Trom an extra of the Civilian (Galveston) of the 12th March:

"By the steamer Dayton, instarrived vesterday from Austin, dated on Monday last, stating that intelligence had reached that place, that San Antonio was taken by Mexicans on Saturday last Capt. Doton who brought the intelligence from Austin, states that the number of Mexicans was large, numbering several thousands.

FIRES IN NEW YORK.

Several destructive fires have recently occurred New-York, destroying property to an immensement, and rendering houseless a greater number families than at any previous calamity of the families than at any previous calamity of the dial. About 2 o'clock on the 1st April the first fire minericed in the house 151. Washington street; was got under without doing much damage,—alf an hour afterwards the second fire broke out, rear of the gracery, corner of Delancey & Christiteets occupied by Mr. Schrienberger; nearly the houses in the immediate neighbourhood on instite. Delancy, Forsyth, Broom and Eldridge eats, amounting to about seventy were destroyed, the much valuable property. While this fire was if burning, another broke out in the centre of the ock bounded by Pearl, Elm, Anthony and Centro tests, by which about twenty more buildings were stroyed. These were of little value, but thickly habried. At halfpast 12 at right another fire oke out in the two story building corner of Maidralane and Nassat street, but was got under—large Barn containing a great quantity of hay, of Harrisman, near Jersey city, was entirely conmed, with the whole of its contents on the afterion of the 31st March.
