BOARD OF HEALTH NEEDS THE MONEY

Secretary Burns Tells the Amount of the Board's Income and How it is Expended--Not Enough Funds for Effective Work.

In view of the fact that the county council has not granted the increase in the estimates asked for by the Board of Health, the Times has instituted inquiries to ascertain what the sources of revenue of the board are. Secretary Burns, in response to inquiries made yesterday stated that the amount received from the county council has been \$4,000 per year. In addition to this they received last year \$84, from milk licenses, and \$6 for the rent of poles, from the New Brunswick Telephone Company, while the provincial government has borne half the expense of smallpox cases.

One was from Moncton to Halifax, and the other was from St. John to the main line of the transcontinental to St. John. The Calgary branch was also struck out. The bill will come up again on Tuesday next.

A BEAUTIFUL WOMAN BURGLAR IS JAILED

MANCHESTER, N. H., May 9--In the superior court here, Glad G. Gunerstrom and Haines Gunerstrom, his handsome wife, were sentenced to not less than four nor more than nine years in state prison for burglarizing the residence of J. Frank Baldwin in January. Five other counts were continued. Both retraced their steps to not guilty. The arrest here of Mrs. Gunerstrom and the apprehension in Everett, Mass., of her husband on Feb. 5, followed by confessions of a number of breaks, stopped the careers of two of the cleverest crooks who ever operated in this state. Exceptional personal beauty and great daring make Mrs. Gunerstrom the most picturesque burglar New England has known for a long time. She confessed to adventures that would have made scores of male crackmen hesitate. She is an expert with a "jimmy"; she has climbed over transoms and has passed through rooms where persons were asleep to get their valuables. A dozen times she has taken her life in her hands. The charges against the woman were for breaks into the house of J. F. Baldwin, Lizzie McDonald and Ellen B. Hucks, all of which happened within two weeks. When arrested she had jewelry taken from the Baldwin house and a watch stolen at the time of the McDonald break, discovered in a Boston pawnshop, and a ring taken at the Hucks break. Later other jewelry were found where she had been robbing.

MOVE FOR CLEMENCY

MONCTON, N. B., May 10 (Special)--The feeling in the case of the young girl named Amey, sentenced by Police Magistrate Kay a few days ago on a charge of stealing a diamond ring, is such that it is believed that she will be granted clemency. The girl, Gallagher, has resented in the prisoner being taken from the county jail on bail. Since her release was started, money subscribed and counsel engaged to take the matter up. Yester day, E. McDonald, of Sables, sent to Dorchester and made a successful application to Judge Landry to liberate the girl on bail. The girl's father arrived in the city from Springfield yesterday. The case will now be taken up before Judge Kay on appeal. It is claimed that the girl was given two stiff sentences, being given three months. Other moves in the case, it is said, are to be made today. A house belonging to Mrs. Myles fell into the water at Indiantown the afternoon. After some difficulty the animal was extricated.

CANADIAN ROBBED BY THIEVES OF NEW YORK

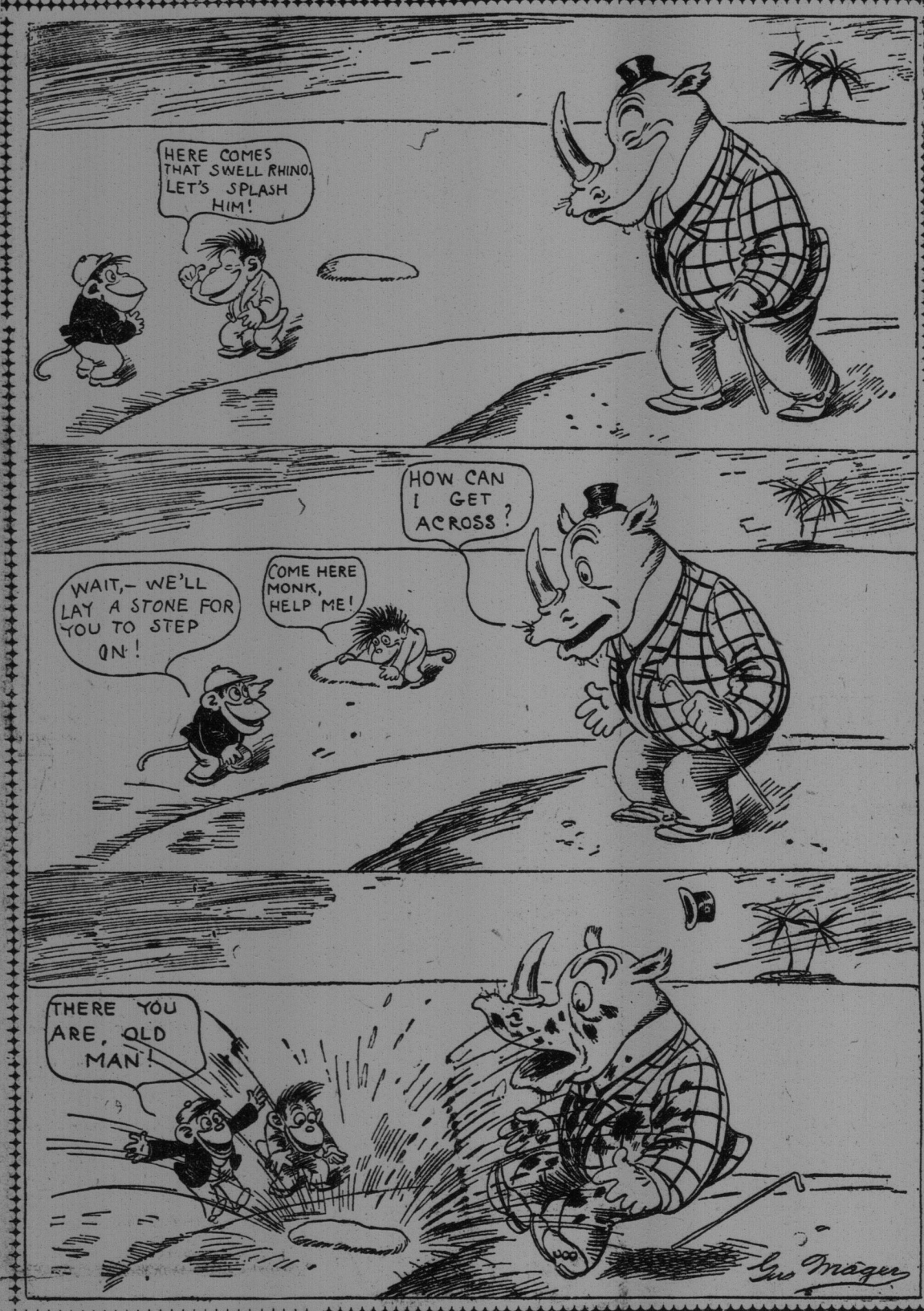
NEW YORK, May 10--The World this morning says--Hardly a spot in New York is more closely watched for thieves than the Grand Central station, yet a daring and successful robbery was committed there yesterday afternoon. R. H. Raccicot is a salesman for one of the assay jewelry firms in New York. He lives in St. Johns, Que., and travels through Canada booking orders from merchants. He carries his samples, watches, chains, and other jewelry, in a case which weighs 75 pounds. His outfit is valued at \$3,000. He went to the Grand Central station yesterday to buy a ticket for Montreal, intending to get a dinner and take the 7:00 P.M. train. At the ticket window he put down the heavy bag and counted out the fare, put the ticket in his wallet, and then turned to pick up his case of samples. It was gone. Evidently he had been followed by thieves who knew his occupation and the value of the contents of his bag. The salesman found a policeman to whom he told his story. The bluecoat hurried the victim to two detective agencies on duty, and all the doormen were stationed, to see that the bag, if still in the building, was not carried out. The thieves must have left the building however, by the time Raccicot noticed his loss. Information of the robbery was telephoned to police headquarters and detectives at all ferries were directed to keep the police in touch, after communicating with a member of his firm, took his train for Montreal.

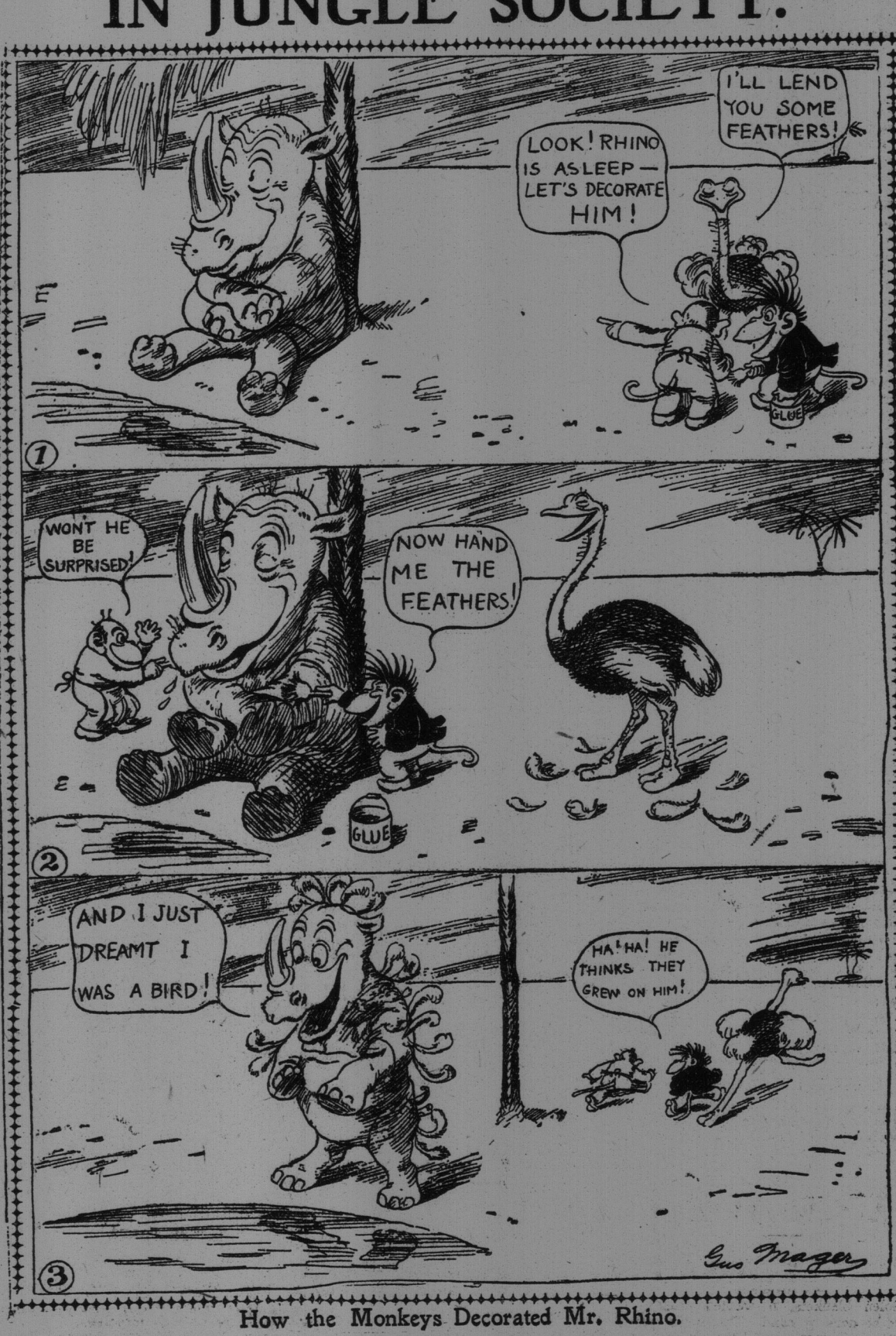

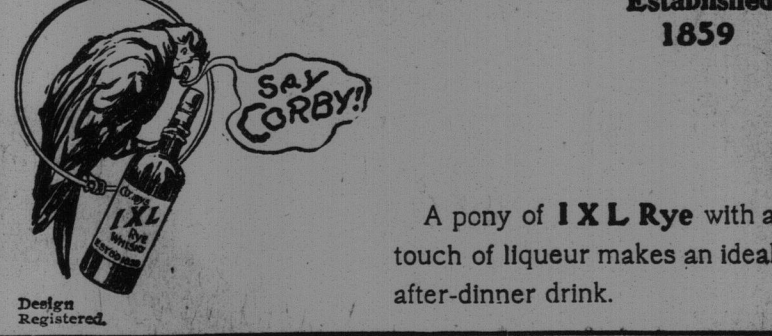

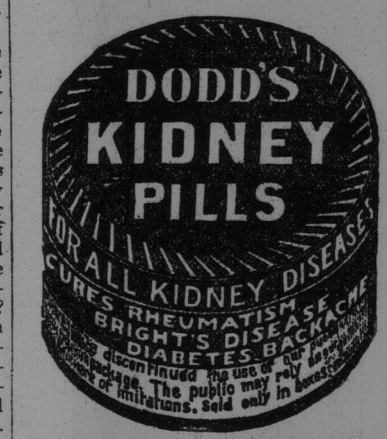
