The Town Building.

The recommendation of the police committee at the last meeting of the town council with regard to the advisability of changing the location of the town building was a good one, and it is to be regretted that so little attention was paid to it.

The Acadia Creamery and cheese factory is now about ready for operations, no pains have been spared to make this one of the best in the Maritime Provinces.

The vats are to be heated by steam. The churn, separator, and mill, butter worker, and rotary pump will be run by a steam engine.

Finally the most ingenious and reliable piece of mechanism in the establishment is the tester, known as The Steam Turbine Balance Tester. It is very simple in construction and thoroughly accurate in its showing.

Steam is then turned on, the wheel begins to revolve and very soon the butter fat is seen to rise in the tubes, the graduation of which shows the exact percentage of butter fat contained in the given sample of milk.

Everything being ready for operation, with an unlimited market, rich grazing pasture and an abundance of land, there is no reason why this speculation should not prove as successful as similar ones have already proved.

Letter From Shubenacadie.

MR. EDITOR.—When Evangelist Mickle was holding services some two years ago in this place, he organized a men's meeting for ten o'clock every Sunday morning.

Mr. F. A. Clark has begun repairs for Mr. Haxlow on his new building on West Main street.


Photographer Burden continues his wall begun "setting-to-rights" on the Brick House (J. Strong) property.
