The capture of Jablonitza and Fereskul, on the Cherekosh River, which forms the boundary between Galicia and Bukowina, is announced. Jablonitza is about twenty miles north of the Hungarian border.

### BRITISH SECRETARY OF WAR **CONTRASTS SITUATION WITH** THAT COUPLE MONTHS AGO

Enemy Forced to Abandon Verdun to Meet British Advance on Somme--Relieved French and Allowed Russia to Drive Back Austrians--The Outlook Encouraging.

London, Aug. 22—David Lloyd George, secretary of war, in the House of Commons today, contrasted what he termed the extraordinary change in a couple of months in the relative positions of the Entente Allies and the Central Powers on all the fronts except Mesopotamia, where climatic conditions had kept the British forces quiescent. Mr. Lloyd George said the criticisms of the British operations on the Somme front, on the ground of their failure to break through the German lines, were unjustified. The Germans, having two alternatives, said Mr. Lloyd George, chose the alternative of bringing troops and guns from Verdun to prevent the British from breaking through.

"That suited our purpose," the war secretary continued. "It relieved the pressure on Verdun, and prevented the enemy from pourling his forces into the Russian theatre to support the Austrians against General Brussiloffs thrust.

"The German accounts of our losses on the Somme are fudicrously seasons and though deplorable, have been relatively low, as compared with those of the Germans. The French and ourselves have captured positions on th Somme front whence the course of the campaign is visible, and I think in the dim distance we can see the end.

"France is equipped, and Russia is rapidly becoming equipped. Italy's equipment has amazed her best friends. Germany has missed her chance, and she knows it. It would be a mistake to underrate the nature of our task, which requires all of our resources. But surveying the whole situation, and upon the advice of those more competent than myself to express an opinion, I do not hesitate to say that what this country and her allies have to do is to march together steadily, and work together loyally, as they have done in the past, to ensure that victory will rest on their banners."

### ALLIED THRUST IN SALONIKI IS RAPIDLY DEVELOPING INTO

### ALLIED FORCES CAPTURE SERIES OF IMPORTANT HEIGHTS WEST OF VARDAR, AFTER HARD FIGHTING IN SALONIKI

Second Contingent of Italians Land Ready to Aid in Big Drive-Serbians Continue Victorious Progress in Mountainous Regions-British Artillery Checks Skirmishers Along Sturma Front.

Paris, Aug. 22.—The Allied forces have captured a series of heights est of the Vardar river, on the Saloniki front, according to the offiial report issued by the war office tonight. On both wings adve detachments have fallen back before the counter-offensive of the Bul-

"The battle continued on August 21 on the whole front of the alied armies on the Saloniki line. In the centre the British-French forces have violently bombarded Bulgarian positions on both sides of the Lake Doiran, while our infantry established itself on the southern spurs of

"West of the Vardar our troops have occupied a line of heights near Ljumnica, and have maintained their positions at all points despite violent counter-attacks by the enemy.

"The Serbian army has continued its progress in the mountainous zone between the Cerna and Moglenica rivers. On the two wings the enemy, at the cost of very heavy losses, has succeeded in pushing back ich attacked on August 20 west of Seres, Bulgarian forces more than a division in strength, in order to delay their fallen back on the Struma. All the passages of the river are solidly held by the Allies. On the extreme left wing the Serbian army, after a very hot battle, lasting two days, which was undertaken to retard the advance of the right wing of the Bulgarians, has taken its principal defensive position in the neighborhood of Lake Ostrovo."

MORE ITALIANS AT SALONIKI.


