



Standard Oil shares have recently declined 110 points, while in seven months' time there has been a break of 192 points.

Standard Oil is closely held by "insiders" and has never been listed on any
stock exchange.

A break of 192 points in seven months
is a shrinkage of over \$187,000,000 in the
market valuation of the \$98,000,000 outstanding stock.

One reason why an ordinary movement
in Standard Oil passes without comment
is that it takes a break of a hundred
points more or less to seriously affect the
investment value of the stock.



Any pressons who may be aggrieved by their findings thereafter, may at the expiration of six months petition the Superior Court sitting in equity, which may alter, annul or affirm the Commissioners' order. This remedial measure ought to protect not only the fish, but the reasonable interests of the mill owners as well.






