

SATURDAY, June 6th.-The Conncil resumed at eleven o'clock, the Warden in the chair. Mr Gordon presented the report of the Committee on Compulsory Education : Your Committee report that all the ratesble property of the County is com-pelled to contribute to the support of the schools for children of the ratepayers; that generally the schools are open to all free of charge; they hey believe that the schools of the different municipalities of the County of Wellington are well con-ducate their pupils; that the Committee most readily accept the burden imposed on them by law for providing general education, and are fully impresed with a sense of the ample returns which, as ratepayers, they would receive from their outay, if the blessings of education could be universal to all that need their influ-ence. The Committee respectfully sug-gest that the legal obligation cast on them to fall children of school age to accept the education provided. And that in accordance with these views they re-commend that the Warden and Clerk be instructed to prepare a potition to the Legislature of Ontrio embodying these views. The report was adopted. 


