MINUTE OF PROCEEDINGS.

FORTY-SIXTH REPORT

At the Annual Meeting of the Pictou Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, held in Prince Street Hall, Pictou, on Thursday evening the 26th October, 1871, Rev. James Bayne, D. D., in the chair.

The Chairman opened the Meeting by reading the 19th Psalm, and the Rev. Wm. Brown offered prayer.

The Secretary, Rev. Mr. Herdman, then read the Committee's Annual Report.

On motion of Rev. D. C. Moore, seconded by Mr. William Jack, it was

Resolved, That the Report be adopted, published, and circulated, under the superin-tendance of the Committee.

Sang Missionary Hymn.

The Report of the Sub-Committee on British American Bible Union was read by the Secretary, and after explanation by Mr. Russell, Bible Agent, and some discussion, it was moved by Mr. William Jack, and seconded by Mr. John D. McKenzie, that the Roport be received and adopted, which being put to vote passed.

The Accounts of the Treasurer and Depository were then presented and read, and on motion of Mr. J. J. McKenzie, seconded by Mr. William Jack,

Resolved, That the Accounts, now read, be received and published along with the Report.

On motion of Rev. E. McCurdy, seconded by Mr. Brown, it was

Resolved, That this Meeting acknowledge, with devout gratitude, the goodness of God in the success which has attended the Society's efforts, for the circulation of the Scrip-tures, during another year, in every land, especially among the troops of Germany and France, and in Rome, and express a hope that the Christian Church will not shrink from the responsibility which such success entails.

Sang 17th, 18th, and 19th verses of 72nd Psalm.

On motion of Mr. Russell, seconded by Mr. John Ross, it was

Resolved, That in view of these openings in Europe, and in other lands, which God, in his Providence, has been presenting, we recognize a call to circulate the Scriptures, as extensively as possible, till every nation shall have, in its own language, the story of redeeming love.

After nominating the Officers, for the ensuing year, and singing the Dismission Hymn, the Chairman closed the meeting by pronouncing the Apostolic Benediction.

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REPORT

PICTOU AUXILIARY,

IN CONNECTION WITH THE

B. and F. Bible Society, for October, 1871.

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Since our last meeting for a similar purpose in this place, two years have well nigh elapsed, the reason of which delay is that a resolution was passed at our last Anniversary in February, 1870, to the effect that the time of meeting be changed from Winter to Fall; and to avoid two meetings in in the one year, no other course was open but to postpone holding the next till the present time; whether wisely or not this change was adopted, time will show. Within these years, grave events have taken place in the old World. There have been wars, national and civil, and the boundaries of empires have changed. The dogma of Infallibility was declared by the head of the Roman Catholic Church, at the close of 1870, and there followed and still ensue important changes. Rome is no longer in the possession of the Pope, it is now the Capital of Italy, under Victor Emmanael, the King; and thus has been effected, what was long threatened, a severance between the temporal and spiritual power of the Head of that Church. But that is not all, a way has been prepared for Bible circulation, within the heart of the Papal Dominions, and now both Protestant Churches are erected and the Scriptures distributed in Rome, no man forbidding. Can the reader of the Bible, or lover of freedom hear that statement without emotion, without gratitude to the Divine Being that has brought to pass so wonderful an event, fraught with such immense consequences to thousands of immortal souls, and so promotive of the cause of truth? If Churches and Societies do not now persevere, they have only themselves to blame: a door shut since the Reformation has been opened in our day, by the All-wise Ruler, and it belongs to Bible Agents and Ministers of the Word, to go in and possess the land, in the faith that IIe who has opened the door, will also open the heart to receive the message, with what results time will shew. Since our last Annual Meeting, two reflection that there was a close connection between the two

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reports of the Parent Society have been published; instead of following seriatim, we shall glean from them such facts of a public and interesting nature as our space admits; and first, as to the important matter of pecuniary collection, we find that the income of last year, i. e. 1870-71 was £180,314 19s. 2d. sterling, against £182,265 6s. 3d of the preceding; and the expenditure £189,059 19s. 2d. against £173,476 2s of the previous ; these are princely sums, and while they shew that the Society has not declined in interest, they also serve to indicate that she has been carrying on her work more extensively than ever, for this last year's expenditure is larger than any previous year, with the exception of 1867-8, when collections had to be made for the exception of 1867-8, when collections had to be doing in her Society's new premises. And what has she been doing in her We find noble work of Bible circulation during the past year? from her report that nearly four millions of copies in whole, or in part have been issued, and that the area of her operations has been enlarged. France and Prussia gave unusual employment to her Agents and Colporteurs, the issues on account of war in France alone, were nearly half a million, and in Germany considerably above that quantity. Denmark, Sweden, Russia, Austria, Italy, and Turkey have all put forth increased demands for the Bible, and had the resources of the Society admitted of the employment of an increased Agency, the work could have been developed in many regions far beyond its present, proportions. It is evident then that men's minds in many countries are thirsting for the Word of Life, and in not a few cases opening to inquiry and religious impression. It would be tedious to go over every country, suffice to say, that there has been increased demand for the Bible, wherever the Society is established, and that in Spain, the recent revolution has greatly promoted Bible and Evangelical work. "From the Asturias and Galicia to the Bay of Gibraltar, from Badejos on the frontier of Portugal, to Valencia in the Mediterranean in town and hamlet, in the vast plains of La Manche, and in the bleak Guadareme and among the snowy ranges of Granada, the Messengers of the Book have plied their calling with a purpose and zeal which nothing but the grace of God could sustain. When lately the new Queen made her public entry into Madrid, there was an inscriptiou in front of one of the Government offices, to which many eyes were directed "RELIGIOUS LIBERTY," i.e. liberty to worship God and freedom for that Book which alone teaches how God is to be worshipped. This is a new era in Spain,-may the friends of that country see to it that the Bible become abundant as well as free lit yd , yeb mo ni benego need The opening of Rome to the Society's operations ought not to be passed by without note and comment. This event took

place in the autumn of 1870, in fact, immediately after the declaration of infallibility, begetting in thoughtful minds the reflection that there was a close connection between the two

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events, as between infidelity and retribution. The report thus speaks of the entrance of the Bible Colporteurs along with Victor Emmanuel's troops. "The soldiers of the Pope yielded one place after another until at last the troops of Victor Emmanuel arrived at the walls of Rome, and on the 20th September effected an entrance into the city, though not without useless bloodshed. The same day six colporteurs carried into Rome the precious Bible,-a memorable event in the history of an eventful year; and as it had long been the subject of much prayer, so does it call for much thanksgiving. There were however many within the city who were far from welcoming the long-exiled volume among them. To such its entrance would create as much alarm as did the cry, 'Hannibal is at the Gates,' to the inhabitants of ancient Rome." Thus then is Rome open to the Bible, and that power that so long let (i. e. hindered) has been put out of the way, and a triumph obtained by our victorious Emmanuel; still both in Rome and in Spain, the priestly influence predominates, and the strength of prejudice will not be overcome in a day, but a commencement has taken place, and the leaven hid in the measures of meal, which will leaven the whole lump. May the great God, whose providence in this matter we are called to admire, grant free course to His Word, that in Rome again may be heard the fame of those doctrines first preached by Paul.-" Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Before quitting Europe, we may add that a reaction against the dogma of infallibility has taken place within the last few months, and that a new Catholic Church is being founded in Germany, and multitudes are joining the ranks of the reformers, thus are old and corrupt systems being shaken, and the truth as it is in Jesus inquired into, investigated and received. stoboad I

Passing from Europe, we shall now select places of special interest in other parts of the World, commencing with China. The latest accounts concerning the celestial Empire are not so cheering. Two causes have operated prejudicially to the Society's interests: the first is the outbreaks that took place some months ago against the French Roman Catholic Missionaries, as to which it is more than suspected, that the Chinese authorities connived at the conduct of the inhabitants, and that the hostility was directed against all Christian Missionaries ;—at all events, the result has been injurious to the cause of Bible distribution, and Missionaries everywhere are looked upon with suspicion and shunned. Still the seed of the Word (it is known) has taken root in many a Chinese heart, and witnesses there are in that land willing to confess and suffer for Christ's sake. A second cause has been the absence of the Agent, Mr. Wylie, on the plea of health : he, however, by latest accounts has returned and brought Colporteurs with him, so that we may yet hope to hear of multitudes coming from the land of Sinim.

Madagascar: our curosity is naturally directed to Madagascar, which was lately the scene of 30,000 converts, and in former years of much persecution and martyrdom for the truth's sake. Our latest accounts from that Island are to the effect that the National Idols have been burnt by order of the Queen, and by the co-operation of the people, and that this act has been followed by urgent and wide spread demands for Christian instruction. Accordingly, the Committee ordered an edition of 20,000 copies of the whole Bible and 50,000 copies of the New Testament to be prepared with all despatch. Subsequent communications inform us of the arr val of the first instalment of the New Testament, and of the interest excited among the inhabitants. "Copies were presented to the Queen and Prime Minister and suitably acknowledged. The Queen (says the letter in reply) thanks the Society for sending that good book to her and especially for printing and sending so many of those goapels here, for well she knows that the gospel is the foundation of good to her people, causing them to know God and Jesus Christ her Saviour. And the arrival of the Gospels here has caused great joy to the people, for there are still many that desire to possess them; and I make known to you that many of the people of the Queen are striving to the utmost to learn to read that they may be able to read the gospel." Thus is the good seed being sown throughout this large and important island betokening much fruit. The report adds that wherever new congregations have been formed by the Missionaries, there the Society has been in the habit of presenting each of them with a Bible for the use of the Pulpit. In Abyssinia, where colporteurs have been laboring since the late war, the unsettled state of the country has much impeded the operations of the Sociey, nevertheless one of the colporteurs, himself a captive during Theodore's reign, and one well acquainted with the country, gives hope of a large demand for the Scriptures, as soon as circumstances allow the promotion of the work. it is a sowing of the seed in an uncultivated ground, but still we may believe that now and then a grain falls into good ground, prepared and disposed to receive it, which shall bear fruit into life eternal. In anticipation therefor, the Committee has prepared an edition of five thousand copies of the new Testament in the Abyssinian languge. From the South Sea Islands, good and cheering accounts come of the sale and spread of the Scriptures in the native languages. Samoa is one of the most promising spheres of Bible circulation throughout Eastern Polynesia. The whole Bible has been for some time past translated into the Samoese language, and is about to be stereo-The Christian natives have defrayed the entire expense and One hundred Pounds over, which were handed to the Committee by the London Missionary Society to cover incidental expenses. Such an occurrence (says the report) is rare and most hope to hear of multitudes coming from the land of Sinin.

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gratifying to the Committee, and we might add speaks volumes for the Christianity of the natives. In the New Hebrides, the Parent Society has an Auxiliary which has twice remitted sums during the year, amounting to the very handsome contribution of £106, 9s., a testimory to the gratitude and interest taken by the natives in the translation of the Scriptures into their own language. In several of the islands, the work of translation goes on, and it is peculiarly gratifying to know that the natives of Aneiteum had, by contributions of Arrowroct, paid the whole sum expended by the Society in printing the new Testament and Psalms in Aneiteumese, and that a balance remained of over £50 to begin the printing of the old Testament. Thus the power of the gospel is seen in liberalizing the hearts of the natives as well as in converting them to God. From the Fiji Islands, further sums have been received, and the native Christians, once cannibals, have commenced a Mission to remote Polynesia, about three hundred miles to the North of theirs, thus does the gospel act and re-act, and make its converts instruments for the conversion of others. algoh bill ve

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Inus have we, in as short space as possible, gone over points of general interest in the Parent Society's report. Seldom has it been our privilege to peruse such a record of operations. Nearly two millions of copies of the Scriptures distributed this year above last, and the sphere of operation greatly enlarged; yet, before dismissing this valuable report, which is indeed worthy of perusal by all our members, we are to notice several removals by death.

And, first, the Rev. Dr. Pressense, of the French Agency, and one whose name has been often mentioned in the annual reports in this place, has been called hence. He was the oldest servant the Society had, having been in its connection for nearly 40 years, originally a Roman Catnolic, but having embraced the Protestant laith from sincere and deep rooted conviction he became an earnest and unflinching advocate and agent of the B, and F. Bible Society. Mr. Pressense, was the author of several valuable woks, and has left his impress on the Church and age.

A second name, still better known to many of as, is that of Dr. Gill, who, it will be remembered, visited this Country, in 1864, as a delegate from the Parent Society, addressed meetings in this Town and Province, and throughout the Dominion, and proved agreeable and useful. Now, after a few months suffering, be was called, ast November, 1871, to his rest. Mr. Kent, the previous delegate, departed some years ago from a stroke of apoplexy; thus these two, being dead, yet speak to us, their former hearers and friends, and tell us to work while the day lasts, for fhe night cometh when no man can work.

But another death strikes upon our ears (though it be not mentioned in the Society's report) and that of one more inti-

mately related and better known than any of those already mentioned, and which demands more than a cursory notice, namely, that of the Rev. Charles Elliott, formerly Rector of St. James's Church, of this Town. For upwards of fifteen years President of this Auxiliary, he always evinced an unfeigned interest in its prosperity, presided with dignity and courtesy at its Annual Meetings, and was ever ready to facilitate its business in Com-mittees. Though removed from this Province for the last six years, yet, we doubt not, he maintained an interest in our proceedings and cherished a recollection of our Annual Meetings. At his last appearance in our midst, the Society, on motion of James Primrose, Esq., did him, and its self the honor of passing an unanimous vote of thanks for his long and valued services, as President, and expressed a wish, through the Chairman, that he would be long spared ;-but, alas! it was ordered otherwise, for now his course is ended, at the age of 66, and we have the melancholy duty of here recording his demise, news of which

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arrived on Saturday by British Mail. Thus are we reminded, not only by the decease of comparative strangers, but by the death of a Minister so long amongst us and for a lengthened period President of our Society, of the necessity of being constant, diligent, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as we know not when an account work of the Lord, for as much as we know not when an account

of our stewardship shall be required of us. As to the affairs of our own Auxiliary, they are generally in a prosperous state. The chief points of interest are the minutes of a Conference of B. and F. Bible Union, held in Montreal, in June, last, at which the following report was ag-

greed to and passed the General Committee. "That as the British American Bible Union contemplates no severance of the tie between the Auxiliary and the Parent Society, nor any burthensome and expensive machinery, but has for its special object the strengthening and encouraging of each Auxiliary in the circulating of the Scriptures. Your Committee would therefore express themselves in favor of the proposed Union, subject to an approval of a General Meeting of this Auxiliary !" The voice of this Meeting therefore will be asked upon this matter. It was also agreed, in Committee, to appoint Mr. Russell, Bible Agent, to visit the different Branch Societies,

Mr. Russell, Bible Agent, to this data and this year, and to report. Various changes have taken place amongst us, during these last two years, but the Word of God abideth and though Heaven and Earth should pass away, yet not one word shall pass till all and Earth should pass away, yet not one word shall pass till all be fulfilled. We have reason to bless God that we live in days be fulfilled. We have reason to bless God that we live in days when that Word is being abundantly fulfilled. Let us prize it, when that Word is being abundantly fulfilled. Let us prize it, peruse it, and diffuse it abroad. Lord bless and pity us and cause thy face to shine on us that through us thy way may be known upon Earth and thy saving health among all Nations.

REPORT OF MR. RUSSELL.

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Having finished the visitation of a few of your Branch Societies, I respectfully submit the following Report: I left Truro on the morning of Thursday, 26th October, for Pictou,

Went on next morning, by coach, to *Pugwash*, in which place I addressed a small meeting, at night, in the Wesleyan Church. I regretted to find that nothing had been collected here for two years. At the close of my address, Collectors were appointed, who will soon go round soliciting subscriptions. One friend com-mencing the work, handed me as his and his family's contribution, \$2.75. Took the coach part day to Wallace at night addressed a meeting \$3.75. Took the coach next day to *Wallace*, at night addressed a meeting in Temperance Hall. A Secretary and Treasurer, in the room of the late Stephen Fulton, Esq., was appointed, and the accompanying Production was adouted. **Resolution** was adopted :

"It is with deep sorrow that the Society places on its minutes the record of the death of STEPHEN FULTON, Esq., who performed for many years, with entire satisfaction, the duties of Secretary and Treasurer. By the demise of Mr. Fulton, the Wallace Branch Bible Society has lost one of its warmest supporters and most efficient office bearers. His zeal and tact contributed not a little to the success that has hither of attended our feeble efforts to aid the British and Foreign Bible Society in the noble work of distributing the Word of God among all the people and nations of the Earth; and this Society cannot permit the opportunity afforded by its first meeting, after his death, to pass without recording their high appreciation of his character and services, and dropping a tear over his grave, as one whose whole life was fruitful of good, and whose death was blessed with peace."

It was considered advisable that I should address another meeting in It was considered advisable that I should address another meeting in Wallace, and on the evening of Sabbath a large number assembled in the Wesleyan Church, to whom I spoke upwards of an hour. At the close a collection of \$8.00 was taken and handed me, to aid the work of circulating the Scriptures among the bereaved families in France and Germany. Collectors will, in a day or two, be appointed to solicit subscriptions for the general work of the Society.

This Branch will, at the usual time, forward its Annual Contribution. Next morning, Rev. James Watson kindly sent me on to Tatama-gouche. At night I addressed a pretty large meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The President, Rev. J. Sedgwick, was from home. Soon after his return arrangements will be made for collecting subscriptions. Through the kindness of Robert Purves, Esq., next morning (Wed-nesday) I was sent on to *River John*, were in Temperance Hall, in the evening, there was (considering the snow storm), a good attendance. A collection of \$3 was taken, and handed me, and Collectors were ap-pointed for the several districts of River John. Returned by coach,

pointed for the several districts of River John. Returned by coach, at night, to Pictou, and next morning came on to Truro. In all the places visited, opportunities were given, at the close of my addresses, to any person present, to ask any questions they pleased. One or two questions were asked in Pugwash—no where else —and answered to the entire satisfaction of all there, with the ex-ception of answering. I did not advert to old controversies. It was not necessary. So far as I could judge, there is thorough confi-dence in the British and Foreign Bible Society, and at every meeting addressed the most marked attention was given to the statements made regarding its operations.

regarding its operations. I regret that it is out of my power to visit the remaining Branches. (D. V.) I shall hold a meeting in River Philip, next January, when on my way to New Brunswick.

CONSTITUTION.

1. The designation of this Society shall be The Picton Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society; of which the sole object shall be, to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the languages of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society shall be the authorized version, excluding the circulation of the apocrypha.

II. The Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the whole world, among Christians, Mohammedans, Jews, and Pagans.

III. Each Subscriber of One Dollar, annually, shall be a member, and any subscriber of Ten Pounds at one time shall be a member for life.

IV. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and Committee of any number the Society may determine, at its Annual Meeting.

V. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held at such time as the Executive Committee may deem most suitable, and at such meeting the office-bearers shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported. Special General Meetings may be called by the Committee when necessary.

VI. The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and every clergyman who is a member of the Society, shall be ex officio members of Committee.

VII. At the General Meetings, and meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, and in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

VIII. The Committee shall meet quarterly, on the first Thursday of the months of January, April, July, and October; special meetings of the Committee may be called by the Secretary when necessary, but every member of Committee must be duly notified.

IX. The whole of the minutes of every meeting shall be signed by the secretary and countersigned by the chairman.

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
