Annual Meeting.

ST. ANDREW'S HALL, KINGSTON, JAN. 14, 1891.

The Annual Meeting of the congregation was held at 8 o'clock. The Rev. Mr. Mackie was in the Chair, and opened the meeting with prayer.

Mr. T. D. Minnes was appointed Secretary.

The minutes of the last annual and four special meetings were read and confirmed.

The following Reports were read:-

The Session Report, by Mr. Mackie; the Managers' Report, by Mr. Craig; the Supplementary Revenue Report, by Mr. Craig; the Building Fund Report, by Mr. D. Fraser; the Women's Home Association Report, by Capt. T. Donnelly; the Sabbath School Report, by Mr. W. T. Minnes; the Women's Foreign Mission Society Report, by Mr. G. M. Macdonnell; the Young Men's Guild Report, by Mr. Wm. Gill; the Young Women's Guild, by Dr. Mowat; and the Report of the Juvenile Guild, by Dr. Grant; and were duly received and adopted.

On motion the four retiring Managers, Messrs. McIntyre, Fraser, Hobart and Gibson were re-elected; and the retiring members of the Reception Committee, Messrs. Donnelly, Gill and W. T. Minnes, were also re-elected.

That the \$1000 due on the expenditure of the past year be raised by a special collection on the Anniversary Sunday; that the debt at the Bank be met by the subscriptions to the Building Fund now due or due during the course of the year; and that the Building Committee be instructed to endeavour to get a loan of \$2000 at 5 per cent, to pay bills due on building.

That the thanks of the congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Kingston, are due to John Paton, Esq., of New York, for his generous donation of the clock now adorning the tower of this church, at once an ornament to the edifice and highly appreciated by the public. This congregation most gratefully acknowledges Mr. Paton's munificence in

thus recollecting the scene of his former well known christian activity. The Board of Management is further authorized to have inserted a suitable tablet marking this liberal benefaction.

Moved by Mr. McIntyre, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, and resolved:-That the cordial thanks of St. Andrew's congregation are hereby tendered to the Dowager Lady Broun for her thoughtful consideration in presenting the Bible, Psalm Book and Hymnal now used in the Services.

Dr. Grant closed the meeting with the Benediction.



Kirk=Session Report.

The Kirk-Session, in presenting this their first report of the spiritual state of new St. Andrew's, desires very heartily to congratulate the congregation on the possession of such a commodious and much admired House of Prayer. By its erection, far too long delayed, an enormous barrier to church activity and progress has been removed, and every department of congregational work has felt the swift current of a new life.

The services of the Sanctuary, both morning and evening, have been attended by large congregations; while the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been celebrated by numbers far exceeding any on past occasions.

Various organizations, calling into requisition the services of young and old, have been started during the year, and the reports which each of these will present to the congregation will show that they are realities, accomplishing much that will be of enduring value both to St. Andrew's and the city, the Dominion and the dark places of the earth. The Kirk-Session earnestly commends these organizations to the warm sympathy and strong support of the congregation, that they may pursue their noble aims with increasing ardour and success.

Since last January 51 persons have been received into full communion with the church. Of these 27 were admitted on profession of faith and 24 by certificate.

On the other hand 7 have been removed by death, and 17 have left the city.

The Communion Roll as revised shows a strength of 453. Student communicants whose homes are not in the city are not included in this return.

The Sacrament of Baptism was administered to 22 children; 16 marriages were celebrated; and 17 deaths occurred.

The Kirk-Session desires to make special mention of the indebtedness of the congregation to those ladies and gentlemen who, as members of the choir, have done so much in improving the Praise of the Sanctuary; also to note with satisfaction the return of Mr. Harvey to his duties as Organist after a protracted absence, which they do not anticipate will again occur, although his place was acceptably filled.

In the harmony of the congregation, the increasing interest and activity in church work, and the strong attachment of all to St. Andrew's, the Kirk-Session sees with thankfulness signs of a deep spiritual life which they pray God may wax greater and greater as time advances.

Report of the Board of Managers.

ST. ANDREW'S HALL, 14TH JAN., 1891.

The Annual Financial Statement herewith, for the year ending 31st ult., shews the actual Revenue to have been \$4172 29 and the Expenditure \$3449 37 for strictly current expenses, giving a surplus of \$722 92. This sum has been expended in liquidating the liabilities of the previous year as shewn in the last statement, and in payment of unforseen and unavoidable expenses connected with the New Building, laying out the grounds, &c., an expenditure which properly belongs to Building Account.

The sum asked for by your Committee to meet the expenditure for the year, viz., \$4900 00 has not been reached, consequently no provision has been made for the payment of the interest on the debt. Had the estimated amount been received, nearly all the interest could have been paid from Revenue account.

Compared with the previous year, the one under review is encouraging. During the latter as already stated the revenue was \$4172 29 while the year previous only shows \$3018 96, an increase of \$1153 33, or equal to about one-third.

In the year 1889 the contributions by envelopes were \$2450 47, while last year these contributions only amounted to \$1473 48, a large decrease; but this is more than covered by the pew rents which are extra this year and amount to \$1940 42. The plate collections show an increase of \$177 68, or about fifty per cent. The supplementary revenue is increased by \$12 22, or about six per cent. We re \$118 97, in before We es

We regret to report 30 pew holders in arrears for rent, aggregating \$118 97, and we hope this reference will cause their arrears to be paid in before the lists are printed.

We estimate the expenditure for the year 1891, which includes \$1000 00 for interest, at \$4989 00.

Our expectations regarding the New Church, expressed in last Report, have been fully realized and the New Building has been occupied since 16th February last, on which Sabbath it was opened under very auspicious circumstances, and there has since been new life and vigor put into every department of the congregation's work.

The Building is very comfortable and convenient, and is highly spoken of and much admired by all. The interior, exterior and grounds are very chaste, displaying great taste and shewing evidence of careful thought and design in every detail. It is at once an ornament to the city and a credit to St. Andrew's congregation.

As we realize the beauty of this edifice and the privileges we enjoy in this house dedicated to the worship of the Triune God, may we be seriously impressed with the conviction that all the debt upon it should be paid. Were each one of us conscious of this, how eager and anxious would be our efforts to make the liquidation of all indebtedness an accomplished fact, that we might in spirit and in truth

We regret that some of our teachers and office-bearers who were with us at the last Annual Meeting have been obliged to withdraw from the School, viz.:—Mrs. Hamilton, Miss Beaton and Mr. G. S. Hobart, who have retired, Miss M. Minnes and Miss A. Harold, who have gone to Duluth and Buffalo respectively, and Mr. H. Minnes, who has gone to Ottawa.

We desire to express our thanks to those who have at intervals during the year given us their kind assistance in various ways, vix.:--Mrs. J. Hazlett, Messrs. McIntyre, R. Minnes, J. A. Minnes, Fee and Dr. Grant.

There are 288 scholars on the roll and the average attendance has been 238. Average number attending church 69. Comparing the year just closed with the previous twelve months, the number of scholars on the roll is increased by 37, and the average attendance by 51, an improvement equal to twenty per cent. This gratifying increase is doubtless owing in some measure to the advantages enjoyed in the New Hall, which is more central for the scholars and more comfortable and convenient than the Ontario Hall in which we had been meeting when our last report was submitted.

During the year 13 scholars have joined the church and are now in full communion.

It is gratifying to both teachers and scholars to note that all the prizes awarded by the General Assembly to the Kingston Presbytery were obtained by our School.

There are now 1036 volumes in the Library and we expect to see this increased to about 1125 when the amount appropriated for new books has been expended. This addition we hope to make to the Library during next month.

Of the money raised by the School this year \$20 has been given to Home Missions and \$9 to the Welland Canal Mission.

The International Lessons have been followed during the year.

We enjoyed the usual annual visit of Rev. Mr. Bone, of the Welland Canal Mission.

The Annual Pic-Nic and Christmas Festival were held as usual. Special thanks are due Miss McIlroy for her kind interest in the latter.

On the third Sabbath of June a Flower Service was held by the children in the Church. The Minister preached a very interesting sermon upon the words "Consider the lilies, &c." and the same text was the theme of the anthem rendered by the choir.

In conclusion we feel grateful for another year of prosperity. Good work has been done and we trust good seed has been sown and we pray that it may bring forth abundant fruit to the praise and glory of God.

meetings from 9 to 20 members. Special attention is also called to the fact that owing to this increase in numbers and interest, notwithstanding the many and pressing claims made upon the congregation through building the Church the receipts of the Society have more than trebled. A very pleasing feature in the year's work has been the sewing meetings, at which clothing valued at \$90 was prepared and packed for one of the Indian reserves in the North-west.

Cordial thanks are now given to all who contributed clothing and helped to make it; and similar contributions and aid are again requested as the sewing meetings will be recommenced early in this year.

Thanks are also given to those who sent cake, etc., to the two "At Homes," to those who made the meetings brighter by providing good music, and to Mr. Mackie for the gift of a Minute Book uniform with those used by the other Societies in St. Andrew's Church.

During the year 10 regular, 2 special and 7 sewing meetings have been held.

The special meetings were a farewell to Miss W. G. Fraser, M.D., in April, to which representatives from the other Presbyterian, the Methodist, Church of England and Baptist Societies were invited; and a Thankoffering Service and "At Home" held in October, to which \$49.20 was brought. The number of members for 1890 is 47, two of whom are life members and 43 members of the General Society; 50 copies of the "Leaflet" containing missionary news direct from India, China the South Sea Islands, and our own Indian Reserves in the North-west, are taken by members of the Society and others.

Total amount contributed, \$145.83; expended, \$16.52; balance paid Treasurer, \$129.31.

In connection with the opening of the church in February an "At Home" was held, at which almost every family in the Congregation was represented, and which it is hoped contributed to the maintenance of that kindly feeling which ought to prevail among members of the household of faith.

The contributions of the Association to the Church during the past year have been the pulpit chair, the communion table, and platform chairs, all of which have been much admired.

In addition to this the Association voted \$500 towards the reduction of the Church debt, the proceeds of a sale held last December.

District visitors to the number of 25 have paid monthly visits to the families belonging to the Church, and have distributed 225 Records with St. Andrew's Notes. They have also received the collections for the various schemes of the Church appointed by the General Assembly.

At the beginning of the year the management of the Poor Fund, which is made up entirely of the collections at communion services, was entrusted by the Kirk-Session to this Association. The greatest care and fairness have been exercised in the distribution of this fund, and the Association reports with confidence that no church can take a more generous and kindlier care of its poor than St. Andrew's does. The gratitude and contentment of the recipients have been pleasing proofs to the Association that their ministrations are perfectly satisfactory to those whom it chiefly concerns. Mrs. Cochrane has acted as treasurer during the year and the accounts, showing an income of 208.07 and an expenditure a little within it, were submitted and found correct.

Such has been the work of the Association during 1890. A great deal more, it is hoped, will be achieved before the close of 1891. The Association exists for the purpose of *forwarding the best interests of* St. Andrew's Church. The object will be a sufficient stimulus to activity and self-denial and the approbation of the Congregation will be fragrant and refreshing.

This Association, founded early in the Spring of the year by the minister, has for its object the bringing into closer relationship all the young women belonging to the congregation, thereby deepening their interest in each other, and strengthening and encouraging each other in the christian life; also the distribution among them of the various departments of christian work, that everyone may be engaged and everything be systematically carried out and carefully superintended.

The following pledge has to be taken by everyone before enrolment as a member:—"I solemnly promise to give as far as possible regular attendance at the monthly meetings of the Guild; to give as much of my time and thought as I can spare to the work of the Guild; and to do all that in me lies to maintain its honour, peace and prosperity." During the year forty-five, having taken this pledge, were enrolled as members.

The Guild is divided into five sections presided over by Conveners, who superintend the work allotted to each section, and make a monthly report of all proceedings at the stated meetings of the Guild.

The Dorcas section has had entrusted to it the procuring, making and repairing of clothes for the poor, and assisting busy mothers in making clothes for the children. Much kindly help, gratefully received, has been rendered to quite a few families in the congregation, preventing in a good many cases irregular attendance at Church and Sabbath School. The section, in order to have a little fund at their disposal to be spent entirely on their work, had a table for the disposal of needle work at the sale held by the Woman's Home Association, by which they realized \$23.39. They desire gratefully to acknowledge the contributions, both of money and clothing, which member nothing

The Hospital section have paid weekly visits to the inmates of Rockwood Asylum and the patients of the General Hospital. These visits have been of a purely religious character and have been much appreciated and, it is hoped, greatly blessed to the sons and daughters of affliction. The visitors themselves have much enjoyed and been greatly benefitted by their contact with the suffering. Contributions of flowers and christian literature would be very helpful to this section.

The Blue Cross section has had the work of total abstinence to look after among the women of the congregation. They keep two rolls of total abstinence, one of young women and the other of married women. During the year the following pledge was administered to one hundred:—"I vow with the help of God to abstain totally from all intoxicating liquors as beverages and to discourage their use as such."

The Visiting section has had charge of the sick and infirm, of servants, boarders and strangers. Their work is to cheer and comfort the sick, and lonely and aged, by reading the Scriptures and singing the Songs of Zion, and also to give a warm welcome to solitary individuals and take a kindly interest in them and introduce them to help-ful companions.

The Social section has had charge of the River Trips, the "At Homes" and various pleasant gatherings that have taken place, that the young of the church might know each other better and take a kindly interest in each other's welfare, and be helpful of each other's faith.

That this object has been attained in the case of many, the section has with gratitude perceived, and feels encouraged to pursue those things that tend to bind as one all the different workers and worshippers in the church.

The Guild respectfully submits this, its first report, to the congregation in the hope that its work will meet with approval, and that the prayers of many will make it a channel of much and lasting good to St. Andrew's.

This Society, which has for its object the training of the children of the church in charitable and mission work was organized in March last.

A large committee, consisting principally of Sabbath School teachers and older scholars, have superintended weekly meetings of children, of whom 80 have been enrolled as willing workers and members of the Guild. The special object set before them to begin with was the equipment of a children's ward in the General Hospital, the want of which had been felt for so many years.

By the erection of the Nickle wing the Hospital authorities have been enabled to set apart for their use a large room in the main building, and the furnishing of this room, besides the making of all articles of clothing suitable and necessary for the sick, became the work of the Guild for this year.

Means for carrying out the purposes of the Society were procured in various ways:—

1st. The following by their contributions of money and material and also by giving orders for work gave an excellent start, viz. : Lady Broun, Mrs. Mackie, Mrs. Lawson, Mrs. Dobbs, Mrs. Folger, Mrs. Kerr, Mrs. Wood, Miss Annie Macpherson, Miss Broun and Mr. Wm. Mudie.

2nd. A request from the pulpit for \$10 on behalf of the Guild brought \$32, which greatly cheered and encouraged all the workers. Those who responded were,—Mr. Duff \$10; Mrs. Foot (a visitor) \$10; Mrs. Clark Hamilton \$5; Mrs. McIntyre \$5; Mrs. Dickson \$2.

3rd. From two simple entertainments given chiefly by the children of the Guild, the sum of \$103.75 was realized.

It is the intention of the Guild to provide twelve cots for the ward, each of which will cost about \$12.

The following members of the congregation have each subscribed for a cot and will have the privilege of naming it, viz.: Lady Broun, Mrs. Mackie, Mrs. Folger, Mrs Fenwick, Mrs. Capt. Taylor, Prof. Harris, Mr. Hugh Nickle; also, Miss Hamilton's class, Miss Bain's and Miss Strange's. The boys of Miss Hamilton's class contributed for this object \$20; this being more than sufficient to pay for a cot the remainder will be devoted to procuring toys and picture books for the ward. Supplementary Fund.

Herewith will be found details of receipts during the year credited to this fund.
