At the time of writing-5.15 a. m .all indications point to the fact that the Ross Government has been sus tained by a materially reduced majority-so much so that it appears very doubtful that the Premier will be able to meet parliament with a working

However this may be, there is no denying the fact that the result is a severe disappointment to the Liberal-Conservatives. Although the telling inroads which have been made upon the none too substantial majority of the Government in the past parliament, demonstrate the trend of publie opinion and reveal the pulse of the people, there is no gainsaying the fact that the result as a whole falls short of the confident expectations of

the opposition party. It is difficult to assign reasons for the result at this time. Everyone recognizes the exceptional advantages which rest with the Government in a contest of this kind, more especially when it has been proven that the Government does not hesitate to use -even in questionable ways-the power it possesses in the campaign.

Mr. Whitney has made a gallant fight-an honorable, straightforward struggle. And that the result is not more encouraging is not attributable in any way to him, nor, we fancy, to the people

FRENCH CABINET RESIGNS.

Paris, May 28. - The resignation of the Premier, M. Waldeck-Rouss was formally communicated to the Cabinet at its meeting to-day. The entire Cabinet resigns with M. Waldeck-Rousseau. If publicly an-nounced now, the President would be obliged to remain in Paris and appoint a new Ministry. Consequently, the public announcement of the resignation of the Cabinet is deferred, in order to enable M. Loubet to visit his home after his absence in Russia.

TRAIN THROUGH A BRIDGE.

EMBLEM OF CANADA

THE HARD OR SUGAR MAPLE LEAF AND ITS RELATIVES.

A Queen City Regret That the Silver Maple Was Not Chesen Instead of the Grandest of Forest Trees-the Domin ion's National Leaf Does Not. How ever, Find City Life Congenial-Better

as 1: 1s. The maple chosen as our emblem is the hard or sugar maple, and although it is the grandest of forest trees in magnitude and beauty of aspect, it is not unnatural in the city, where all maples are on an equality, to regret that the silver maple, with its early buds and delicately-outlined leaves, has not been our choice, says The Toronto Globe. The silver maple blossomed three weeks ago in Toronto, and the male buds have already strewn the pavements where the streets enjoy the blessing of sunshine. As with most of the maples, there are male and female trees, but some are found bearing both sterile and fertile flowers. The flower buds, which have been giving promise of life all through the winter and have now come forth to fulfill their mission, are rounder and more obtuse than the foliage buds, which will soon elongate and fall away from the pale, green, downy leaves. The beauty of these leaves is in their deep, narrow sinuses and long, slender-pointed and sharply-indented lobes. The five main divisions and many sharp subdivisions of the leaf could not be more gracefully outlined than in nature's pattern. Their color, pale green above and silvery white beneath, matches their delicate outlines, and their slender, drooping stems enable them to turn with every passing wind, though not with the uniformity of the aspens. This is an early maple, and its familiar twowinged seeds will be on the ground and striving to sprout and take root before the seeds of our chosen emblem have matured on their stems. The red maple is also early, and its male buds are already tramped into the boulevards or swept into the carts of the scavangers. Their first appearance a few weeks ago, red, swelling and putting forth the deli-cate growth they had treasured through the winter was an an-nouncement of spring. The seeds of this maple ripen in May, turn a bright red and fall, taking root at once if conditions are favorable. The leaves are of a more substantial pat tern than those of the silver maple, the divisions between the lobes being angular and not so deep. In color they are a brighter green above and of a duller white beneath, but they can be distinguished from the leaves of the sugar maple by their sharply serrated margis. They present the most beautiful of autumn colors.

The sugar maple, which we claim They present the as our very own, does not find the city congenial, and does not attain the splendid proportions familiar in the woods of eastern Ontario and Quebec. It is not a precocious tree, and the winter buds, both of flower and leaves, are still dormant on its branches. Both open about the same time, and while the soft, downy young leaves are shedding the elon gated scales that have encased them

during the winter the flowers are developing in yellowish clusters on slender stems. The male and female trees are generally distinct, but both fertile and sterile flowers are sometimes found in separate clusters on the same tree. The five-lobed leaf, sharply toothed and divided by rounded sinuses, is familiar as the emblem of the Dominion. This is the tree of the sugar bush, and that Canadian has missed something out of his life who does not associate it with the "sweet" recollections of his childhood. The smoke of the open fire, the paths through the snow, the quivering of the heat, the piece of pork suspended over the great kettle to prevent the sap boiling over, the dripping spiles and basswood troughs. the looped twig as a tester, and a heterogeneous assortment of kitchen utensils pressed into the service for sugaring off, make a harmonious background of memory that always comes with the first announcement of sugar, and those who see it with the eye of understanding will pardon the complaint that maple sugar is not like it used to be. The maple stands in many and varying backgrounds. Perhaps the handsome grain in the back of a violin recalls the occasional discovery of "birdseye" stick in the woodpile, and efforts to split it so as to show both the bird's eyes and the wavy It rivals the soft maple in the brilliancy of its autumn tints, and paints a much bolder landscape. The rich carpet with which it strews the ground hastens to early decay and does its part towards producing the moist warmth we delight in unthe name of "Indian summer. The sycamore maple is familiar

leaves have the characteristic five lobes, but are quite distinctive in appearance, being darker and thicker than those of the sugar maple, and having roundly and obscurely toothed margins. Like the Norway maple, it retains its foliage later than our native trees. The ash-leaved or California maple should be more popular, but its compound leaves of from three to five leaslets seem a bar to its claim to membership in the chosen family. It retains its seeds late into the fall, and seems reluctant to part with them even after its leaves have fallen. The little spike maple is met occasionally in our suburban woods. The five lobes of its leaves seem crowded into three, and they have a finely-wrinkled appearance, but they are smooth above and ny underneath. Its spike of nish yellow flowers is found ng the leaves in June. The moosewood that makes so much of the underbrush in Quebec and eastern Ontario is also a maple. But in its native forest our chosen emblem is supreme in her regal beauty, com-manding the homage of all other members of that handsome and in-

teresting family.

Berlin, May 29-Special police pre-cautions are being taken in connection with the annual spring parade of German troops to be held at the Templehof Field to-morrow, which will be witnessed by Emperor William, the Shah of Persia, and the Crown Prince of Siam. The precautionary measures are particularly aimed at photographers, by whom His Majesty has recently been much annoyed.

INSULTING LANGUAGE

Judge Houston tried a case this morning, in which six girls were interested. Three maidens of the name of Burk were sauntering down the street when they met three other maidens, two named Teft and one Hannon. The two different trios began calling each other names and the result was a charge of insulting lan-guage preferred by Miss Teft against one of the Burk girls. Judge Houston fined the defendant a dollar and costs after he had heard the evidence. He said that the complainant had evidently used as bad language as the defendant, and he would fine her, too, if a charge were laid against her Mrs. Teft, mother of the complainant, objected. She thought the fine not heavy enough and said that she knew her daughter would not use such language as the defense had accused her of using. She declared that she would appeal against the Judge's decision and get a heavier sentence against the Burk girls. The Judge was obliged to threaten her with the cells before she desisted.

PEACE CERTAIN London, May 29.-The peace situation to-night presents another transformation, since Mr. Balfour's statement in the House of Commons has revived the optimism that previously prevailed regarding the cessation of hostilities. Gen. Kitchener's censor allowed messages to leave Pretoria this morning announcing that Steyn Schalkburger, Delarey, De Wet, and others from the Boer assembly at Vereeniging have left Pretoria for Vereeniging to further confer with the burghers there. Their departure a full day before the latest Cabinet meeting was held is regarded as showing that to-day's meeting of the British Ministers confirmed their previous statement of terms, and that the Boers were given until Saturday to either accept or reject them. Tonight's news means that the question of peace or war is again transfer-red to the commandants, who will alone decide. A three days limit has

the placed on their councils.

The newspapers are unanimous in interpreting Mr. Balfour's statement. to mean that peace is assured. The careful phrasing of the statement was adopted only because of the memory of the many previous disappointments. Whether amnesty to the Cape Dutch will be granted, or the date on which the Boers will be allowed to vote for members of the Legislative Council has been decided is not indicated. The fate of the other principal questions debated by the Vereeniging conference is unknown, but the public is prepared to hear of an important British concession in the matter of

the right to bear arms. The Standard's Parliamentary cor respondent quotes an eminent Cor-respondent quotes an eminent Con-servative as saying that the Govern-ment has abandoned the banishment proclamation issued in South Africa in the case of those Boers who are now prepared to take the oath of allegiance, and also that it will be found that the Government is ready to place several influential Boers on the council which will advise Governor Milner during the period before the introduction of representative gov-

POLITICIANS' FADS.

BRITISH PARLIAMENTARIANS ASSERT MARKED FECULIARITIES.

bury, Lord Rosebery, the Duke of Devenshire and Mr. Chamberlain-A Very Racy Incident Anent the Duke

There is hardly a man in parliament-at least, among those assert marked peculiarity—some little trick of speech, which serves to distinguish him from others, and which, in most cases, acts as an index to his personal disposition and character, writes Livingstone Black in The Royal Magazine. Lord Salisbury is no exception to this rule. Broadly speaking, his peculiarity consists in the fact, that seated he is one man, and delivering a speech quite another. A deaf person would be sure to find Lord Salisbury's orations singularly unsatisfying, the language of gesture being in his case almost absent. He says the nastidex to his personal disposition and lmost absent. He says the nastiest and most crushing things about an opponent without altering his at-titude one iota; a mere inflection of his voice being the only sign of his spoken satire—none the less cutting, by the way, because it falls from the lips of a statue. All the time he stands with bent head, and hands hanging loose at his sides, or clasp-ed behind his rounded back. When seated Lord Salisbury loses much of this sangiroid, and sometimes ap-pears very nervous indeed. He has a curious habit of working his knees up and down, as if he were treading water. He has been noticed to do this for hours at a stretch. The voice of the Premier is musical, and his delivery in general excellent, but he has one singular defect for so great a speaker. Now and again he lapses into a style suggestive rather of talking to himself than addressing than addressing the House, and he then becomes inaudible to the reporters' gallery. But, if Lord Salisbury divides his time between calmness and perturba tion, the same cannot be said of his colleague, the Duke of Devonshire. The Duke cannot be betrayed into The Duke cannot be betrayed into anything like unseemly haste or overweening anxiety. He is the "Weary Will" of the House. When not actually engaged in a speech he is lying about in all directions. Apparently, lowever, the essence of the debate mingles with his dreams, for he always has a good grasp of the sub-ject when it comes to his turn to But it is patent that the whole thing bores him awfully-his own speeches, perhaps, most of all-if we may judge by the yawns with which they are punctuated.

Lord Rosebery resembles the Premier inasmuch as he has two distinct manners, one for the House and one for the platform. In the House lat-terly he has seemed to try to con-trol himself, to keep down his natural tendency for gesticulation. But he must have something to do with his hands, and he has taken to folding and unfolding, to turning and twisting a piece of ribbon. be feared this new diversion will not last him long, but that he will re-turn to his former trick of thumping nces the noble the table as he den lords opposite. On the platform, or at public dinners, Lord Rosebery lets

himself go, so to speak. It is only the very rich who can afford to dress shabbily, and not even the rich do so without paying certain penalties. The Duke of Nor folk has the distinction of being th The Duke of Nor most carclessly dressed among Peers. This matters not at all, of course, so long as His Grace is known; no one thinks of a nobleman's clothes. But with strangers it is different. With characteristic kindness the Duke threw open his grounds at Arundel Castle to the public, but in doing so he did not bargain to be ordered off his own grass. Two Irishwoman, who were taking an airing in the park, noticing a shabbily dressed man turn of the pathway and take a bee-line across a strip of the grounds, were very indignant at witnessing, as they thought, so flagrant a breach of hospitality. "Hi! come back here, come back here!" they cried. "Can't you read that notice staring you in the face? It is the likes of you as keeps the likes of us out of many a dacent place !"
In the other House, from the mem-

bers of the Government downwards, most of the leading and lesser lights have some little mannerism all their own. Mr. Chamberlain is an absolutely unique personality. He is a product of this smart age, but he is also quite original. His eyeglass, his orchid, his frock coat and fancy waistcoat, have all become so identified with his personality, that it is impossible for the public mind to imagine him apart from any of these appurtenances. He is very faithful to the frock coat; the only concession that he will make in summer is to vary its color from black to grey.
On arriving at the House Mr. Chamberlais always does the same 'bing.
He will take from the table the orders for the day, glance at them, and then throw them down with an air of impatience. His next action is to adjust his eyeglass, thrust his legs straight out, and gaze round the House. He is not a quick speaker, neither does he make use of much gesture. All his speeches are neatly written out, and are carefully pre-pared, and many of them are first committed to memory. When he is most calm, he is most dangerous.

As his intensity of feeling grows, he becomes paler and paler, his parchment-like skin being sometimes almost ghastly in its pallor. Mr. Chamberlain has an overwhelming confidence in himself and his own powers, though not up to the esti-mate of a little girl in a Sunday school at Birmingham, who, when asked by her teacher. "Who made all this wonderful world, the sky, the trees, the flowers?" replied, "Please, Miss, Mr. Chamberlain."



Sarcey fired first and missed his adversary. M. Tailhade fired up in the trees, the taking his hat in his hand he went up to his young opponent. "I could not refuse you the satisfaction you de-manded," he said, "for I esteemed too manded, he said, for I essentiate too highly the sentiments which made you act as you did. But a duel with me is no duel; I am one-eyed, one-armed. Now that I have stood your fire let me say how greatly I regret having wounded your filial feelings." And with this graceful speech M.
