





#### What Nelson's Column Cost

Trafalgar Square, London, is dedicated to Nelson. It was designed by Sir Charles Barry, and completed at a cost of £10,000 in 1841. The Square was built over the site of what was formerly the Royal Mews, which were removed to make room for the National Gallery about 1824. The column, begun in 1840, is a copy

of one of the Corinthian columns of the Temple of Mars Ultor, the avenging God of War, at Rome. The total height of the monument, designed by William Railton, is 193ft.

The full-length figure of Nelson 17ft, in height, and an idea of its proportions may be formed from the fact that from toe to heel the foot measures three-quarters of a yard. It is hewn out of two piece of Craigleith stone, of great hardness, from the Granton quarry of the Duke of Buc cleuch, and weighs nearly eighteen tons. The total cost of the column was £50,000, of which £20,000 was raised by subscription and the rest voted by Parliament.







Judge Landry was next called on t peak. He congratulated the Assolation on the Show which was one difficulty in getting people to attend the Poultry Shows but this problem had been solved here. He congratulated the winners on their success and the losers for the interest they had shown in exhibiting their birds. The work is a good one that will help to solve the meat and eggs problem of the country. It is a pity that all the poultry in the country is not as good as that exhibited and an effort should be made to this end. Interest should not wane, good care should be given the birds and in this connection Judge Landry sounded a note of warning against buying second class feeds shipped from Western Canada, that they are not worth anything. If results are to be expected the best food should be supplied.

The Exhibition was a good one as far as appearance went, but he thought more attention should be given to production, as after all this is the most important factor. In this connection he had suggested to the Poultry Association the formulating of an egg laying contest where birds of different classes would be brought together in the care of a competent man, and there should be given a test as to their laying qualities. He hoped that this would become an accomplished fact, as it would be a step in the proper direction to help keep at home much of the money that is being sent abroad, needlessly, because this country is well adapted for the sucessful raising of poultry.

In addition there are valuable timbers, such as mahogany and ebony, to be obtained. Before the war these plantations were in German occupation, this being one of Germany's richest colonies.
