WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—The Supreme Court of the United States, contrary to the predictions of the most eminent lawyers who practice before it, has granted to the counsel representing the British Government and the Attorney-General of Canada leave to file an application for a writ of prohibition to prevent the District Court of Alaska from proceeding to carry out its decree of forfeiture in the case of the schooner Sayward, libeled for unlawfully taking seals within the waters of Behring Sea. The rule is made returnable the second Monday in April. The preliminary question has thus been settled in favor of the owners of the schooner Sayward and the representatives of the British Government, and the case must now be discussed upon its merits.

The Assasin and His Victim
Both Identified.

CHARLOTTE, Mich., Feb. 3.—City Marshal Ed. Bates, of Lansing, and Deputy Sheriff James Skinner landed in Charlotte, Eaton county, at midnight, with the supposed murderer of the young girl found in Grand River, near Dimondale. The ferreting out of the crime and the arrest are due to the clever detective work of Bates. The girl was Nellie Griffin and she left Coldwater last Wednesday with a man calling himself Hendershot. She was 12 years of age, with dark blue eyes and very fair complexion. She was sent to the State public school three years ago. Last Tuesday an old man, who gave his name as Hendershot, a farmer of Parma, Jackson county, called at the school and asked for a girl to work in his family. He answered every question so satisfactorily and seemed so amiable and pleasant that on Wednesday Supt. Newkirk let him have the Griffin girl, after wiring the county agent at Jackson to keep an eye on her welfare.

The body found in Grand River corresponded to the description of Nellie Griffin. The officers having learned of Nellie's leaving the school as stated above, wired to Jackson, and finding that no such man as Hendershot lived in Parma they at once drove to Dimondale and arrested Edward Canfield, an old farm hand employed by C. Harrison, near Dimondale, who answered to the description of the man who was seen on the train with the girl, and who got off with her at Dimondale.

After being locked up the prisoner confessed his real name was Russel! C. Canfield. He went to Jonesville Tuesday, and then to Coldwater, and said he told Supt. Newkirk he was from Parma, and asked for a girl. He did not see the girl until she was brought to him by the school employes at the depot. When he left the train at Dimondale he started for Harrison's house, but struck off through the wood and finally the two sat down on the log by the water, where the hody was found.

Five Times Married and Hangs Herself at Last.

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—Further search of the papers left by Mrs. Catherine McKnight, the old lady who committed suicide by hanging yesterday, shows her life was made up of thrilling and romantic events. She had five husbands, and from three of them she secured divorces. During the civil war she was a persistent and troublesome spy, and many of her wild escapades are known. She was born in New Hampshire in 1830. Her maiden name was Catherine Williams. When but 18 year old she met Harry Wilson, a dashing young fellow, and fell in love with him. Her parents objected to the match and the pair eloped. When war was declared her young husband hurried to the front and not many months clapsed before Mrs. Wilson went after him. She was installed in the quarters of the New Hampshire regiment, and became the daughter of the regiment. During April, 1863, her husband was captured by the Confederates while on a secret mission and sent off to the Louisville prison. "The soldiers' lassie," as everybody called her, waited in vain for the return of her husband. It was many months before she learned his fate. She then decided to become a Union spy and go to Louisville, and if possible, obtain her husband's release. She spent many months about the prison in fattle efforts to have the 'young prisoner of war liberated.

Attempt to Involve the Portuguese—Fifty Persons Killed and Two Hundred Wounded.

Lishon, Feb. 4.—One result of the inquiry made by the military and civil authorities into the cause of the revolt of troops at Oporto on Saturday is the discovery that an effort was made to involve the Portuguese navy in the uprising. Two sergeants of marines belonging to the Sagres, a Government corvette, lying in the roads outside of Oporto, endeavored to incite the crew of that vessel to mutiny and seize the ship. The sergeants were arrested while trying to arrange for the proposed plot. One of the sergeants, named Cardoso, when questioned, declared he was a supporter of the project to establish a federal republic, having its seat of government at Oporto and independent of Lisbon. He added that it was expected the movement in Oporto would have the support of the Spanish revolutionary party. A decree just issued announces that all crimes connected with the rising at Oporto come under the jurisdiction of the military tribunals. This is interpreted to mean that all the civilians as well as the soldiers connected with the ringleaders will probably be shot. It is now stated 50 persons were killed and 200 injured in the fight following the revolt of the garrison at Oporto.

An insurgent leader declares it was the intention of the insurgents to sack Oporto and shoot all officials.

THE GUILLOTINE. Murderer Eyraud Meets His Fate with

Paris, Feb. 3.—Michel Eyraud, the mur-

Eyraud met his fate with fortitude or sullen resignation. There were few witnesses of the execution, owing to the fact that it was not generally known that the famous criminal would meet his fate to-day. When the governor of the prison, La Roquet, and the prison chaplain, Abbe Faure, were ushered into Eyraud's cell a short time previous to the hour fixed for the condemned man's execution, they found he was already up and dressed, evidently forewarned, contrary to the rules, by some kind-hearted prison official. Eyraud declined a glass of cognac which was tendered him by one of the wardens, and in spite of the earnest solicitations of Abbe Faure, the murderer positively — even angrilly—refused to listen to the priest's prayers, to pray himself, or to have any religious rites performed in his behalf.

But Eyraud's iron will was not to be shaken even in the presence of death, and he continued impatiently to refuse religious of consolation while on the death march to the guillotine. When pinioned and on the point of being overturned on the bascull of the guillotine, upon the plank which was to glide beneath the fatal suspended knife, Eyraud, with a movementasif of angry contempt or resentment refused to return the last kiss bestowed upon him by Abbe Faure, as is customary in the case of criminals on the point of being executed.

The action of the guillotine, once Eyraud's neck was well beneath the uprights, was instantaneous. There was a flash, and all was over. Negotiations were entered into between the city of London and the town of London East for amalgamation early in the year 1885. The terms of amalgamation were agreed upon by a report of a joint committee appointed by the two councils, and the electors of London East voted in favor of amalgamation on March 2, 1885. A bill was passed by the Local Legislature and received the sanction of the Lieutenant-Governor on March 30, 1885. The only thing remaining them to be done to render amalgamation complete was some minor details respecting assets and a statement of the proportion of the county debt which the city should assume. These details were afterwards settled by arbitration.

PARLIAMENT DISSOLVED.

One month from Thursday next the Dominion general elections will be held.
