

ENGLAND CHANGED BY SEA. Waves Wash Away Chalk Cliffs at Says There is No Change in Political

London, Sept. 2.-Ramsgate visitors J. P. Whitney, M.L.A., arrived in the ing the havoc wrought to Britain by burg, and is stopping at the Queen's.

ing the havoc wrought to Britain by the sea, and especially of observing the progress of a splendid example of the work of sea defence.

The Isle of Thanet, on which Ramsgate stands, notably illustrates the work of the sea in ruthlessly taking away with one hand giving back with the other. It is not many hundred years since Thanet was really an island. Ships used to sail to London thru a great channel from Sanwich to Reculver instead of round by Ramsgate and Margate. But the sea slited up the estuary and put the port of Sandwich, which, 400 years ago, was a sea port, a mile and a half back inland.

At the same time it cut and washed away the cliffs of the northern side, and is doing so at the rate of two feet a year at the present time.

Just lately the sea has been eating away at Ramsgate's promenade, and in the last ten or twelve years has taken away bodily 600 feet of cliff-top promenade twelve to twenty feet wide. When it is considered that the cliffs are seventy to eighty feet high, the enormous amount of erosion will be faintly understood.

CAPE COLONY RAILWAYS.

Government Roads Show Gains in Passenger and Freight Traffic.

Railroad Gazette: Following the de-

claration of peace and the resumption of traffic thru South Africa, the government roads show in their annual report for the last calendar year large gains in both passenger and freight traffic, altho some of the gains, caused primarily by the return of settlers, are doubtless abnormal. The lines have been greatly crowded with passengers so that the rolling stock has been insufficient to meet the demands and it has been impossible to offer inducements to the public to travel during the holiday period, in spite of the hardship occasioned to those living in the up-country towns, such as Kimberley, and accustomed to making summer trips to the shore. This refers rather to special long haul traffic than to local excursion traffic, however, Kimberley being nearly as far from the coast at Cape Town as Chicago is from New York. But it is thought that if the labor difficulty in the Transvaal can be satisfactorily settled there will be a sufficient development in mining to keep the thru traffic at or above its present level for some years to con

Total Mileage.

The total mileage of the government lines in Cape Colony for 1902 was 2318, as against 2135 in 1901, four extensions having been opened during the year. Gross earnings from all lines were £5,291,627, comparing with £3,852,871 in 1901, an increase of £1,438,756. It will be seen, therefore, that the line arned about £2281 per gross mile, as against £1804 in 1901 and £668 four years ago. Considering the thinly populated territory thru which many of the lines pass, this showing is excellent. By way of comparing traffic density with that of another British colonial railroad system, it is interesting to note that the government railroads of India earned about £722 per mile of line during 1902, while those of the Cape were earning £2281. The comparison is in many respects unfair to India, but serves to show how considerable a traffic has been built up at the Cape of Good Hope.

The capital cost of the Cape railways at the close of 1902 is given as £24,031,778, as against £22,469,389 at the close of 1901. This year shows a slightly lower capital cost per mile for the current year than for the year previous. The total interest charges on capital expenditure, assuming the treasury rate at 3 3-4 per cent., amount to £868,278.

Working expenses were £3,779,256 during the year, as against £2,875,571 Total Mileage,

rate at 3 3-4 per cent., amount to £868,278.

Working expenses were £3,779,250 during the year, as against £2,875,571 in 1901, leaving a credit balance of £1,512,371, subject to fixed charges. The balance available after payment of these charges were £644,093, as against £147,581 in 1901. Included in working expenses is a charge of £584. 721 for maintenance of way and buildings, which comes to about £1292 a mile, reduced to American currency. In addition, £531,761 was spent for new works. track improvement, additional rolling stock, etc., and was charged to revenue—an extremely creditable showing.

In company with the experience of American managers, comment is made on the fact that there has been a general increase in wages along all lines, which has tended to bring up working expenses. Damage occasioned by wet weather, owing to an insufficient supply of tarpaulins with which to cover freight loaded on the prevailing type

weather, owing to an insufficient supply of tarpaulins with which to cover freight loaded on the prevailing type of open car, is an item not paralleled in this country, however; it cost the Cape government railways over \$21,000 in the year under review. The supply of cars, both passenger and freight, was quite insufficient to handle traffic during the year but the management hesitates to undertake to supply the demand at once owing to the likelihood that much of the present traffic may be temporary in its nature. may be temporary in its nature. A gondola car of 70,000 lbs. capacity has been approved and fifty of these are to be ordered at once,

The Cape railways are divided into three systems, known as the Western, Midland and Eastern, exclusive of the line in Rhodesia, Natal, etc., with which connections are made. On these three systems there are now 469 locomotives in service, and the comments on the varying results obtained with locomo-tives of English and of American manufacture are interesting. Ten eightcoupled locomotives, with four-wheelfacture are interesting. Ten eight coupled locomotives, with four-wheeled pilot trucks, built by Neilson, Reid & Co., from designs furnished from the Cape, are working on the Western system, three on the Midland and nine on the Eastern. They are reported as giving satisfaction. These lines are narrow gauge (3 ft. 6 in.) and the engines are thought to give about the maximum in power obtainable for that gauge, with a narrow fire-box placed between the wheels, since a longer box cannot be properly fixed. There are also seven eight-coupled consolidation Schenectady engines on the Western system and seven on the Midland. They are equipped with two-wheeled pilot trucks. The chief locomotive superintendent reports that their work is, in some respects, rough, and that they were troublesome to erect; but that taking all things into consideration, they are good engines. 

Wheat-Reports of a showery condition in the northwest and higher caples from Liverpool and Paris aroused all the buillish inthusiasm of our speculators. Sentiment is strongly in favor of higher prices, and as we have frequently said, it only requires a little encouragement to start a general buying movement among traders. The basis of the buils' argument is that the world's crop is short several hundred million bushels by comparison with list year, and this, with the small supply of old grain, would seem to indicate that all the good wheat in the world will be wanted by consumers before another crop is harvested. Present conditions seem to show that during the past three years the world's demand for wheat has overtaken the production. Wheat is now being steadily exported from the Pacific coast to Asia, and this prevents California wheat from going to Europe in large quantities, as was the case ten years ago. All indications seem to be that we are working to a higher range of values, and the declines from time to time will be only temporary.
