LONDON, March 3. Lord Granville sent a long and very aportant despatch by telegraph yesterday to DeGiers, Russian foreign arding the occupation by Russian troops within the boundaries of Afghanistan and which command the passes leading to Herat and Cabul. Russia is also warned that Great Britain will under n circumstances entertain Russian demands for the cession of any portion of territory belonging to her ally, the Ameer of Afghanistan. 


