Sellers demanded the prices of former markets, and buyers turned away in silence. The eastern market is glutted; hence the indifference of dealers, who seemed disposed not to buy at all, if they could not buy at a bargain. Such articles of beef as were brought in sold at from \$3 to \$3.50 live weight, and it was a rare case if any exceeded this. Working oxen alone brave all the fluctuations. They were more numerous than they have been for some time past, and prices have in no manner decreased. There was one splendid yoke on the ground for which the owner asked \$150. This was the extreme demand of ownership, and would not be attained, and there were many variations of this figure down as low as \$65, which was the price required for a yoke of three years old steers. Mich cows were plentiful and the prices asked ranged from \$18 up to \$40. The whole business of the Fair might be summed up by the common expression "very flat." A few of the sales are as follow:—Mr. John Coghlan sold a fat cow, and a heifer for \$55. Mr. B. Cochrane bought twelve head at about \$29 each, four for \$100, and a yoke of oxen for \$110; Mr. John Bryant, of Toronto, bought twenty-one head at \$2.25 per cwt. live weight, and Messrs. Mequillan & Goodfellow bought a number at from \$34 to \$40 each. Mr. Wm. Armstrong, 7th concession Eramosa, sold a steer and a heifer for \$50. Mr. Wm. Patterson sold four heifers at \$9.25 per cwt., live weight, and the same rate; and the Messrs. Miller, of Gnelph, bought fourteen at an average of about \$35.00 each. Cattle in middling condition were locked after, to be put up for fall and winter feeding.


