One hundred and fifty thousand tons of barley were taken from the brewers and malsters on March 1, and a further 200,000 tons would be saved yearly by restricting the standard of barrelage and using substitutes which are vastly more economical.

The brewing materials for 1918-19, Mr. Clines added, would be equivalent to 512,000 tons of shipping, compared to 1,500,000 tons early in the war. The brewing material would amount to something less than 3 per cent of the one-fourth of these materials could be recovered in the form of animal food.

# BY ZEPPELINS

Several Dirigibles in Last Night's Raid-British Bomb German City.

London, March 13 .- Three zeppelins ook part in last night's air raid on England. One of them dropped four bombs on Hull.

The other airships flew about aim essly over country districts, dropping bombs, and then proceeded back to sea. One woman died of shock in consequence of the raid.

The Germans have sustained such heavy losses in zeppelins that they have employed them only at infrequent intervals in the last year for raids on England, substituting airplanes. The last previous zeppelin raid on England was October 19, 1917, when 34 persons were killed and 55 wounded. On returning the zeppelin fleet was put to rout by the French, five of the dirigibles being brought down.

BRITISHERS RAID COBLENZ. London, March 12 .- British aviators have dropped a ton of bombs on the province of Prussia, according to an official communication issued tonight. Coblenz, which is situated in one of the finest sections of the Rhine, has a population of nearly 50,000. It is a strongly fortified town, and on the opposite bank of the Rhine, on a lofty rock eminence The town does a large trade by water and rail.
