The new editor of the Dundas Banner has not been in this part of the country very long; but he has been able to size up the party of which his paper is the county organ with considerable correctness, and has print-ed his opinion with considerable courage. It is true that he applies his remarks to both parties; but as he is not qualified to speak for the Tory party, and is qualified to confess the evil doings of his own party, it is what he says about the latter that is important. The Banner says:

"To the victoes belong the spoils" is not only the very antithesis of the creed of the Apostles, but it is condemned by psalm and proverb, by precept and example and is transparently unfair and dishonest to the mind of an ordinary sinner who re-flects for a moment. Partyism, therefore, leads to falsehood and selfdeception. Instead of scrutinizing every statement to discover whether it be true or not partisans accept the ceclarations of their leaders without question, and applaud with almost satanic fervor anything that reflects on their supposed enemies, who should receive from honest men at least a fair trial. This leads to the acceptance of false opinions wherever they appear to work for party benefits, and to connivance at practices that are absolutely reprehensible. Under this influence they give a blind acquiencence to the demands of party, and in consequence frequently support a perversion of the truth. Falsehood, in the cause of party, is not only pardoned but justified, and not only justified but defied. To maintain the truth is the first and last duty of every human being because it is the God in him. We cannot uphold it unless we enjoy it, nor enjoy it unless we gain knowledge of it, nor gain knowledge of it, unless we search for it, nor search for it unless we wish to see it. The partisan does not wish to see it because he desires the success of his party and not the supreme good. While falsehood is upheld by the partisan the mere assertion of the truth is not sufficient, and does not satisfy the patriot. He must live it, and act it; and to do this he valiantly suppresses error by active, personal opposition, whether committed by his own friends or not, It has been well pointed out that we all wish truth to be on our side but we do not all wish to be on the side of truth."



Big Doings at the St. Louis Fxposition -Mr. Harper Honored at Convention.

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Rispin returned Friday evening from the St. Louis Exposition, Mr. Rispin was very much taken up with the Exposition. As serious work was impending, he was armed. The anticipated trouble came. The mili-tary appeared, and there was a fight. Papineau escaped, and was for years an exile. Young Cartier spent a win-ter in concealment, and then hasten-eh to the United States, returning, however, when an amnesty was anhowever, when an amnesty was announced. The leader also came back later on. He was irreconcilable, and after a brief political career was supplanted by a more moderate man, Mr. Lafontaine. Pajaneau then went into retirement, and made his home at his beautiful seat, Montebello, on the Ottawa, dying soon after Con-



East Montreal went back upon him on a question with which he had no connection, and he passed out of Parliament, in the height of his power, never to re-enter its doors, for death shortly afterwards claimed him. Papineau created a condition that was not hopeful for peace in this country. Cartier, once his follower, corrected his error, and helped to give us a consolidated Canada. Defert and Deat

All negotiations are off between the City and County in reference to deciding the share each shall pay of Administration of Justice, maintenance of Harrison Hall and other matters in which the two are jointly interested.

A committee from the City Council, composed of Mayor McKeough and Ald. Marshall and Scullard, and a committee from the County Council, composed of Warden Sifton and Councillors Robinson, Grant, Haggart and County Treasurer Fleming have convened on several and various occasions and tried to settle the dispute. The services of Government Auditor Macpherson were called in and he went over the various accounts and figured out the average each should pay in accordance with past performances. Even Mr. Macpherson's careful figuring couldn't settle the natural animosity that always arises between City and County. Each feared the other was getting the best of it. The two committees met for the last time Saturday afternoon, when Mayor McKeough delivered his ultimatum to the Council. Then all was off and the matter will have to be settled by arbitration. Auditor Macpherson placed the amount the City should pay the County for Administration of Justice at \$2,130. The report of the auditor was accepted by resolution of the committee. But when the agreement was prepared the City members of the committee backed up. They said that they understood that the \$2,130 included the City's share of the registry office. The County representatives aid it didn't. The City men said that there was more in the aurface and that they had been worked. 

The archaic words of these old versions also illustrate the need of the Revised Version.
