NO LONGER TO BE EAST ABOUT AS TO FATE OF THE LEGATIONS

Europeans Were Hard Pressed By the Boxers, Made a Desperate Sortie and Then Bravely Met Their Awful Fate—All Went to Death. Sir Robert Hart Wired to His Wife on July 5: "Our People, Including the Women, Are in the Legations; Prepare to Hear the Worst"—Did Sheng Doctor the News Which Came to Shanghai?—Allies Fighting Hard at Tien Tsin.

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Chinese Government Anxious. Under date of July 13, the Governor of Shantung wired as follows: "Native soldiers and Boers have been attacking the legations for some hours, but have not yet effected an entrance. They are now all bombarding, with large cannon to make a breach for a heavy onslaught. I fear that all the ministers and the Government as well are in great danger. The Government is intensely anxious."

Chinese Troops Deserted. "Unfortunately many of Prince Ching's troops deserted to the Boers, and Ching fell and was supposed to have been killed, but as the search for his body was unsuccessful it is now believed, he was only wounded and carried off and secreted by his faithful retainers."

IT IS CRITICAL AT TIEN Tsin. Chinese Have Retaken the Arsenal Which Was Taken by the Allies. A Week Ago. Washington, July 13.—The Japanese legation here to-day received the following telegram from Tien Tsin, transmitted under date of July 9, transmitting advice received from Che Foo, under date of July 7:

Repeated Night Attacks. Through the night repeated attacks were made on the legation, but they were invariably repulsed, with heavy losses on the part of the Chinese. The Chinese were driven back to the legation, and the Chinese were gradually withdrawing. But just then Gen. Tung Fuh Shiang arrived from the vicinity of Tien Tsin, with a large force. He had been ordered to attack the legation buildings were in ruins. Many of the buildings had fallen at their posts, and the night had been left to take refuge in the legation buildings, which they entered and were massacred.

ALL FOREIGNERS WERE KILLED. This is the Purport of an Official Telegram from the Government of Shantung. Shanghai, July 13.—An official telegram was received to-night from the Governor of Shantung, stating that a breach was made in the wall of the legation, and all the foreigners were killed.

LEGATIONS IN PERIL JULY 7. In the Last Message From Sheng to the Minister. Washington, July 13.—Such news as came to Washington to-day from China was distinctly bad. It consisted of a cablegram from Mr. Sheng to the Imperial Director of Posts and Telegraphs at Shanghai, and according to the Minister was in reply to the urgent message he himself had sent yesterday, stating to that effect, asking him to try to secure some news from the Chinese capital. This cablegram Minister Wu regarded as sufficient to warrant him to carry in person directly to Secretary Hay, who was waiting at his home for news. The message as received from the cipher was as follows:

Chinese Statements Not Reliable. "Give no credence to the statements of the situation sent by the Chinese Government to its Ministers abroad. The present outrages are the result of the weak and vacillating policy of the powers in the past. We urge immediate, energetic and concerted action."

Fire Opened on British Legation. "At 6 o'clock on the evening of July 9," says the correspondent, "the Boers opened with artillery upon the British legation, where the foreigners were concentrated. For two hours the walls were battered with shot and shell, and huge breaches were effected in them. Then a general advance was ordered and the Chinese infantry, volleys constantly, moved toward the legation. The fire of the defenders, however, was so accurate and steady that borders of Chinese soldiers and Boers broke and fled in the wildest confusion, leaving large num-

HORRIBLE DOUBLE TRAGEDY IN THE COUNTY OF HALDIMAND

Chatham, Ont., July 13.—The people of this county were startled yesterday morning when they heard of the horrible death of James Swick and his wife, an old couple about 70 years of age. The old man first killed his wife and then put an end to his own existence. The scene of the tragedy took place in the house in Seneca, about four miles from the village of Canfield and ten miles from Cayuga.

Old Man Had Acted Strangely. The old man had acted strangely for some time past, but the family thought little about it. On Friday at noon their son Harvey went to the field to cut wheat, leaving the old couple alone in the house. When he returned at night, a dreadful spectacle was presented to him. The mother was lying dead with her head horribly bruised, apparently by a hammer, and the father was lying with his head almost shot off, by means of a shot gun which he was holding in his hand. There was no doubt as to the cause of the tragedy.

FIVE BLOCKS WERE BURNED. The Business Section of Prescott, Arizona, Went Up in Smoke on Saturday Night. Prescott, Arizona, July 13.—Five blocks worth over \$1,000,000 of real estate, started at 10:45 o'clock last evening, and burned until 3 o'clock this morning, when the fire was extinguished. WHAT IS REVEALED

A Toronto Babe Had Been Buried in Humberville Cemetery Without the Caretaker Knowing It.

BEFORE ITS SUPERNATURAL BURIAL

Coroner's Inquest Held at Nurse's Hotel.

Humber Bay, July 15.—For the want of a dollar, Mrs. Summerville, a Toronto undertaker, buried an infant in Humberville Cemetery, without notifying the caretaker, and leaves himself liable to be prosecuted for a serious offence.

Last night an inquest was held upon the remains of a month-old baby girl, at the Nurse's Hotel, before Coroner A. G. Rogers, and it was during these proceedings that this fact came out. It appears that about May 2 the infant died at a baby farm in the city. Undertaker Summerville, who had buried the infant in the cemetery, had been ordered to make the interment for \$5, which was paid to him. He took the remains home, and left them in his cellar until June 20, when, owing to difficulties in business, he began to be afraid that, in the event of the corpse being searched, the body would be found. He then decided to bury the child; but as he could not find the caretaker at Humberville Cemetery, he decided to bury the child in the cemetery unknown to anyone.

He did so at an early hour in the morning, and placed the body in a coffin, which he carried to the cemetery, and buried it in a grave. He did not notify the caretaker, and the child's name was not on the list of burials. 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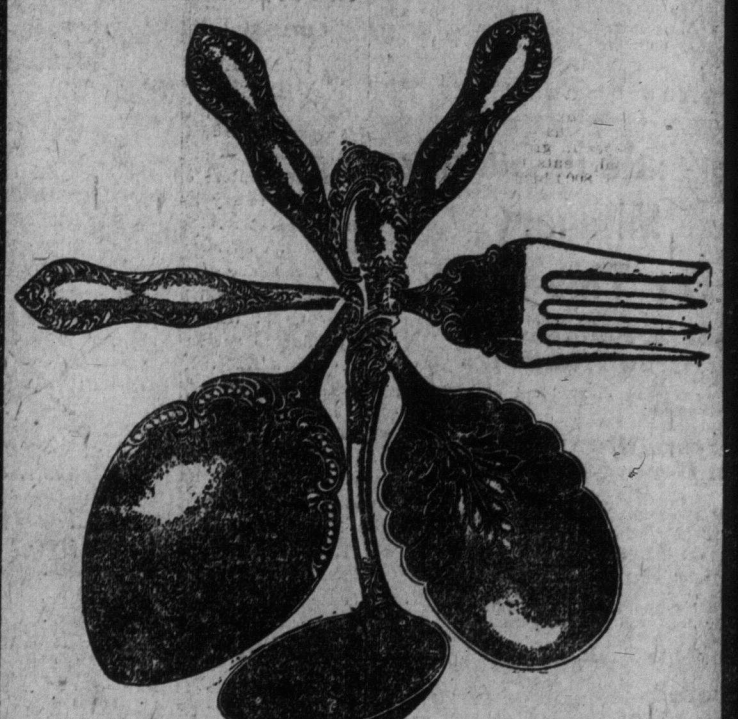
