

Ruins Will be Searched for Valuable Documents ---Persons May Still be Alive Under Wrecked **Buildings --- Relief Party Too Late to Save** Family of a British Resident.

Regglo, while the voices of others can be distinctly heard appealing for ald. The work of rescue at the home in Messina of the British chaplain Hulatt was most pathetic. The rescue party had succeeded last Saturday in reaching a portion of the ruins from under which came groans. This fact infused vigor into the men and although they worked until late into the night no success rewarded their efforts. Work was again resumed at daybrak Sunday, the men feeling certain that Mr. Hulatt, his wife and four children were alive beneath the debris. Only one voice was heard now, and hat seemingly in lamentation. Evening fell and there was another shock of earthquake and the tottering walls about the rescuthere was another shock of earthquake and the tottering walls about the rescuers threatened to collapse and bury them. They stuck to their task, and soon found the bodies of Hulatt and one child both dead. The men kept hard at work until finally the groans ceased and the rescuers were convinced that the entire family had perished. Then the men out work.

The Associated Press had the first correspondent on the scene at Messina. He found a condition of utter confusion existing. The bodies of the dead lay everywhere on the surface of the ruins, and limbs protruded here and there from the wreckage. The small first aid stations were overcrowded with inured and scores of others were hastily established as soon as possible by relief corps from Italian and the Russian, French, German and British warships.

laims as those made a few weeks ago

LONDON, Jan. 4—While such claims as those made a few weeks ago by a Belgian physician to the effect that he had discovered a cure for cancer in all its forms are discounted on many grounds, there is tangible evidence that the researches which are being made all over the world are surely, though slowly, arousing the hope that a specific remedy will eventually be found.

An interesting demonstration was given this week in Paris by the League Against Cancer when Profs. Bouchard and Gaucher and Drs. Dominici, Wickham, Degrais, and Keating-Hart described some striking cures by radium and fulguration.

Dr. Dominici made his first experiments in cancer treatment with radium in Prof. Gaucher's ward at the Hospital Saint-Louis. He treated not only superficial cancer of the skin, but also profound tumors and cancers that could not be operated upon. A number of patients who were formerly afflicted with cancer and who were apparently entirely cured were presented to the meeting.

One case was that of a patient who had a deep entitled work. sented to the meeting.
One case was that of a patient who had a deep epithelioma over the upper jawbone and was treated with radium. In less than six weeks he was cured and the tumor was cicatrised. The method followed is very simple. Dr. Dominici inserted a gold case containing a bulb with five milligrams of bromide of radium in the affected tissues and left it there for days, with the result given.

the result given.

A woman who had a tumor inside the lower lip was operated upon, but the tumor reappeared. She was then subjected to radium treatment and cured in seven weeks.

Dr. Wickham and Dr. Degrais showed a number of similar cures.

Dr. Wickham and Dr. Degrais showed a number of similar cures. They have treated sixty-two cases in the space of three and a half years, and only six falled to be cured. In a few light and superficial cases of canceroids an application of one hour sufficed to cure. In profound tumors the doctors applied, so to speak, a cross-fire consisting of two bulbs with radium, whose action converged on a given point, and the result has been radium, whose action converged on a given point, and the result has been very satisfactory. In very deep tumors, however, the radium was incapable of producing rapid improvement. In such cases Dr. Keating-Hart showed that an excellent result could be obtained by means of high tension electric sparks acting on canceroid fumors subjected to the surgeon's knife. This fulguration treatment of cancer has given remarkable re-

sults.

Several patients who had undergone this treatment and were cured were shown. One of these had a great tumor on the neck upon which several surgeons considered it impossible to operate. Dr. Tuffier cut it out piece by piec and Dr. Keating-Hart fulgurized it several times as the operation proceeded, with the result that the pain vanished at once. The wound, which was larger than the fist, cleatrized with wonderful rapidity in less than five weeks. than five weeks.

Another case was that of a man who had five tumors on the leg. Four of them disappeared under the rays, but the fifth only became more malignant. An operation was then performed with fulguration. The pain at once ceased, a rapid cure set in, and the patient, whose leg, was considered lost, is now able to stand on it.

Prof. Gaucher, in discussing all these cases, said it was evident that in most cases in which one mode of treatment failed another succeeded, and that these different methods in themselves valuable discoveries, supplement or complete one another.

Japan Gets Control of Antimony Deposit in Alaska

Largest Mine of Its Kind in America-Pioneer Sold It for \$100,000-Work Will Begin in Spring.

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—There will be SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 4.—The investigation.

Mikado of Japan has purchased for Mikado of Japan has purchased for A deputation of the Angilcan Association of Ottawa, waited upon the minsilog,000 from Joe Silscovitch, Alaskan picneer, the largest antimony mine in America, from which the Japanese government will take tons of minerals containing valuable ingredients for smokeless powder and metals which will make the steel hulls of Nippon battleships proof against barnacles.

A deal was closed here through agents of the Japanese government, who paid over to Silscovitch \$10,000 in cash and signed an agreement to pay the remaining \$90,000 within twenty days. Silscovitch arrived here four days ago and was met by the Japanese agents who have received reports of an assay of ore taken secretly from the mine in September. Japanese experts have made a complete investigation, not only of this mine.

investigation, not only of this mine, but of nearly every important property in Alaska, during the last six months. Silscovitch was surprised when the offer was made to him, and he accepted immediately. He staked the claim, and the \$100,000 is practically

claim, and the \$100,000 is practically clear profit.

As no mining operations are possible in Alaska in the winter time no work can be done in exploitation of the mine until next season. It is understood, however, that by next spring all the preparations will have been completed to throw a large force of Japanese laborers into the property to open the mines under the direction of Japanese engineers. Ore will be transferred to the Mikado's vessels on the coast and carried across the Pacific to furnish Japanese factories with the materials for strengthening the naval efficiency of that nation.
