We have received a telegraph from the Provincial Secretary, stating that the deputation have succeeded in inducing the Governor-General to visit Guelph on Thursday.—Lieut-Governor Howland will also accompany him.

The Mail and Leader have been greatly exercised over what they are pleased to call a "very suspicious affair." It is this. A company was lately formed in Toronto, called the "Canada Car Company" the works to be located in that city. The Tory organs stated, on Thursday, that this Company had succeeded in entering into a contract with the Ontario Government for the use, for seven years and a half more, of the labour of the Central Prison, now in course of construction, in the western part of that city. It is further announced that the new company are to have workshops in the Central Prison, and that from the building it will have rails laid down to connect with the principal railways entering Toronto. Out of this rumour the organs sent a fat job for some of the leading Reformers. They charge that the Company is none other than George Brown, Blaikie and Alexander, a few other Reformers, and a handful of Conservatives thrown in to ward off suspicion. They announce the whole affair as a job, and that Geo Brown has brought a pressure to bear on the Government, and compelled them to enter into an agreement for the use of the prison labour as above stated, which they maintain will be a source of great profit to the Company.
