

The educational features were entering upon a new era. The subject of medical missionaries was treated at length. The home missions were flourishing, but the evil of too many men in the field was still to the fore. A Klondike mission had been established, but was sufering from lack of funds. The young people's forward movement had been fruitful of benefit to missionary work. They had contributed over \$0000 during the past year. This was the last item of the quadrennial report. Other recommendations urged by the present committee were that the Mission Fund be not divided into home and foreign, but that it be maintained as one whole.







The area under wheat is 9,119,800 acres, or about 23 per cent. of that of the whole Empire. The reports as to extent of failure are rather contradictory, and difficult to estimate. It says: This confirms the news that all districts of Russia have not been favored with a bounteous harvest. The correspondent at Rostoffon-Don writes that owing to late harvest and wet weather deliveries of grain have been very small. The same report comes from Odessa.

France—The Paris correspondent of The News, and 27, advises: The wheat crop will be more than sufficient to meet the consumptive demand and to reconstruct the exhausted stocks. He says that the big advance in flour which occurred about that date was due to the small stock and the difficulty of obtaining the high standard required for contract flour from new native wheat.

Roumania—A very favorable harvest report from Braila makes the crops of wheat, barley and rye excellent without exception. The News' own correspondent says that the wheat yield is less than anticipated.

Germany—The Royal Statistical Bureau of Frussia gives the condition of all crops in the monarchy as a full average.

Belgium and Holland—Harvest about finished and crops very satisfactory.

Austria-Hungary—The Minister of Agriculture gives the wheat crop of the Dual Empire as 23 million quarters, against 16 million quarters in 1807, The year's crop is a bare average.

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


