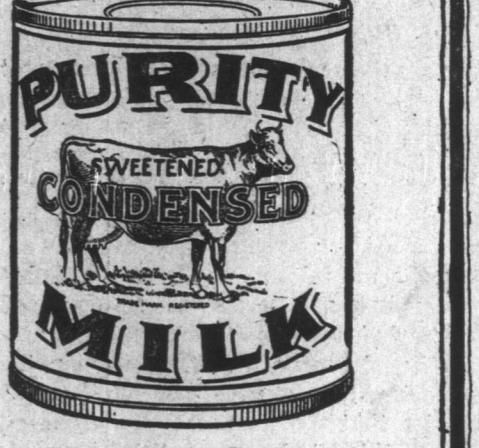

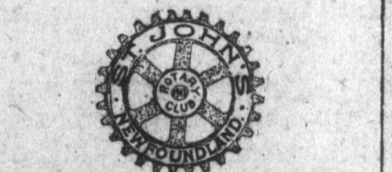
Unanimous.

Public opinion has not yet died in St. John's, nor yet in Newfoundland. Though morbid and inclined to shuffle off through atrophy, it has become revived, through laxity and negligence and imposition on the part of the Government, and last night's meeting was sufficient proof that there is a strong sentiment pervading the population; a sentiment that will leave its way to an amelioration of our wrongs, and reduce the evils from which we are suffering. There was no doubt whatever about the unanimity of sentiment. All present seemed to be possessed of the idea that the time was ripe for something to be accomplished for the betterment of conditions. Not one dissentient voice was heard when the resolutions, properly moved, seconded and supported, were put by the Chairman. Not one man of the hundreds present kept his seat, and from the lowest to the highest there was emanated that spontaneity of expression that the only man in Newfoundland capable of leading us out of the wilderness of maladministration is Sir Robert Bond.

The present call, or invitation, to Sir Robert Bond has been imminent. It has been germinating in the public mind for a considerable period, but it is only arrived at the developing period last night, when every man of the vast audience assembled in the Casino Theatre stood to his feet, thereby expressing his willingness to extend an invitation to the "Incorruptible Commoner" to once more lead them out of the devious paths into which successive governments of Newfoundland, since 1909, have led the people. There was something behind suppressed, but that something was a reluctance on the part of those present to ask the very man upon whom they had gone back in 1909 to now return to the stage of nationalism and declare a way out of the travail into which Newfoundland had gotten. Notwithstanding this reluctance, which was born more of sentiment than of fear, not one man in the huge audience kept his seat when a vote on the Resolutions was taken. And that is all the more flattering to the superiority of the man, whom they chose, to show and direct the way out of the impasse into which the Colony has come. There is no doubt whatever as to the sentiment of St. John's with regard to Sir Robert Bond. He is beloved of all, and though one time seduced by specious politicians from their allegiance, the departure was but temporary. To-day they are prepared to give him their unqualified support, and to perform as he directs. They wait for him as the only man who can extricate Newfoundland from the political slough of

despond into which the colony has fallen.
The resolutions were conclusive. They permitted of no debate. It was a clear question of "Yes" or "No," but emulating the spirit of their forefathers who fought and won Responsible Government, there was not a man who failed to rise when the text of the resolutions was put to the meeting. Surely the action of St. John's in this vital matter will be supported by the outports, which so long have groaned under the lash of taxation, imposed to the last cent of the earnings of the people, and have been extorted from them by process of law, with the exception of the guarantee for Fishery Supplies, which were never attempted to be recovered, because they were parcelled out to party followers, and because of their non payment became an additional burden upon the shoulders of the taxpayers who did not benefit, or were not partners in the enterprise of getting something for nothing. The resolutions preferred the promise that the Colony could no longer sustain the load of taxation placed upon its people. They also promised that the Government would not hearken to the voice of experience and reduce the weight that the Colony was carrying. Hence there was no alternative—considering that the Government was as adamant—but to appeal to the only man who is capable of showing whither the best efforts of Government can be directed. Consequently the call is for Sir Robert Bond. All classes are agreed that he is the one man to take the Colony out of the debacle into which inexperienced and venal leaders have placed her. The call is unanimous: it is insistent; it is genuine, and therefore the sole and only hope of the people is in the man whom they once delighted to honor, but in a moment of purlblindness forgot. And that man is the Right Honorable Sir Robert Bond, the patriot, the incorruptible. He alone can save his country either by advice or leadership. His country calls. Will he be deaf to the call? We think not, especially in this hour of crisis, when we may not know what the next moment may bring forth.

Special Week Boys' Programme.

While it is not possible for the St. John's Rotary Club to arrange a full week's programme they will endeavour to cover the most important problems of the boys in the following manner:—
Sunday, April 30, in the Churches.—Each Minister and Priest in the City has been asked to deliver an address at the morning service on "The Boys of our Community."
Monday, May 1st (or other days that week) in the Schools.—(a) 10 minute address will be given by a Rotary member on "What an education means to a boy or girl." (b) 10 minute talk by a Rotary member on "The results of the Observance of Law and Order." (c) 10 minute talk by a Rotary member on "The Value of Thrift."
At a weekly luncheon to be held on Tuesday next, at 1.15 p.m., the programme will be devoted to Boys' Work arranged as follows:—(1) 5 minute talk by a Clergyman on "The Importance of the Development of the Spiritual side of a Boys' Life." (2) 5 minutes talk by a High School principal on "What Education means to our Boys." (3) 10 minutes talk by a medical man on "The Boys Health and Safety." (4) 5 minute talk on "A Man's Duty to his Boy and Opportunity with him."

RECEIVES UNANIMOUS CALL.

Mass Meeting of Citizens Send Invitation to "The Incorruptible Commoner."

If the greatest statesmen of Newfoundland could have seen the fervent and enthusiasm with which those who attended the meeting were impregnated, if he could have heard the spontaneous and prolonged outbursts of cheering which every mention of his name called forth, he would not hesitate for a single instant to come forward and place his services at the command of a people who, despite his lengthy absence from public life, have kept a constant faith in his ability and love of country. The meeting was the culmination of the efforts of a body of citizens who realize that the public was taxed beyond the limit of its resources and that apparently the Government was not competent to deal satisfactorily with the situation, came to the conclusion that the one man to whom we can look with confidence to help and guide us at the present time is the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond, P. C., K. C. M. G.

THE RESOLUTIONS.
The resolutions were then read by the secretary and are as follows:—
WHEREAS having regard to the present financial condition of this colony it is imperative that a drastic reduction in public expenditure should be effected; and
WHEREAS it would appear from the estimates of expenditure for the coming year now tabled in the House of Assembly that the Government do not contemplate any such reduction; and
WHEREAS it is desirable that an expression of public opinion on the matter should be given and for that purpose public meetings should be called in the different centres of the island; and
WHEREAS it is proposed to call such a meeting in St. John's at an early date; and
WHEREAS it is deemed advisable that such public meeting should be addressed by the best informed and most experienced speaker and Statesman available; and
WHEREAS it is the unanimous opinion of this meeting that the one man to whom we can look with confidence to help and guide us at the present time is the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond, P. C., K. C. M. G.;
BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that an urgent request be made to Sir Robert Bond inviting him to address a public meeting of citizens in St. John's at his earliest possible convenience and invoking his assistance, counsel and guidance in our present difficulties and that the Chairman and Secretary be empowered to communicate this resolution to Sir Robert Bond.

A REPRESENTATIVE GATHERING.
The meeting was held in the Casino Theatre and long before the Committee appeared on the platform, the spacious auditorium, gallery and pit filled to overflowing with one of the most representative gatherings ever assembled in the city. The meeting was representative not only in the sense that there was a large number of business and professional men present among a preponderance of artisans, but also because nearly every outpost constituency was represented, and was called to order at 8.15 when Mr. G. R. Parsons was appointed chairman and Mr. J. Neary secretary.

The chairman stated the purpose of the meeting which was to move and adopt a set of resolutions calling upon the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond, P. C., K. C. M. G., to address a public gathering which would be held at an early date, upon the economic situation of the country, with a view to aiding in the formulation of some plan whereby the existent distress may be overcome. The gathering was non-political and was a spontaneous outburst of indignation on the part of citizens who resented the stranglehold which was choking the life from the people. The meeting, said the chairman, had assembled with the sole purpose of calling upon Sir Robert Bond, the one man who could successfully control the destinies of the country, to come

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

CIVIL WAR IN CHINA.
PEKING, April 29.
Fighting along south Peking-Tientsin railway was still in progress at noon to-day. The forces of General Chang, Military Governor of Manchuria, and General Wad-Fai-Fu, Military leader of Central China, were reported engaged along a line extending from Nanchang, twenty miles south of Tientsin to a point south of Peking. A despatch from Tientsin says there has been heavy artillery firing in the vicinity of Nanchang the last twenty-four hours. Foreign Legations here have advised nationals of their respective countries, who are now outside Peking, to hasten to the capital as a measure of self-protection.

RUSSIAN AFFAIRS AT GENOA.

GENOA, Apr. 29.
In line with Premier Lloyd George's declaration that new Allied proposals to Russians must be considered as a whole, the special drafting committee are endeavoring to-day to frame a document which would harmonize the differences in demands submitted by British and French delegates. While a French document stated agricultural reconstruction should come before other things, the British programme dealt more fully with credits for Russia, favoring reduction in her war debt, and conceding that foreigners formerly owning property in Russia be granted the use of it, instead of a return of actual ownership, which would conflict with Soviet principles of Nationalization. France would demand that if private property cannot be restored former owners be given indemnity. Louis Barthou, Chief of the French Delegation, took occasion yesterday to state he intended to quit the conference. The correspondent of the Central News says he learns that British draft proposals to Russia set forth eight points, the principal of which is that Russia shall recognize all her debts, and after a moratorium of five years, pay two per cent interest for five years, and then four per cent for another five years. M. T. Chichester, according to this correspondent, said the British draft might be a basis for negotiations, and then, looking at the French draft, shook his head as though dismissing it entirely.

THREE CHEERS FOR SIR ROBERT.

Mr. Kenneth Blair spoke from the point of view of the business man. The meeting consisted of the combined labour unions who were desirous of finding the best way to overcome the difficulties with which the country was beset. They were not present to talk politics but to call out a statesman, and his name was Sir Robert Bond. (Applause.) He made several suggestions with respect to reduced taxation which applied especially to fishery supplies. By making these reductions, and by this means alone, could production be possible at a profit. He concluded a well reasoned address by calling upon the meeting to give three cheers for Sir Robert Bond. These were given with a will.

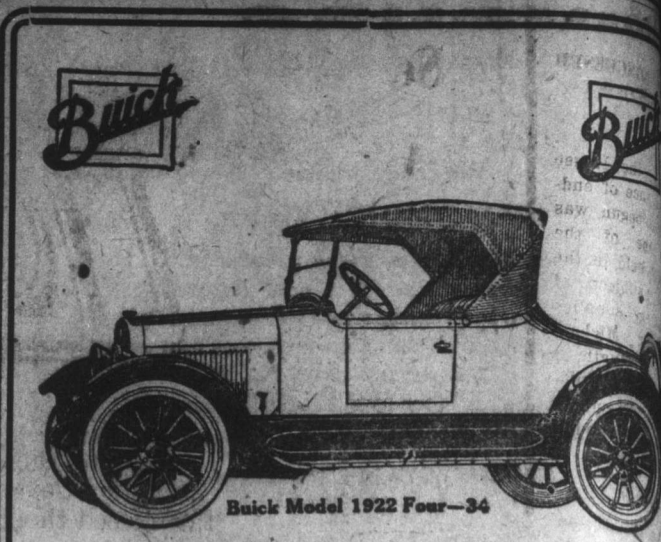

Ancient English Universities.
FALL ON EVIL DAYS FINANCIALLY.
LONDON (Associated Press)—Oxford and Cambridge Universities, for the first time in their long histories, are unable to support themselves, and have called upon the public for assistance. This was disclosed in a report issued by the Royal Commission appointed under the chairmanship of ex-Premier Asquith to investigate the financial condition of the two institutions, which two years ago was admittedly so satisfactory that the Government granted each of them an emergency subsidy of £30,000 annually, thus saving both colleges from collapse. Including these subsidies, Oxford had an income of £224,710 in 1920 while that of Cambridge totalled £279,554. The Commission's report recommends increasing the annual grants to £100,000 each, with additional provisions for extending educational facilities for women and pension arrears. The commission stresses the point that to-day the universities have largely returned to their function of ministering to the non-wealthy student, and have, in fact, become "student democracies."

REPORT ASKS FOR EXTENSIONS.
In addition to recommending ample facilities for the education of women, the report pleads for more state scholarships, cheaper living costs and better pay, with pension prospects, for professors. Although the report regrets "the comparative neglect of living languages" at both universities, it notes that there is an increasing tendency on the part of businessmen to look to universities for trained men for future assistants and partners. It adds that "business salaries now offered to first-class science men would make it impossible to keep enough of the best men to do the teaching at Oxford and Cambridge, were it not for their devotion to academic research and teaching and their attachment to the university." As regards the cost of living for undergraduates, the report finds that it is too high. In 1920 the average total year's cost for an art student, including food but not clothes, washing, books, stationery and personal expenses, was £156 for Oxford and £145 for Cambridge. The cheapest college during that year was Oxford, £114; Cambridge £123. The dearest was at Oxford, £202; Cambridge, £172. Marquis Curzon is chancellor of Oxford, where the number of resident undergraduate students according to the latest statistics is 4,651, while at Cambridge, where Sir Arthur Balfour is chancellor, there are 5,733 students.

Peru's Financial Condition.
TO BE REVISED.
Lima, Peru (A.P. Mail)—Millions of dollars in Peruvian gold, lying idle in government depositories here as a currency reserve, will be placed at interest in New York and London under legislation adopted by the Peruvian Congress to establish a federal reserve bank and revise the country's financial system. The reserve bank act, patterned after similar legislation in the United States, provides for an elastic currency which cannot be tampered with. Notes of the bank will be payable in gold in Peru, and in gold drafts in New York and London. The institution's reservoir of credit will be available to any Peruvian bank in an emergency, thus permitting private financial institutions to extend greater commercial accommodations from their gold resources. Dr. W. W. Cumberland, American financial representative of the Peruvian Government, will be a permanent member of the new bank's board of directors.

DAILY ADJOURNS. DUBLIN, April 27. Midst the discussion of a motion to appoint a Committee of five to bring about unity in the army, Daily adjourned until Wednesday.

THE FARMERS' VIEW.

OTTAWA, April 17. According to C. Rice Jones, general manager of the United Grain Growers Company, the Western farmers ask the re-establishment of the Canada Wheat Board, (1) to prevent the dumping of a large volume of wheat on the market in the fall because of circumstances over which the farmers have no control, and thus secure better prices; (2) because it would be of benefit not only to the farmer but to his creditors and all Canada; (3) because it would reduce spreads between the different grades of grain; (4) because it would be possible for the farmer to get more fall work done if he knew that by hauling his wheat on the snow he would still secure a good price. These views were expressed before the Agricultural Committee of Parliament.

PROMINENT FRENCHMAN DEAD.

PARIS, April 29. Paul Deschanel, former President of France, died this afternoon.

Marine Engineers' AGREE TO WAGE REDUCTION.

The Marine Engineers' Association, at a meeting held on Thursday night, agreed to accept a reduction in wages as proposed by the local ship owners. The matter of wage reduction was proposed some time ago, and since has been under discussion. The reduction amounts to 12 1/2 percent on present wages. The new scale becomes effective May 1st, 1922, and will continue until May 1st, 1923, when the Association will be at liberty to make a new agreement if feasible, and conditions warrant same. It is also understood that the locomotive and other engineers employed by the railway company have effected a compromise whereby a reduction of five percent on the prevailing scale will come into effect on Monday next and a further reduction of five percent on October 1st.

Nfld. Representative AT TRAINMEN'S CONVENTION.

Conductor Phil Velch of the Reid Newfoundland Company's Cross Country Service, is leaving by to-morrow's express enroute to Toronto to attend the triennial convention of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, which opens in that city during the second week in May. The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen is a fraternal insurance organization having a large membership in the U. S. A., and Canada, and was extended to Newfoundland in 1913. Conductor Velch has the honor of being the first delegate from Newfoundland.

The products of other countries present there, and, yet, as far as Newfoundland has made no attempt to take advantage of this opportunity to show the people of the American Republics that we are not out of hand as good an article as any other country on the globe. In my last article I stated that the inhabitants of the American countries were a fish-eating people, and that they preferred cod fish to the jerked beef of other countries, and would buy fish when they get it, provided it is cured and packed as it should be, and which our people can do, if some inducement were given to them and the necessity explained. But when I penned this article three weeks ago in the Telegram, I had no idea that other Republics in Brazil were clamouring for our fish. Sixty-two years ago following advertisement appeared in the Commercial Journal, Prices and Shipping List of St. John's, Newfoundland, of the date 18th, 1860:—

SCANDINAVIAN COMPETITION.
Now that the Norwegians are somewhat handicapped by the extra duty placed on their fish by the Spanish Government, it is only natural to suppose that they will turn their attention elsewhere to secure a large market for their surplus catch, and it goes

without saying that Brazil and other South American Republics will offer a field for their commercial operations. Sixty years ago they first commenced to compete with us in the Brazilian market; Bilbao and Barcelona were at first the ports of Spain to which the importation of Norwegian fish was confined, but a few years later it found its way into other places, including Malaga, Alicante and Valencia. I have shown conclusively by the above advertisement that the Republics of Chili and Paraguay were looking for our fish, and it is only reasonable to suppose that they would look for it to-day, provided we sent them a suitable article. These countries are in a more prosperous condition to-day than they were sixty years ago, when they were seeking for a supply of our fish, under the conditions described above, because at that time they were continually in the throes of revolution, and the countries and the people were practically impoverished thereby. To-day the countries are comparatively quiet, and efforts are being made to develop their resources. Besides the means of transport are far and away ahead of what they were at that time. Lines of steamers are continually running between the United States and the various South American countries, and even Canada is beginning to wake up to the importance of trade in that direction, and they have now steam communication with several of the South American Republics.

Ought we then, celebrated as we are for codfish, by our apathy or neglect, permit Norwegians, Nova Scotians, or any other people to initiate themselves into, and monopolize the trade which we have heretofore possessed almost exclusively? It is only by perfect confidence established between supplier and supplied that a healthy and prosperous condition of affairs can exist.

UNCLE SAM ON THE JOB.
About 1860, a large and beautiful United States barque arrived in St. John's, and took on board about 5,000 quintals of codfish from C. F. Bennett and Co. in large birch casks for the Southern market. I am not sure if this cargo was the first shipment to fill the order advertised for by Timoney and Co. of New York, for the Valparaiso and Paragway markets, but as it

was about the same date, it is reasonable to suppose that it was. If so, the ship had to go around Cape Horn to get to Valparaiso in those days, but now the distance is very considerably reduced by going through the Panama Canal. Anyhow, it goes to show that our Yankee friends knew how to speculate in our codfish even in the sixties of the past century. Probably that cargo also was shipped as United States fish, thus obtaining a market with our fish in the name of their own. An old commercial trick.

A Bill, "An Act to amend Cap. 85 of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled 'Of the Central and Harbour Grace District Courts,'" passed committee stage without amendment.

A Bill "An Act to amend the Business Profits Tax Acts 1917-1920" passed the committee stage. This Bill is designed to remove doubts as to the validity of the 1917 Business Profits Tax Acts. After the tabling of the Census returns for 1920, the House adjourned until Tuesday next at 4 p.m.

For Compulsory Education.

At a great united meeting of the Conception Bay British Society; Sons of England Benefit Society; Society of United Fishermen, and the Loyal Orange Association, assembled at St. Grace, on Monday, April 24, 1922, the following resolution was passed unanimously, not a single dissentient:—"That in the opinion of this meeting all elementary education in Newfoundland should be compulsory and free, and that the matter be brought before the notice of the Government, representatives of this district and especially before the Minister of Education."


