Her love affair with Prince Alexander of Battenberg and I Bulgaria was entirely of her own seeking, any many of her relatives were in favor of her marrying him simply on the scores of propriety and to avoid further worry about her. When Prince Alexander forsook her and married Mile Loisinger she was almost beside herself with disappointment and rage, so that for a time the question of putting her under forcuble restraint was considered. OBLITERATED!

The Town of Fort de Franc Wiped Out by Fire.

5,660 People Homeless—Twelve Bodies Taken from the Ruins.

Details concerning the destruction of the town of Fort de France, in the French Island of Martinique, have just been received. Gov. Casse, of Martinique, sent an appeal for assistance to the Governor of Trinidad, Sir William Robinson, assuring him that three-quarters of the town had been burned and that more than 5,000 persons were without homes and food. Gov. Robinson at once convened L. Legislative Council who voted \$2,000 to aid the sufferers.

It appears that on Sunday morning, June 22, a telegram was received at St. Pierre, the capital, announcing that a terrible file was reging in Fort de France, and requesting the services of men and pumps. The steamers, with men and pumps on board, left St. Pierre at once, and on their arrival at Fort de France, the whole scaboard was found to be in flames to the water's edge. The people were tired out and disheartened after

The cathedral was in flames, and was soon in ruins, together with its magnificent organ. The panic now became general. Women and children were screaming and running hither and thither and furniture was being thrown out of the windows into the streets, until they became almost impassable. At the last moment, when it was too late,

to arrest the progress of the fire. Terrific explosions were heard and whole blocks of buildings were seen to fall, killing some and wounding many persons. The Pensionnat des Sœurs, the post and telegraph offices and the Hotel Bedeiat, though escaping at first, were now in flames, and at 5 p.m. 1,500 of the best houses in the town were burning. At the other extremity of the huge furnace, which covers

NINETY SQUARE ACRES, the fight with the fire was gallantly and courageously carried on, but the wind was high and the houses were rapidly burned, and, falling bodily across the streets, communicated the flames to the houses on the other side. At night the fire had consumed everything between the Rue de Fosse and the sea and between the Savane and the River Madame. At about 10 p.m. the houses at the bottom of the Rue du Government were attacked, and only by strenuous efforts were the presbytery and the gendarmerie saved. Had they fallen the town must have been consumed. It was right here that the progress of the flames was stayed.

is very considerable, 1,700 houses having been destroyed, valued at \$2,400,000, and furniture, etc., valued at \$750,000. It is impossible at this moment to tell the number of victims. Twelve bodies have however, been recovered. Fifteen soldiers are receiving attention at the hospital, many of them seriously, and one, it is said, fatally wounded. The number of civilians wounded is considerable. Fully three-quarters of the town is destroyed as regards area, and seven-eighths of the inhabitants are homeless. Among the public buildings destroyed are the poor house, cathedral, custom house, town hall, convent of the Securs de St. Joseph, bureau de revues, l'inspection le genie, the slaughter house and the Usine Pointe Simon. The celebrated library has also been destroyed. The various British West India Islands have promptly aided with grants of money their afflicted sister colony.

THE WORLD OF WORK.

The British Cabinet Not in Sympathy with the Postmen-Railway Employes Uneasy.

London, July 11.—Yesterday's Cabinet Council devoted much of its time to discussion of the postal situation, and sustained the action of Sir Edward Bradshum and Postmaster-General Raikes. The Cabinet authorized Mr. Raikes to resort to any means he thought fit to crush a strike of the postmen.

It is asserted by the postmen, and not denied by the authorities, that the Postmen's Union is full of official spies, who keep the Government posted on all the plans of the men, and have also obtained a large amount of information connecting many prominent politicians with the agitation.

They also demand a monthly holiday without loss of pay. The police authorities have not yet acted upon the petition.



A Narrow Escape.

An Associated Press dispatch of yesterday's date gives the following additional details of the yachting accident referred to in yesterday's ADVENTISER: "On Tuesday last Hon. Sam Blake passed down the river in a small steam yacht, accompanied by his son and two London gentlemen. When opposite Gananoque a serious accident occurred. Mr. Blake was at the wheel, and the pilot was giving him instructions how to reach Jack-straw Light, when suddenly the boiler exploded with a loud noise. The naptha burnt the back of the pilot's hands, but not seriously. None of the others were injured, but they were terribly frightened. There were two barrels of naptha in the tank at the time. Had it become ignited there would have been none of the tourists left to tell the tale. As it was the engine was ruined and the woodwork torn considerably. The yacht was towed to Gananoque, where she was shipped back to Toronto. Mr. Blake knelt in prayer after the accident. Mr. Blake's traveling companions were Geo. T.
