Irish Republican Chief Offers To Discuss Peace


De Valera Announces that Fighting Will Stop No Later Than Monday—Demands Irish Sovereignty and Supremacy of People.

Dublin, April 27—A suspension of hostilities by the Irish Republicans against the forces of the Free State government, and an offer to negotiate peace with the Free State on certain conditions were proclaimed tonight by Eamonn De Valera, the Republican leader, and his chief of staff, E. F. the following:

"First—That the sovereign rights of

"The Government of the Republic,

Chief of Staff Aitken, in his order for a cessation of offensive operations, tells the Republican troops to remain on the defensive and protect themselves and their munitions. This is taken as implying that there is to be no yielding on the part of the Republicand for the surrender of all arms. Following is the text of the order:

"To all commands and independent brigades:

"Suspension of offensive in order to give effect to the decision of the government and army council embodied in the attached proclamation. You will arrange a suspension of all offensive operations in your area as from noon Monday, April 80.

"You will insure that whilst remain-(Continued on page 2, column 4.) ing on the defensive all units take adequate measures to protect themselves and their munitions."

"Adequate opportunities and facilities, must, of course, be afforded for full and proper presentation to the court of all facts and issues involved; and it must be understood that Article One and Article Two are fundamental and non-judicable.

"Fourth—That no individual or class

To Eliminate Brake-Rod Rattles. The chatter and noise of loose or worn brake rods can be eliminated by sliding a section of rubber hose over the one nearest to the frame of the car.

When Tires Wear Unevenly. The bearings are very likely broken if the tires wear unevenly, or wear so thin that the remaining rubber is not enough to absorb the ordinary shocks

Handy Equipment. A rubber mallet for hammering polished surfaces should be part of the tools of every car. This tool is found invaluable for taking out dents in the fenders or similar disfigurements.

Increases Efficiency. Be sure that all hose connections are changed once a year. Hot water rots the rubber, loosens up the fabric which gets in the way of the water, cutting down the efficiency of the cooling sys-

Replacement of Rings. When replacing rings, the best fitting rings should be used at the top, so that the oil below cannot be consumed by the high temperature of the exploding gas. The replacement of the rings is the reverse of the removal.

Causes of Tire Wear. A prematurely worn tread may be attributed to the following causes: Wheel out of alignment or wabbly wheel, bent axle, grabby brakes and clutch, spinning of wheels, skidding, underinfiation or overloading, fender cut, chain bruises, and car-track wear.












