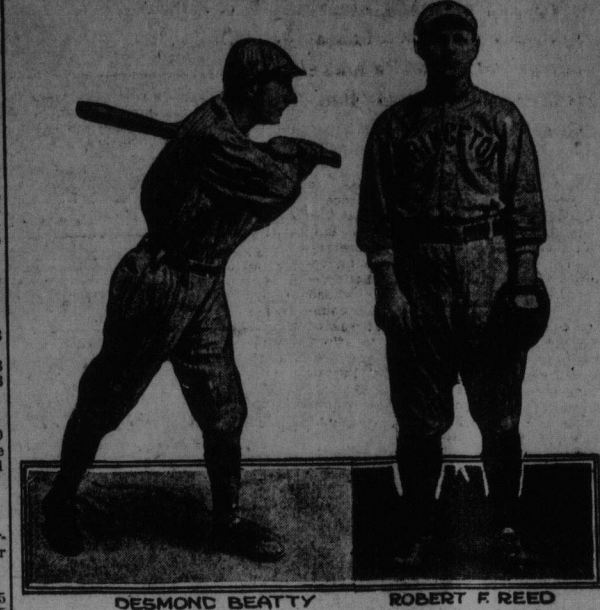

When John J. McGraw, manager of the Giants, announced the signing of Hans Lohert he declared that Lohert would be given a fair trial to win the third base bag on the club, but that there were two other candidates for the position, youngsters who showed unusual promise and who would force Lohert to work hard for the job. These recruits are Robert F. Reed, last year third baseman and shortstop for the champion Poughkeepsie team, of the Atlantic League.

Besides these men, who will undergo the spring "acid test" alongside Lohert, there is "Eddie" Grant, substitute third baseman last year and still trying for a regular job. This probably will mean a heated dispute among the quartet for the position, and possibly will result in the Polo Ground a man fitted to take the place once filled by Arthur Devlin.

## A BIG LEAGUE ESTIMATE, RECEIPTS AND EXPENSES

The average annual pay roll in the major leagues today is about \$80,000 for each club. There are 16 clubs under O. B.'s standard, bringing up the total salary list to \$1,280,000. Each club in the O. B. circuit carries about 25 men, totalling something like 400 ball players, who therefore average \$3,200 each a season.

Against this we have annual receipts which is an even more extended guess. Last season in the two big leagues there were 3,508 games played—1250 in the National and 1258 in the American.

Granting that the average daily attendance was about 3,000, the total paid attendance would be in the neighborhood of 7,500,000 for the year. At an average charge of 50 cents per fan this would leave the total gate receipts around \$3,750,000. Out of this, in addition to the salaries of 1,280,000 the owners had to pay the travelling expenses and hotel bills for 400 men for three of the six playing months, the amount of time spent by each club on the road.

At an average charge of \$4 a day for 400 men for 90 days, the total would be \$144,000 for hotels alone. With three jumps a year half-way across the continent and various switches back and forth, the railroad and Pullman fares will verge upon another \$100,000. Added to this are
