

Captain Payson, of the water com-mittee, spoke of The Water Phase of the situation. He said that a num-ber of the city's most important reser-voirs had been either entirely destroy-ed or very badiy damaged, and the water pipes were in no condition to meet the demands put upon them. There was no storage of water for fire purposes, and consequently no adequate means of protection against fire, if it should break out at the time. Herman Schussler, the Spring Val-ley Water company's chief engineer-discussed the water situation at con-siderable length, and expressed the opinion that it would be unvise for the present to experiment with the electric lines.
