

Body in Pond That of Nova Scotian; Wife and Man Now Face Trial

Beverly, Mass., Oct. 13—Fred R. Risteen, a former Nova Scotian, whose body, weighed with cast iron, was found in Norwood Pond, North Beverly, eight days ago. was killed in a midnight fight with George W. Plummer, Jr., in the woods, three miles from his home, Mrs. Marion A. Risteen, widow of the dead man, and Plummer told the police yesterday.

Both were arrested, charged with murder.

According to the stories of Plummer and Mrs. Risteen, describing the events of the night of September 20, when, they said, Risteen met his death, the victim died after striking his head against a stone in the course of a struggle with Plummer. Plummer then stumbled back three miles through the night to the home of Risteen, he told the police, and according to Mrs. Risteen induced her to accompany him to the scene of the fight, took the body to the pond, weighted and dropped it into the water.

Mrs. Risteen disclaimed all knowledge of the details of her husband's death. She said she feared to tell what she knew because Plummer told her to "been her mouth shut" and he made threats, she said. Plummer said that Both were arrested, charged with murder.

A Part of the Famous Watling

London, Oct. 13.—The announcement that the Prince of Wales, upon returning from his American and Canadian trip, will on Nov. 19 formally open the reconstructed road between Dartford and Strood, draws attention to one of the oldest and most celebrated highways in Europe.

This patch of road is in reality part of Watling street, a thoroughfare of great antiquity which still traverses the heart of London and, just back of St. Paul's Cathedral, to this day bears its ancient name. No one knows how old Watling street is, but it had been long established when the Romans came to Britain two thousand years ago.

The motorist who today comes up to London from Canterbury traverses the same road, the famous Watling street which Roman soldiers took when, on conquest bent, they marched through England. Jutish marauders in their day burned and plundered the countryside which it served. Traders from Gaul trudged over its stones long before the mediaeval age, in fact, the whole panorama of English history would be unrolled if this ancient way could speak. And this old road which the Prince of Wales will again throw open to the public in November is today what it has ever been, the most convenient route between London and the ports

The contrast between the McGaughey murder trial in Lindsay and the Leopold-Loeb murder trial in Chicago is striking. The plea of insanity was advised on behalf of the Lindsay murderer but there were no almost interminable court sessions, held day after day, to present wearisome arguments in respect of this insanity. Instead, the whole trial occupied but a relatively few hours and it took the jury itself only four hours to bring in a verdict of guilty. That is the difference between Canadian justice and American justice and emphasizes the shocking condition in the United States, and why mur-

derers over there have such an easy time.

We have already called attention to the shocking number of murders in the States—in Chicago, one a day—and the more shocking fact that many of the murderers escape punishment at the hands of the law. The figures as prepared by the Statistical Department of the Metropolitan Insurance Company are eloquent of this since they show that out of 146 homicides, including 114 manslaughter or murder cases, there was actually only one murderer who suffered the death penalty. Of the others there were thirty-five sent to the Penitentiary, one was fined, one was paroled and the rest are either unapprehended, have been set free or are awaiting trial. It is no wonder that the most eminent jurists and the best men in the States are wondering how it is possible to overcome this breakdown in the administration of the law. One of the suggested remedies is to procure a standard code of criminal procedure for all the States but in view of the fact that each State is peculiarly jealous of its own rights, it is scarcely possible that any such code will ever be adopted.
