Sheep and Dogs.

The Middlesex county council has had to pay, in several cases, smartly for sheep killed by vicious dogs.

All over the land the same question is being met by county authorities. If all the payments made on this account were summed up, the total would be very considerable.

The money question, however, is not the principal point, which is rather the hindrance and discouragement to the business of sheep raising by the depredations of prowling dogs for which no individual owners can be made responsible. When the community pays the figure is hammered down. Seldom is the full injury repaired by money payment. In estimating the damages on sheep "worried" or killed by dogs, no account is taken of the harm done to the flock in general.

It is suggested that some member of the Legislature move next session for a return of all the payments made on the account stated, by the townships of the province during 1906. The aggregate would surely startle the Legislature into the necessity of more stringent legislation on the dog nuisance. What is required is a law permitting the shooting of any dog seen at large, at any time, without some person being in charge.

Parcel Postage.

A bill will be introduced into Parliament at the present session to establish a cheap parcel post system in Canada and whereby the Post Office shall collect on parcels. As this would enable mail order houses to send goods to any part of the country in competition with local retailers, the merchants of many towns are up in arms, and are striving to have the bill defeated. A petition was circulated among the business men on Saturday and was largely signed, the petitioners asking the local member to oppose the measure. The business men are wise in thus looking after their interests, as there is no doubt the proposal if it became law would in some cases ruin the retail merchant, especially in towns and villages close to the cities. The large departmental concerns have enough advantages now through the mail. This would particularly favor them. True it would be an additional revenue for the government, but would have a damaging effect upon mercantile interests in smaller towns and villages.

The Department of the Registrar-General of Ontario received from issuers of marriage licenses 672 affidavits made by applicants for licenses and 610 marriage licenses from officiating clergymen during the two following Christmas Days. This is fully double the number of affidavits and licenses received during the same period since the new regulations came into force, which requires issuers and clergymen to forward these forms forthwith to the Department of the Registrar-General.

THE POULTRY SHOW
 Lambton Co. Association Will Have a Winter Exhibition, Jan. 30, 31.

It was finally decided at the meeting of the board of directors of the Lambton County Poultry Association, held in the office of the Poultry Advocate on Saturday evening, to hold a winter show in Petrolia, on the last three days of January 29, 30 and 31. A short canvas among a few friends of the Association, had shown such a favorable inclination on the part of those seen to support an exhibition of this kind, that the prospect of financing the show and making a success of it, are exceptionally good.

It was decided, that for this year, at least, the prizes are to be awarded on the percentage plan, giving first prize birds 65 per cent., and second prize birds 55 per cent. of all the entry money paid in on each class.

In addition to the regular cash prizes, there will be a number of good cash specials, as well as a good list of valuable specials of other kinds. A handsome silver cup, has been offered to the Association by the Poultry Advocate, to be used as a sweepstake, and this will likely be offered for the four best birds of any breed in the show, entered by one exhibitor.

The secretary, reported having met a number of exhibitors from Ingersoll, St. Thomas and London, and had been promised an exhibit from each of those places, if their were any good specials offered, over and above the percentage prizes.

At one time the Lambton County Association had owned their own coops, but those had been sold, and they now have none on hand, so it was thought best for this season, to have each exhibitor send his birds in the coops in which they are to be shown. In a few cases, where birds come from a distance, coops will be provided, but as far as possible it is desired that the county exhibitors send the coops for their birds and any extra ones they may have on hand. Judging will be done by comparison, and the awards will be placed by W. McNeil, one of Canada's most popular, and competent judges. Exhibitors will feel assured of having their birds passed on by a thoroughly experienced judge, an important feature in a show.

Mr. Fraser's hall, opposite the Methodist church, has been secured for the show, and it will be a very suitable and convenient place for the purpose.

A meeting of the directors will be held every Saturday evening until the date of the show, in the office of the Poultry Advocate, and preparations will be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible.

These legal points will likely come up for consideration before organization is completed, and may result in a bye-election.

Among the numerous parties which hunted this season on the mountain was one joined by Frank Bryce, formerly of Watford, Ont., Charlie Keyser, of Strathroy, and George Manson, of Winnipeg. They started the night previous to the opening season so as to be in good time. They were well stocked with provisions for a 3 weeks trip. Fortune was with them on the second day at half past eight in the morning C. Keyser succeeded in falling a fine cow moose, and at four o'clock in the afternoon Bryce and Manson got two fine male elk. Bryce's elk having 8 prongs to a side, 5ft. 2in. in length. Manson's nearly as good being two years younger. All returning home the third day in good health and good spirits.

The death of Mr. Alfred Smith, Sr. occurred at his home on 18 S. R. on Saturday Jan. 5. The deceased who was in his 81st year was the oldest pioneer in this part of the country. Mr. Smith was born in England, Oct. 13th 1826 and came to Warwick in 1832 settling on the farm where he died, and so was a resident of this neighborhood for nearly seventy-five years. In 1852 Mr. Smith was married to Margaret Orr, and they had a family of ten children, nine of whom survive, five daughters and four sons.

The daughters are Mrs. Hiram Barnes, Theford, Mrs. J. McChesney Warwick, Mrs. J. D. Brown, Watford, Mrs. Rev. Hobbs, Kansas City, Mich., and Mrs. Stephen Perry, Warwick. The sons are William James, Luther, Arthur and John all of Warwick. Mr. Smith was a consistent member of Zion Cong'l church for many years and was respected by all who knew him. In politics he was a staunch Liberal all his life. Mrs. Smith survives him and lives on the homestead with the youngest son John. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. M. Kelly, the pallbearers were E. McGillicuddy, Jas. Cooper, R. McCormick, A. Bartram, P. Anderson and T. Luckham.

One of the oldest residents of the Township passed away last week at the home of his son-in-law, Jas. Squires, in the person of John Smith, J. P., at the advanced age of 91 years. Deceased was a native of Scotland coming with his parents to Canada when five years of age, settling in the County of Lanark, but for the past 62 years has been a resident of Lambton. For some time he was employed at King-

ston's saw mill in Warwick, afterwards removing to the townline of Plympton and Emskillen where he made a comfortable home for himself and family. Mrs. Smith, who was a Miss Young, predeceased him about sixteen years ago. A family of four daughters and three sons survive, Mrs. McIntyre and Mrs. Johnston, Sarnia, Mrs. R. Hayward, townline, Mrs. J. Squires, Brooke, James 3rd con. and Archie and Richard on the homestead. Mr. Smith was a well read man, a subscriber to the Globe for over 50 years, and always took a keen interest in the affairs of the day. He was one of H. M. Justices of the Peace for half a century and his decisions were just and reasonable. The funeral took place on the 3rd inst. to Wyoming cemetery and was conducted by the Rev. Hugh Watson, Baptist minister, Watford. Six grandsons acted as pallbearers. A memorial service was held in the Wyoming Baptist church on the Sunday following, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Watson.

The church was filled before the concert commenced and many had to stand in the porch through out the evening, but the very best order prevailed. Miss Ethel Anderson gave a good recitation which was enjoyed by all. Mr. P. R. Luckham, Watford, who is an old favorite with Zion audiences gave a few select numbers, which were highly appreciated. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Kelly, acted as chairman. Proceeds about \$50.

Enormous Fortunes.

Before the American Association for the advancement of Science, now in session in New York, Henry Laurens Call, of Washington, attacked the enormously large fortunes now being piled up by the capitalists. These had been gotten by dishonest means and at the present rate of increase the States will be owned by a handful of men. Among other things Mr. Call made the following statement that fifty years ago there were not fifty millionaires in the whole of the United States, and the combined fortunes did not exceed 1 per cent. of the then aggregate wealth of the nation. Sixteen years ago the combined fortunes estimated at 56 per cent. of our national wealth. To-day a bare 1 per cent. of our population owns practically 99 per cent. of the entire wealth of the nation. As a result of this wealth concentration industrial society is practically divided into the two classes, the enormously rich and the miserably poor; our 18,000,000 wage earners receive an average of \$400 per year; nine tenths of our business men are notoriously failures; our clergy receive an average annual salary of about \$500; the average of the educators of the land is even lower, and the income of other professional men in proportion, while of our 6,000,000 farmers one-third are tenants, and the homes of one-third of the remaining two-thirds are mortgaged and a debt burden is almost universal.

OPEN FOR SETTLEMENT.

Millions of Acres of Land to be Available for Settlers.

Ottawa, Jan. 3—The bill which is to be introduced by Mr. Oliver to amend the Dominion Lands Act proposes to throw open for settlement the odd numbered sections of Western lands with the right to the settlers to purchase 160 acres adjoining their homestead of a similar acreage. This privilege of pre-emption will also be extended to present settlers. It is estimated that there are 73,000,000 acres of land still available for settlement in the West, exclusive of land held by the railways and land companies.

Parkhill, Jan. 4—News of the death of Mr. Ernest Hastings in the collision near Topeka, Kan., is received here, his native town, with general regret.

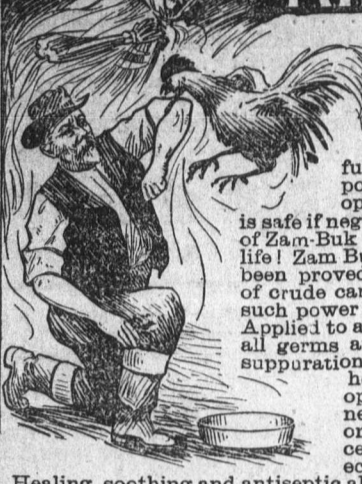
