

### THE HUSTLING POLITICIANS.

Mr. Oliver Arrives in the City—Mr. Burton as a Backer of the Third Party.

Mr. Oliver has just arrived in the city and is expected to disperse to their homes. Mr. Oliver Mowat, the new Minister of Justice, arrived at Toronto at 7 o'clock last evening and attended a dinner given at Government House in honor of the reception of his successor, Hon. A. S. Hardy, to the Premier of Ontario, Sir Oliver, before he goes East again, will likely arrange to remove his residence to the capital.

Hon. William Patterson, Minister of Customs, and Mr. William Gibson, M.P. for Lincoln, also came to the city last evening. They stayed over night at the Queen's.

Another gentleman deeply interested in the recent elections, who registered at the Queen's last night, was Mr. James L. Burton, the wealthy Barrie lumberman. Mr. Burton is one of O'Alton McArthur's chief supporters, and for years has been one of the Third party leader's biggest financial backers. It is interesting to know that Mr. Burton came very near running as a McArthurite candidate in Algoma.

Mr. McArthur urged him to stand, but his large business interests prevented him entering personally into politics. It is said that he had consented to run he would have been unopposed except by McDowell, the Conservative.

As Mr. Burton has large lumber interests throughout Algoma and as he is part owner of the White Line of steamers which ply between Algoma ports and other Northern lake points, he would have stood a good chance of carrying the seat.

Hon. J. M. Gibson returned from the East yesterday and attended the first meeting of the Hardy-Ross Cabinet held in the afternoon. Messrs. Ross and Gibson were the only two Ministers besides the Premier present, as Mr. Hardy is ill and the other members of the Government are out of town. It is likely that Mr. Gibson will within the next day or two become Commissioner of Crown Lands, Hon. W. D. Johnston taking the Provincial Secretaryship in his stead. Messrs. E. J. Davis and J. R. Stratton, the two aspirants to the vacant portfolio, were both up at the Parliament Buildings yesterday.

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### ANOTHER MOST APPALLING DISASTER OCCURS AT CLEVELAND, OHIO.

FERRY BOAT UPSETS IN THE RIVER

Fourteen Bodies Are Lying in the Various Morgues of the City.

The victims were members of a gang of ore handlers who were going to their homes in the evening. The boat was overcrowded in order that fares might be cheaper—mostly Germans and Poles with families.

Cleveland, July 16.—A most appalling disaster occurred here to-night at 7 o'clock. While a flat-bottomed ferry boat, loaded with between 40 and 50 laborers, was crossing the old river channel, it was capsized and all the men thrown into the channel, and between 15 and 20 drowned. The boat was very much overcrowded. Seven bodies have been taken from the water up to 10 p.m.

The men were all members of a gang of ore handlers, and were going to their homes. The life-saving crew was summoned, and within a short time seven of the unfortunate were brought to shore and taken to the morgue for identification. Those who escaped scattered in every direction, and it is uncertain just how many lives were lost, but 20 men are reported missing and the dragging of the channel is still in progress.

The crowding of the boat was due to the fact that the ore gangs pay just so much per trip on the ferry, and the more that get on the less cost to the passengers. The men were all Germans and Poles, and their families cannot speak English.

By 11 o'clock to-night 14 bodies have been recovered and taken to the various morgues.

### TWO KILLED BY ONE BOLT.

Senior Tillman's Daughter and Rev. E. A. Lee, Her Escort, Met an Awful Fate.

Lee, pastor of the Episcopal Church at Yorkville, were killed by the same bolt of lightning at Brevard, N.C., yesterday afternoon. They were caught in a main room and sought shelter under some bushes near which was a large oak tree. Miss Tillman was 20 years old.

### FIGHTING JOE MAY GET IT.

Attorney-General Simon Says Martin Has Nothing to Fear from Him.

Winnipeg, Man., July 16.—(Special.)—The re-count in Ligar constituency is concluded this morning and resulted in confirming the election of Attorney-General Simon, the Liberal candidate. He gained 11 on the re-count, his majority being 54.

Mr. Martin, it now turns out, rushed off to Ottawa on a false alarm. Premier Greenway did not go to Ottawa to get the vacant portfolio. He came back to Winnipeg, having only gone as far as Chicago. Mr. Greenway says he does not want the portfolio, though his friends say he might be coaxed into accepting it. Attorney-General Simon said to a friend: "Martin has nothing to fear from me." So it looks as if Fighting Joe will, after all, to become Cabinet Minister.

They Want a Local Man.

The Liberals of Saskatchewan held a meeting at Prince Albert last night to discuss Mr. Laurier's recent statement allowing him to resign and elect William Patterson of Brantford his successor. The request was not favorably considered, and it was evident that the feeling was strongly in favor of a local man.

The meeting finally adjourned without coming to a decision. If the Liberals of Saskatchewan finally do consent it will not be with the best grace.

### IS MR. VANDERBILT DYING?

Members of His Family Summoned to His Bedside—Heavy Rumor in Stocks.

New York, July 16.—Alfred and Gertrude Vanderbilt arrived at the Vanderbilt home from Newport at 7.45 to-night and shortly afterward numerous bicycle boys and messengers stood left the house in different directions. There is an apparently well defined rumor that the members of the family are being summoned to Mr. Vanderbilt's bedside.

The following bulletin was issued from the Vanderbilt mansion to-night by the physicians:

"10:15—Mr. Vanderbilt's condition shows no material change. He has passed a comfortable night."

Shortly before midnight Dr. Janeway left the Vanderbilt mansion. A few minutes later Dr. McLane sent out messages to the representatives of the press to the effect that Mr. Vanderbilt's condition was unchanged, that he was sleeping quietly and that no further bulletins would be issued until 9.30 o'clock to-morrow morning.

The illness of Mr. Vanderbilt was the great bear card which forced nearly every stock on the list to a lower level today. The heaviest losses of the day, of course, were in the Erie and the Erie stocks which the Vanderbilts control or are largely interested in.

Vanderbilt, in 1885.

### WILL STRETCH A ROPE.

Christian Hanson, a Tramp Swede, Murdered James Mullen at Segin Falls.

The Jury's Verdict Was Guilty.

Neither Judge Nor Jurymen Had Any Belief in the Insanity Plea.

Murdered Man's Wife Actually Identified the Man Who Struck Her Husband in Court—But an Hour's Examination Reached the Verdict—Sentence of Death to Be Pronounced Before Court Comes.

Perry Sound, Ont., July 16.—The trial of Christian Hanson, the Swede charged with the murder of James Mullen, was resumed this morning. The Crown was satisfied that the identity of the murdered man, as also his companionship with Hanson at the place and up to the time of the murder.

During the adjournment of the court at noon to-day the prosecution had two shirts which were worn by the prisoner in court this morning, taken off him, and producing the garments in court this afternoon, had them positively identified by the murdered man's wife as being those worn by her husband.

The only evidence offered by the defense was that of the jailor, the jail surgeon and Dr. Watson, a local physician. The testimony of these witnesses was intended to prove the probability of insanity on the part of the prisoner, brought about by epilepsy, but both medical men could give no positive testimony from their short observation of the prisoner.

The argument of the prisoner's counsel, Mr. H. H. Haight, was to impress upon the minds of the jury, the great improbability of one of sane mind committing a deed such as a murder without apparently greater motives.

Mr. Heyd, for the Crown, clearly reviewed the evidence and presented a strong argument for conviction. Justice Ferguson began his address by stating that he had carefully examined the evidence. His address occupied one hour's time. It could not be given in full, but it was strongly against the prisoner and strongly against the insanity plea.

After being out for an hour and a quarter, the jury brought in a verdict of "Guilty."

The Crown prosecutor moved for the sentence of the Court, and the Judge, Mr. Justice Ferguson, said it would give some time during the sitting of the court.

The prisoner appeared quite to realize his position.
