The details of the terms have not eaked out, but it is certain that the company are willing to pay \$20,000 per annum, for the privilege of operating the road for twenty years. They are anxious to give a lump sum or the lease, doing away with the per-

centage system, as is now in vogue. The present lease calls for \$10,000 a year lease, and a percentage of the earnings over a certain figure. How It Worked Out. This amounted to about \$6,750 in
