WIRELESS INVENTION REMOVES OBSTACLES TO CLEAR SENDING

Radio Messages Will Be Perfected by Elimination of the "Static."

New York, Nov. 19.—An invention which has taken the "static" out of wireless telegraphy, removing thereby the greatest obstacle to the clear transmission of radio messages, has been perfected by Roy A. Weagant, chief engineer of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America, it was annunced last night graph Company of America, it was announced last night.

According to Edward J. Nally, vice-president and general manager of the company, who made the announcement, the invention not only makes possible the sending of clear radio messages regardless of atmospheric conditions, but eliminates "interference," thereby making possible the operation of innumerable radio stations without "crossing" of messages.

The invention, Mr. Nally said, also does away with the necessity of constructing huge wireless towers.

Mr. Weagant, who is but 37, has been working on the problem of "static" for 15 years and took out patent papers on his invention shortly before the United States entered the war. By agreement with Mr. Weagant and the Marconi Company, the Government kept the invention secret, disclosing it only to the allied nations.

Saloniki, Nov. 18.—Over the shell-pit-ted ground of Gallipoli point the British landed peacefully at dusk tonight, using as stepping stones the bullet-riddled hulks grounded under fire in 1915. Louvain University was founded in 1423 by John of Brabant, and has ever since enjoyed first place among Belgian institutions of learning. It has always prided itself upon its theological teaching. In 1679, the university was established in the old Cloth Workers' Hall, a building dating from 1317, with long arcades and graceful pillars supporting the upper stories. Its library prior to the war contained upward of 100,000 volumes, with hundreds of rare manuscripts. In the 16th century, Louvain had as many as six thousand students. May the coming days give it as great a place in the life of the Europe to be as it has had in the life of Europe of the past.

Is not Belgium's distress as great as any of these; is she not as helpless, and is her suffering not as great? Thousands have died in Belgium, innocent victims in the most terrible war the world has ever known; thousands more are today without home or food or proper clothing. And even when peace has been declared and the world settles down to a normal life again, little Belgium and her brave people will still be laboring to adjust the great wrong that has been done her. Homes will have to be rebuilt, food supplies will have to be organized, agricultural lands will have to be cleared of the litter of battle, and industries, wherein the people must gain their living, must be reconstructed. It will be years before Belgium will be in a position to support herself again, and until that happy time comes the people of the countries who have been allied with her must contribute towards her maintenance.
