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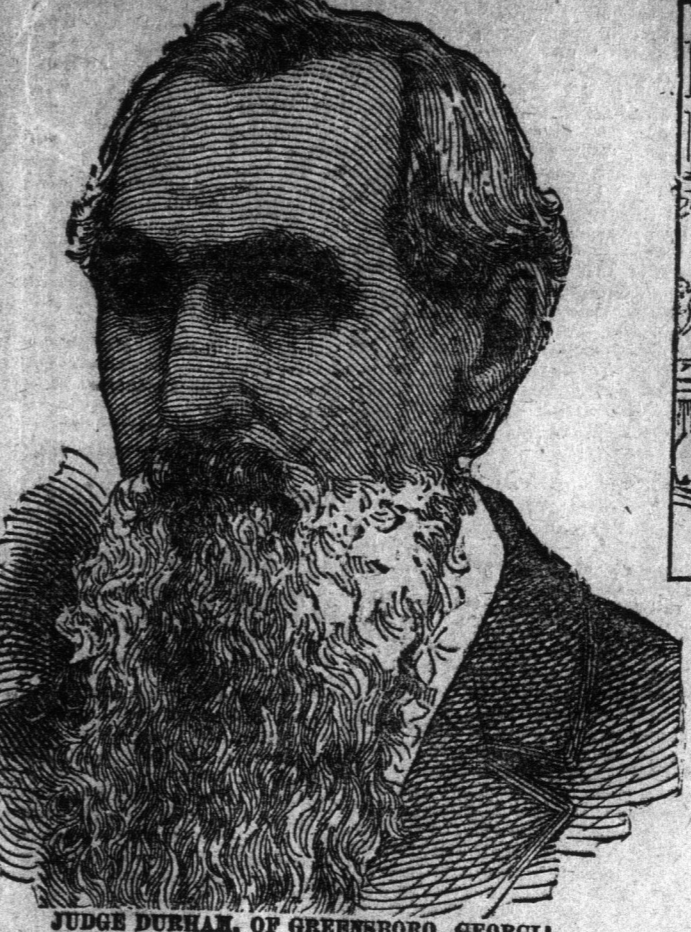

MEDDLESOME COSTIGAN.

That the years that have elapsed since the adoption of the aforesaid address and resolutions to your most gracious majesty's illustrious and ever-memorable predecessor, have but served to emphasize the blessings which accrue to this dominion from the federal system under which the people live, the benefits of which the commons of Canada rejoice to see are about to be shared by their fellow subjects of the United Kingdom of Great Britain, and therefore this esteemed experience which your most gracious majesty's subjects have had of the inestimable benefits resulting from the said government bestowed on the whole of British North America, but intensifies their desire to affirm through their representatives in parliament the sentiments expressed in the said address and resolutions with regard to the

COLOMBO, Ceylon, March 24.—Charges of the most serious nature have been brought against Major General Sir Hector Macdonald (who is an aide-de-camp to King Edward), commanding the British forces in Ceylon, in consequence of which the governor of that island is authorized to convene a court-martial to try General Macdonald. The charges, it is alleged are based on immoral acts.

LONDON, March 24.—The announcement from Colombo that Major General Macdonald is to be tried by court-martial on most serious charges of immoral conduct will undoubtedly prove to be the greatest sensation in British military circles since the case of Col. Valentine Baker, who was sentenced Aug. 2, 1875, to pay a fine of £500 and to undergo twelve months' imprisonment for indecently assaulting a lady in a railway carriage. General Macdonald was regarded as one of Britain's great soldiers. He rose from the ranks in the Gordon Highlanders to his present position, and the services list shows no more honorable war record than that of Macdonald's, while few officers possess more harder won decorations. He was extremely popular in army and in civil life.

PARIS, March 24.—Major General Sir Hector Macdonald, commanding the British forces in Ceylon and one of the foremost officers in the British army, against whom charges based on immoral acts were filed some time ago, committed suicide today at the Hotel Regina here. He shot himself in the right temple shortly after noon, and expired a few minutes later. The general was alone in his small chamber on the mezzanine floor of the hotel at the time of the tragedy. One of the attendants heard the pistol shot, and opening the door, saw the general's figure protruding from a bullet wound in the head. She ran screaming to the balcony overlooking the lobby of the hotel, where many guests, including the proprietor of the hotel was the first to reach the expiring man. Medical help was immediately summoned, but was found to be useless. The general died quickly on the fatal act. The commissary of police was notified, and accompanied by a doctor, proceeded to a preliminary investigation. No money or papers of any kind were found in Sir Hector's baggage. Two notes written in English were found lying on a table in his room, and these were taken possession of by the authorities, but it is understood that their contents have no bearing on the suicide. In the general's coat, lying on the bed, were found some photographs. The British embassy and consulate were notified later, and Consul General Inglis visited the hotel and took charge of the body. The French officials took possession of the revolver, which was of nine millimetres calibre and apparently new.

Those who had been conversed with by Sir Hector Macdonald, say he showed no signs of excitement or mental worry.

General Sir Hector Archibald Macdonald, O.B.E., D.S.O., A.D.C. to the King, G. G. M. G., rose from the ranks to his late high position in the army. Before his enlistment he had been employed as a clerk in a dry goods shop, and his general intelligence and good education soon led to his promotion to a non-commissioned officer. His subsequent advances were mostly won on the battle field. He served in the Afghan war in 1878-80, and in the Boer war in 1880-81, and in the Sudanese operations was over Macdonald had a medal and certain decorations. In 1881 he served in the disastrous Boer war, and was distinguished by his despatches. The Egyptian war found him again in the front, now a commissioned officer, rapidly advancing in rank. At Suakin he won the D. S. O., and the Victoria Cross, and was of course mentioned in despatches. Already he wore the Khedive's Star, but when in 1893 he was appointed to his high position in the expedition gave him his next great opportunity and in 1898 he was breveted Major-General, and had more medals. It is said that he had served in the defence of Cape Colony, and in the South Africa, where he served under the late General Buller, whom he succeeded in the command of the Highland Brigade in the Boer war. His personal character began to be circumscribed by the military duties of his office, and he is likely at command-in-chief.

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AMHERST NEWS. AMHERST, March 24.—The sugar camps are in full blast at Macoon, a fortnight ahead of the usual time. Your correspondent spent yesterday in the forest primeval watching the gathering of the sap and sampling the syrup and candy. The sap tins were full; in fact, like the Psalmist's cup, running over. Not one-quarter of it could be gathered, and the rain coming on, would deteriorate the quality. The muddy roads from the station make approach difficult, but one can get in on horseback or by shank's mare; the prevailing mood, especially with the small boy, who is much in evidence round the sugar pot.

JUMPED QUANTINE. The smallpox patient named Miller, who has been confined in the epidemic hospital for the past week, was so far recovered yesterday that he was able to leave, and it was the intention of the board of health to liberate him tomorrow for the Kingston quarantine, where he would be placed in a house under quarantine. It was done. Although the patient is still recovering, it was deemed inadvisable to quarantine him for a few days as a precaution.
