All the detectives denied emphatically that they had attempted to decoy Reid or any person else into buying counterfeit money—that the negotiations with him were simply the outcome of his opening up correspondence with Morgan.

Christine McQueen, postmistress at Fergus, swore that Reid's postoffice box was No. 78. She also identified the handwriting of the letters signed W. C. Reid as being in his writing.
