Mr. Beasley was spoken to about the matter, and he said he destroyed the letter before the meeting, as he thought it might have been a forgery, and he did not want to read anything in public detrimental to any member of the Board. Mr. Magill says Mr. Beasley knows his writing and knows he is a responsible citizen and a heavy taxpayer. Mr. Pratt is also a member of the Board of Governors of the General Hospital, and the article mentioned in the above letter has caused much talk in business and religious circles. THE EXHIBITION.

Has the Exhibition grown beyond the capacity of the town? It looks indeed as if it had. The feature of the week just drawing to a close has been the crowd of visitors, not less than the Exhibition. Never before has there been such an army of people to be cared for as took possession of the city this week. The town was taxed to its utmost in handling and providing accommodation for the myriads of strangers.

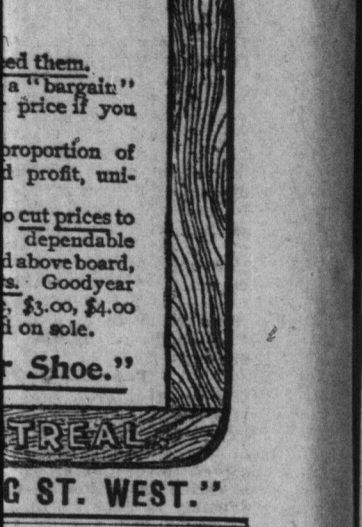

The World's Wheat Supply. Brookman's Corn Trade News, Aug. 20, gives the following figures showing the world's available supply of wheat in the following years:

The News has no reliable data as to stocks of wheat prior to harvest of 1898.

With respect to India, it credits 1897-98 1898, and assumes for 1898-99, the same quantity as for March, 1898.

The figures for Australia and Africa are not included in above, but the News says that the yield this season promises to be between 2 and 3 million quarters larger than last year.

With respect to the deficiency of reserves in farmer hands in Europe and America, the News says that it must be considerable, but as there are no reliable means of forming an estimate, it leaves it to its readers to form their own estimate.

While there is the certainty of abundant supplies in the future, they are remarkably scant at present, and the battle between demand and supply is rather contradictory.

By the end of September, either the buyer or the seller must succumb.

Business—The New York statement showing the acreage of the various crops in the seven Governments which have reported failure. The area under wheat is 5,119,000 acres, or about 23 per cent. of that of the whole Empire.

Belgium and Holland—Harvest about finished and crops very satisfactory.

Austria-Hungary—The Minister of Agriculture gives the wheat crop of the Dual Empire as 25 million quarters against 18 million quarters in 1897. The year's crop is a bare average.

Argentina—Correspondent writes from Buenos Ayres, Aug. 2: From all parts of the Republic excellent accounts come in regard to the new wheat plant, which has had an excellent start. A few days ago the World contained a report that the acreage under wheat this season in New South Wales is 1,500,000 acres.

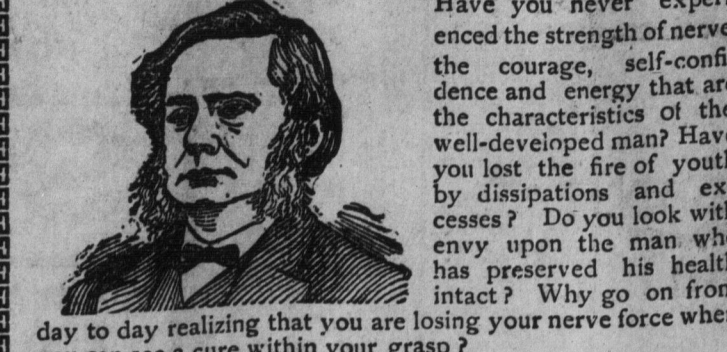

**TROUBLE MAY COME YET.**  
Philippine Insurgent Leaders Not Getting Along Like a Peacemaker  
Manila, Sept. 9.—The attitude of the Philippine insurgent leaders is daily becoming more dangerous. So open is their opposition to the American authorities that the situation is strained and reconciliation may be difficult. What makes the situation the more troublesome is the undisguised rivalry between the followers of General Aguinaldo, the self-proclaimed dictator, and General Pio Pilar, who covets the honor which Aguinaldo has acquired.  
General Pio Pilar is in command of the insurgent troops stationed south of Manila. He uses them in a way that will be most annoying to Aguinaldo, and at the same time makes every effort to show his utter disregard of the American officials.  
His forces continue to patrol the city, encouraging lawlessness in every direction. They are constantly among the American troops who are engaged in the difficult task of preserving order.  
Aguinaldo's course is so less annoying. He no longer attempts to conceal his hostility to the officials who represent the United States, and yesterday issued an order prohibiting his soldiers from entering the American lines. This course was probably deemed necessary in order to prevent them from becoming so well disposed towards Americans as to destroy his power by repudiating his leadership. The attitude of the rivals cannot fall in the end to injure the cause of Philippine independence. Certainly it will prevent the presentation of a strong case before the Paris Peace Commission in behalf of the Philippines.  
**Put Up a Job on His Wife.**  
Yesterday Magistrate Denton sent George Cantwell to jail for 60 days for not supporting his young wife. In the court the other day Cantwell made charges against his wife that she was keeping company with other men. After hearing the evidence, His Worship came to the conclusion that Cantwell had conspired with a friend to put up the job.

**JUSTICE OSLER UPHHELD.**

Durham, Ont., Sept. 9.—Mr. David Jackson, Jr., died suddenly yesterday morning, Sunday evening last Dr. Jamieson, the family physician, was called in and found him suffering from an acute attack of pneumonia, but in spite of everything that could be done the patient rapidly sank. Mr. Jackson was a lifelong Conservative and for several terms filled the Mayor's chair.  
**Case of William McMillan.**  
Hon. David Mills, Minister of Justice, is reading every word of the evidence now in the case of William McMillan, who was convicted in 1896 of setting fire to the Osgoode Building, 10,000 citizens of all classes in Toronto in 1896 asked for McMillan's release, as there were very strong opinions of his innocence in town. McMillan's counsel, Mr. P. L. Church, has returned from Ottawa, and besides has collected new material and new evidence for the Department, and about all the Senators and members in the Toronto district and a score of M.P.'s, who have read a verbatim copy of the report, are strongly urging his release. A decision will be arrived at in a couple of weeks and Mr. Church, who has worked hard on the case for six months, expects Lord Aberdeen will put his hand to a pardon before many days are over.
