

The War News.

The latest official dispatches from St. Petersburg show that the blow to the Czar's arms in Wednesday's battle was even greater than at first reported. Besides the loss of the Petropavlovsk it now transpires that the torpedo boat destrover Bezstrashin was cut off from the rest of the Russian fleet and sunk by the Japs, all but five of her crew perishing. The battleship Pobieda, while maneuvering accidentally struck a mine but was able to return to the harbor with-

out loss of life. An official dispatch from Tokio says that Rear-Admiral Uriu reports sinking a battleship of the Petropavlovsk type and a torpedo boat destroyer. It is possible the ill-fated battleship truck one of Togo's mines. Dispatches from Wei Hai Wei say that the Japanese fleet had cut off the Russian armored cruiser

St. Petersburg is wrapped in gloom, but takes some comfort from the belief that the disaster was an accident and not the work of the Japs. Viceroy Alexieff has been ordered to Port Arthur to take command until Makaroff's successor is appointed.



BIG INCREASE IN TRADE

Passing of Winter Helps Business Throughout Dominion.

Ottawa, April 14.—Canada's aggregate foreign trade for the nine months ended March 31 amounted to the enormous total of \$345,37,651, or \$14,832,238 more than for the same period of the year previous. This is on the basis of imports for consumption and exports, and includes coin and bullion. The figures for March show a decide improvement in the exports, evidently caused by the improvement in the train service, due to the raising of the snow blockade. MAKAROFF

Record of Russia's Naval Hero Who Went Down With the Petropavlovsk.

St. Petersburg, April 14.—The late Vicedimiral Makaroff was appointed Feb. 25
last to the command of the Russian
Pacific fleet. He was one of the heroes
of the fighting on the River Danubeduring the Russo-Turkish war. Makaroff
and Shrydloff, who have since many times
been honored by their Government, were
at that time lieutenants in the Russian
navy, and volunteered to make a night
attack on a powerful Turkish ironclad.
With a torpedo boat they succeeded in
blowing up the Turkish vessel, and it
was claimed at the time, thereby made
the first successful demonstration of the
usefulness of torpedo boats in naval warfare. Makaroff originated the idea of
constructing the famous ice-breaking
steamer Ermak, which was built on the
Tyne from his designs. Since his appointment to the command of the Russian
Pacific fleet, Makaroff had shown nimself
to be a man of great courage and energy. Early in March he personally went
to the rescue of a Russian torpedo boat
destroyer, which was hard pressed by
the Japanese, and inspired the naval
forces under his command with a great
deal of enthusiasm. The last engagement, previous to the fight of yesterday,
in which Makaroff took part, occurred
March 27, when the admiral gallantly repulsed the second attempt of the Japanese to bottle up Port Arthur. On that

On that occasion Makaroff went out to meet the Japanese fleet. Admiral Makaroff made three visits to the United States—the first in 1862. He made a tour from California to New York in 1896, and in March. 1898, made a flying trip to Detroit. He left New York on March 25, of that year, to assume command of the Russian Ealtic squadron. The deceased admiral had frequently lectured on the construction of warships, which made him famous in naval circles throughout the world, and was the author of a book entitled "Discussion of Difficult Questions in Naval Tactics." At the end of the Russo-Turkish campaign Makaroff was promoted captain, and was decorated with the Orders of St. Vladimir and St. George, was presented with a sword of honor, and was given the title of adjutant to the late Emperor of Russia Makaroff was appointed chief of staff with the Baltic fleet, and in 1898 commanded that fleet. FRANCE SENDS CONDOLENCES. Paris, April 14. - President Loubet this morning telegraphed to Emperor the disaster to the Petropavlovsk and the death of Vice-Admiral Makaroff. This dispatch, together with those of Emperor William and the King of Italy, sent yesterday, is regarded here as significant of the acceptance of the European Governments that the sinking of the Petropavlovsk was due to an accident and did not occur during battle with the Japanese ships. The officials say condolences over the re-sult of a battle might involve questions of neutrality, whereas condolences over an accident do not involve neutrality.

Prior to the sending of M. Loubet's elegram, the French embassy at St. Petersburg had received an official assurance that the accident was due the Petropavlovsk striking a mine which had become loosened from its moorings during the recent storm. Some special dispatches received here assert that the Japanese torpedoed the Petropavlovsk, but the officials accept the Russian version of the sinking of






