Actuary Blackadar, However, Would Rather That Supt. Fitzgerald Explain-Companies Which Invest in Speculative Issues.

Ottawa, March 21 .- (Special.) -- Mr. Blackadar was in better condition today, but his admissions did not diminish in interest. The fact that directors of the Sun Life make a profit upon Illinois Traction stock purchased by the company at 61 and now quoted in Montreal at 98, was characterized as "an unfortunate mistake."

INSURANCE DEPT.'S VIEWS What Are They Going To Do About It?

The public of Canada cannot afford merely to sit down and watch the ugly facts of life insurance management being dragged from reluctant witnesses. They must take uncompromising steps to render impossible a recurrence of such a state of things as has been admitted by the national insurance

What is the present situation? It appears that the facts already confessed bear out all that has been suggested in this paper, and indicate that when the probe is really applied more facts will be discovered than have been unearthed by a department which the companies play with, and which seemed scarcely to have lost an opportunity of exhibiting its own feebleness. That The World's insistent demand for investigation should be justified in the eyes of the people is a matter of relatively small importance.

If it was left for a newspaper to compel the truth to be displayed in the light of day, and when it assumed risks and responsibilities from which others who ought to have assumed those risks and responsibilities shrank, what is the position of those highly honorable men who have lent their names to methods of business which, when you remember that it was the hard savings of hundreds of thousands of citizens that were concerned, are doubly wantly of public confidence? unworthy of public confidence?

FITZGERALD'S IMPOTENCE.

Herein is the most painful aspect of the whole wretched incident in national development. It would be a relief if it could be ignored, and its lessons left to work themselves out in practice. But it cannot be ignored. The superintendent of insurance has covered himself with everlasting discredit. His offenses of omission have not been due to a temporary lapse from duty, or from some excess of zeal, such as, in a comparatively inexperienced man, brought up unexpectedly against an emergency, may land him into trouble.

They have been the neglects of a man set veritably as a watchman a high place, who saw ever increasing abuses, extravagances and unjustifiable manipulation of funds. He was entrenched in a position from which no man could dislodge him so long as he was straight and fearless in the

After 20 years' experience, 20 years' feeding at the public crib, 20 years' enjoyment of the unsuspecting confidence of people who worked hard for their money; the superintendent of insurance is forced to admit that the safeguards were no safeguards, that expenditures have not produced results they were intended to secure, and that he has permitted unseen a stigma upon Canadian business to accumulate, which he is as powerless to wipe out as he was unwilling to prevent.

But, what about the directors? There are two classes of directors. One is made up of men who are after all the emoluments they can get—business men pure and simple, very pure, but not very simple. The other is composed of persons of eminent respectability and undoubted attainments in fields other than those in which the companies whose directors they become, intend to make their name and fame and wealth.

You can find scores of company directors who cheerfully admit that when they assumed office they knew nothing about the business they were supposed to direct, and that they trusted to the experienced men at the head of the concern, for guidance.

This is particularly true of insurance directors, because the whole subject is so hedged about with statistical technicalities, that even the simplest

policy issued by a great company often confuses able men, and is hardly ever thoroly read by him who buys it.

EXAMPLE OF LORD DUFFERIN

It would be unfair to ladle indiscriminate censure upon men of this second class, altho you cannot forget that from time to time there have

been disclosures of company dealings which have informed everybody of the special dangers to which dummy directors expose themselves.

GOVERNMENT REFUSES ANY RECOGNITION

NOTHING FOR S.A. VETERANS

Not Entitled to Have Pensions Supplemented - Strict Party Division - Liberals in Caucus Stand by the Indemnity.

Ottawa, March 21.-Ninety-seven to fifty-nine, a government majority of 38, was the result of the first division of the session.

It occurred on a motion offered by Mr. Brodeur (Dundas), who wanted the house to declare that it would be pleased to learn that Canadians who served as volunteers in South Africa and suffered total disability incurred in the service, "will receive recognition from their country." The motion was opposed by Sir Frederick Borden, who bluntly declared that when these men enlisted hey understood the contract which they were making and should abide by it. They now receive a pension from the British government according to

the British government according to the scale fixed by that government, and were not entitled to have it supplemented by Camada. The division on this proposition resulted as above, the vote being a strict party one.

Hon. William Templeman was introduced by the premier and Mr. Smith of Nanaimo. He shook hands with the Speaker and slid gracefully into the seat of the minister of inland revenue.

The Royal Victoria has 611 shareholders who may in certain eventualities be called upon to pay any actual cash difference between \$200,000 of capital paid-up in cash, and \$1,000,000 capital which has been subscribed. FRUIT GROWERS DISCUSS

Improved Marking Regulations and Procuring of Information From Abroad.

Ottawa, March 21.-(Special.)-The Dominion Fruit Growers' convention pened here yesterday. The chair was ccupied by Hon. Sydney Fisher, who pointed out that the provincial organizations were doing good work, but the purpose of a Dominion organization

purpose of a Dominion organization was to consider fruit questions of a national character, such as transportation and amendments to the Fruit Mark Act. For the sake of the diet alone he thought it was the duty of Canada to produce as much fruit as possible. The introduction of too many varieties was to be guarded against. There was not enough discrimination in the Fruit Marks Act between first and second grades.

A resolution was introduced that the fruit division be asked to issue monthly reports from May to August and semimonthly from September to December, which should include weather, general bushes, insects, fungus diseases, outlook for probable quantity of crop and market quotations for each of the provinces; the outlook or probable crop of apples in those countries to which Germany, France, South Africa, Mexica and other countries, and that Canadian representatives there be instructed to cable weekly the price ruling for apples and pears in these countries.


