Varieties.

HOOP-MAKING MACHINE.
A philanthropic clergyman of Chicago named Campbell, has invented a machine for making hoops which it is said will make a complete revolution in this branch of industry, which is greater in extent than most people have any idea of. It has been calculated that the number of hoops used every year in the United States is two thousand millions. In Canada one hundred millions are made annually. In both countries the home demand is very great, and very large quantities are required for export.

It is proposed, we understand, to introduce these hoop-making machines into Canada, where the supply of the raw material is practically inexhaustible. The present mode of making hoops is a slow and tedious process, and it is a means of giving employment to a large number of people, and of adding considerably to the general wealth, a very great benefit would be conferred upon the country. And this benefit, the introduction and general use of Mr. Campbell's machines will, in all likelihood, confer. It has been calculated that hoops can be made

more cheaply in Canada than in any other country in the world. We now send away considerable quantities of hoops to the United States. In that state they are of comparatively little value. By the aid of Mr. Campbell's machines the hoops could be manufactured here, at a price which would enable them to be sold at a good profit in the United States. In all the unpromoted markets of the world there is a demand for hoops, and the trade in Great Britain, the West Indies and South America, Canadians would be able to supply the demand, and thus to bring a large and profitable industry in Canada would be a very great benefit.

The surveyor general laid on the table the crown lands report for 1884. Messrs. Adams & Park moved for a number of returns referred to in proceedings of Feb. 27. The Government promises to furnish the information asked for, except in two or three instances, as in the motion for correspondence, applications etc.; from the Northern & Western Railway Co., the Dominion Society and the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were read a second time.

The House took recess till 2.30 o'clock. Mr. Adams gave notice of motion for the return of debentures issued during the current year; also for statements of monthly and debit accounts furnished to the local by the Dominion Government in 1884.

The chief commissioner said the department would consider any suggestions. When Mr. Park moved for correspondence relating to the appointment of fishery officers during the years 1883-84, the attorney general said no such correspondence was had with or applications made to the government. The rest of the motion was postponed to the appointment of a provincial fishery officer. There was no appointment of Hon. W. M. Kelly as a fishery officer or correspondent in the year 1884. All amounts paid to the inspector, Mr. Phair, for the year 1884 will be found in the auditor general's report of that year, and all similar payments made to the inspector of fishery for the year 1884 will be found in the auditor general's report of that year.

Mr. Adams moved, seconded by Dr. Black, for information regarding a seizure made by James D. Barker on Little River Lake, in Northumberland.

The surveyor general said the instructions to Mr. Barker were confidential and could not be furnished to the public. The rest of the information would be given. Mr. Adams said he never heard that such instructions were considered confidential.

Mr. McManus moved, seconded by Dr. Black, which was carried:—
Resolved, That a committee consisting of five members be appointed to investigate the claims of Robert Ellis, of Bathurst, for arrears due him on account of certain lumber cut on the lands of the Dominion of Gloucester in the year 1875 and that said committee shall report on the 1st of April next.

Messrs. McManus, Black, Park, Perley and White were appointed a committee under the resolution.

The attorney general moved as follows, which was carried:—
Resolved, That a committee, consisting of seven members, be appointed, to whom will be referred the question of the Municipalities Act, and that Mr. Phair, Mr. Whelan, Mr. Burrell, Hon. Mr. Cote and Mr. Adams, Dr. Black, and Mr. Cote do comprise said committee.

The provincial secretary laid on the table a statement of the civil indebtedness of the Dominion of Northumberland. The surveyor general moved the house into a committee of the whole on the bill to amend the Fisheries Act, 1884. Mr. Glaister in the chair. The surveyor general said the object of the bill was to give power to grant fishery licenses for short periods in the case of urgent necessities. Under the present law streams had remained unlicensed. Tourists often wanted short licenses and could not wait until the notice was given for the opening of the season.

Mr. McAdair thought there was some objection to the bill; licenses are unpopular with the fishermen. Mr. Lablache said he did not think it would be consistent to lease streams reserved for breeding purposes. Salmon fishing was becoming yearly of greater importance and should be carefully guarded. There was too much fishing already on such streams.

The surveyor general said the bill did not authorize the leasing of reserved streams.

Mr. Flewelling thought that the section was open to the objection which Mr. Lablache made and asked the surveyor general to amend it.

The attorney general said that the law authorized the leasing of all streams was a matter of policy to be governed by the needs of the public service. He thought that the bill was not objectionable in passing the bill as it stands. The bill was agreed to.

Mr. McManus introduced a bill to amend chapter 47 of the consolidated statutes—Elections to general assembly.

Mr. Spakeur asked if the bill did not involve a charge on the revenue.

Mr. McManus said that the object of the bill was to equalize the representation. At present some counties were not fairly represented. If the government would agree to the bill, it would be a great benefit to the province.

Mr. McAdair said he did not think it involved a charge on the revenue because the bill did not come in force until after the expiration of the indemnity act. Perhaps the next house would not want pay.

Mr. McAdair said he would like to see the bill.

The surveyor general introduced a bill to prevent the destruction of woods, forests and other property by fire.

The house adjourned.

FREDERICTON, MARCH 3.
After the second reading of bills, Mr. McAdair gave notice of a resolution for Thursday next.

The Local Legislature.

FREDERICTON, MARCH 2.
The bill to amend the act relating to county courts and the bill to abolish the Legislative Council were read a second time.

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FREDERICTON, MARCH 2.
In the Legislative Council to-day there was a debate on the address in reply to the speech, which address was amended in several important particulars. Then the address was adopted as a whole. Hon. Mr. Harrison, the member of the Government in the Council, declined to be on the committee to prevent the address to the Lieutenant Governor, as the amendments were objectionable to him. Messrs. Hamilton, Ryan, and Young were appointed.

Also by adding the following enumerated articles to the free list:—
1. Precious stones—viz., agate, amethyst, aquamarine, bloodstone, carnelian, crystal, emerald, garnet, jasper, malachite, opal, obsidian, onyx, peridot, quartz, sardonyx, sapphire, topaz and turquoise, not polished nor otherwise manufactured.
2. Bicarbonate of soda.
3. Sulphate of iron (copperas).
4. Indigo auxiliary.
5. Fancy grasses dried but not colored or otherwise manufactured.
6. Oil cake meal.
7. Paintings in oil or water colors, the production of Canadian artists, under the Regulations to be made by the Minister of Customs.

By adding to the following articles now on the free list, the explanations and alterations attached to each respectively:—
1. Bolting Cloths, of silk or woolen, not made up.
2. Bones, not ground or otherwise manufactured.
3. Duck, for belting and hose, when imported by manufacturers of rubber goods for use in the factories.
4. Mineral Waters, natural, not in bottle.
5. Pitch (pine)—in packages of not less than 15 gallons.
6. Pumice Stone, ground or unground.
7. Quercitron or extract of oak bark, for tanning.
8. Resin, in packages of not less than 10 gallons.
9. Steel railway bars or rails, not including iron or steel rails.
10. Tar (pitch) in packages of not less than 15 gallons.

By repealing all duties chargeable under any act now in force or any of the articles hereinafter mentioned, except so far as they are the same as those hereinafter mentioned and substituting therefor the rates of duty hereinafter mentioned respectively:—
1. Costume cloths, serges and similar fabrics under 25 inches wide, 25 per cent. ad valorem.
2. Winceys of all kinds, 25 per cent. ad valorem.
3. Pickles and sauces, 25 per cent. ad valorem.
4. Barrels containing petroleum or its products, or any mixture of which petroleum is a part, a specific duty of 40 cents each.
5. Cutlery not otherwise provided for, 25 per cent. ad valorem.
6. Red prussiate of potash, 10 per cent. ad valorem.
7. Mr. Pitt ad valorem for return for all official assignees under the insolvency act of 1869 and the subsequent acts, allowing their estates and settlements, etc. The government objected to the motion as being an entangling enormous cost and serving no practical purpose. The motion was withdrawn.

Mr. Bergeron moved for correspondence between this government and the local government of Quebec about the working of the Dominion License Act. Hon. Mr. Black made a strong inditement of the policy of the Dominion Government in continuing to exercise authority in issuing licenses under the Dominion act which the Supreme Court has declared to be unconstitutional. He said that the confusion which had prevailed for the past two years in the Dominion act was due to the circumstances of the Government ought rather to suspend the act or repeal those parts which were unconstitutional. Mr. Girouard (James Carter), although a conservative, said it was the government's duty to suspend the act pending an appeal to England. Mr. Lister, speaking upon the subject, said that the Ontario government, warned by persons that if they took out Dominion licenses without a provincial license they would be punished to the utmost extent of the law. He held that the liquor trade in Ontario would accept a license at the hands of the Dominion government. He charged that the tendency of this parliament was towards breaking up the federal system. After further debate the motion was carried, and the house adjourned at 11 o'clock.

CHANGES IN THE TARIFF.
OTTAWA, MARCH 3.
Resolved that it is expedient to amend the tariff of customs duties and schedule of free goods as follows:—
A. By adding to the free list, schedule B. the following articles now admitted free, by orders in council, under authority of sub-section 12 of section 230 of the Customs Act, 1883:—
Gas coke, when used in Canadian manufactures only.
Woolen rags.
Steel imported for use in the manufacture of skates.
Musk, in pods or in grains.
White shellac for manufacturing purposes.
Jute cloth, as taken from the loom, neither pressed, mangled, calendered, nor in any other way finished and not less than 42 inches wide, when imported to be manufactured into bags only.
Salt cakes—being a sulphate of soda, when imported by manufacturers of glass and soap for their own use in their works.
Foot gears.—The refuse of the cotton seed after the oil is pressed out.
Tagging metal—Plain, japanned or coated, in coils, not over 15 inches in width, when imported by manufacturers of shoe and corset laces for use in their factories.
Loose beams—For the manufacture of horse and cattle food.
Hoop iron—Not exceeding three-eighths of an inch in width and being 25 gauge or thinner, used for the manufacture of tubular rivets.
Buckram—For the manufacture of hat and bonnet shapes.
Recovered rubber and rubber substance, silver and German silver, in sheets, for manufacturing purposes.
Steel of No. 20 gauge and thinner, but not thinner than No. 30 gauge, to be used in the manufacture of corset steels.
Clock springs and shoe chains, when

imported by the manufacturers of such articles for use in their factories.
Cotton yarn, finer than No. 40 unbleached, bleached or dyed, and not finer than No. 90, for the manufacture of Italian cloths and worsted fabrics.
Steel sheets of not less than 11, or over 18 wire gauge and costing not less than \$2.75 per ton of 2,240 lbs., when imported by manufacturers of shovels and spades for use exclusively in such manufacture in their own factories.
Red Liquor—A crude acetate of alumina, prepared from pyroligneous acid, for dyeing and calico printing.
