

THE MEN THE FARMER SENDS TO

PARLIAMENT. The World of yesterday contained a chapter of accidents, including the killing of two young women at Oakville by a fast train of the Grand Trunk at an unprotected crossing. The report says that the train was running very fast, that a station house and cars somewhat obstructed the view, and that while the buggy managed to get across the tracks, the horse, suddenly "rattled," backed into the flying train, and two valuable lives were lost.

The World has not any doubt but what it can be shown that too many of our farmers entrust their families with horses badly trained and liable to frighten under conditions of this kind, But, granting all that, does it not still remain that the farmer is entitled to some consideration in the way of reasonable protection of the lives of himself and his family and his animals at these kind of crossings? Why should a railway train be allowed to run thru a thickly peopled portion of the country, say right in a town, at the rate of 50 miles an hour over a level crossing without any protection There should be gates, and certainly if not gates there should be electric alarm bells, and protections of his kind should always be where there is

a double track or more than two tracks.

For years now a little half dozen men in parliament have been trying to make the fight for the farmers and the farmers' lives in connection with railway crossings; but they have been opposed most of all by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his government, his minister which he has been placed in the way of improved legislation in this direction. > Among the more interesting of these forecasts is one which ascribes to Japan a proposal for the neutralization of Vladivostock, coupled with an understanding on her part not to fortify Port Arthur. Inherently there is nothing improbable in the supposition-on the contrary from a Japanese point of view it would no doubt be eminently satisfactory. The possession of Port Arthur, however valuable it may be strategically, would be a source of weakness than than of strength. Japan's interests would be infinitely better served were the whole territory neutralized, but if that is impossible she is better protected by supremacy at sea than by the occupation of fortified places on land.

Russia's reverses have been largely due to the exigencles of Port Arthur, and the blow to her prestige, which its loss involved. Japan would be in similar plight if by any chance she should lose command of the eastern seas. The neutralization of Vladivostock on the other hand would deprive Russia of her naval depot, and of an important place of vantage for the conduct of maritime operations. It would not prevent her making full use of the harbor for commercial purposes. But would the Russian government consent to this limitation of authority? Probably not at this stage of the game. The proposition is, however, one which may be heard of again in connection with Russia's aspirations after more convenient outlets. It is her political designs, not her trade necessities, which cause trouble thruout the world.





Dead Insects Dropped Into Food of Zoo Inmates and Several Are Dead.

New York, July 27.—Several animals in the New York Zoological lark have been killed by arsenic polloging in an effort to aid the animal house of files. The dead animals are a fox, an Arctic fox, a bush tailed wallaby, a nine-banded armadillo, an angora guinea pls. a Dulphin phalander, or Austrian op-possum. The animals were killed by eating food into which flies, their god-ies swollen with arsenic poisoning, nad dropped Blame attaches to Dr. Blair, who has

charge of the animal house, for the death of the animals.

Last Friday he determined to start a crusade against the flies, and posted notices about the grounds asking the curators and keepers to do all in their power to help him. He then took several pieces of paper and covered them with arsenic. These he placed in bowls of water settings he wilden of water, setting a bowl in front of every cage in the animal house. As soon as William Halliday, the head keeper, heard what had been done, he warned Dr. Blair and told William T. Halliday that the animals would be killed Director Halliday how. killed. Director Halliday, however, lefused to interfere, and the bowls of arsenic water were left in front of the

cages.
Caldwell closed the house as usual on Friday night, and the animals were then in good condition. When he open-ed it on Saturday morning he found ed it on Saturday morning he found six animals dead. The bodies of the animals were badly swollen and they displayed all the evidence of arsenic

poisoning.
