The back yards, too, in many cases, are filled with paper, etc., which is readily blown upon the street. If our towns to present an attractive appearance it must be by the united efforts of citizens.

Odds and Ends. Chief of Police in Cleveland is very much to the public eye at present, owing to the 'Golden Rule' policy which he has adopted. Chief Kohler has instructed all of his policemen not to arrest first offenders for trivial misdemeanors, unless it is clear that the offence was committed with criminal intent.

They are to warn a drunken man and help him home, instead of putting him in jail. First offenders found fighting are to be separated, reasoned with and allowed to go. The chief says the object he wishes to attain is the disposal of trivial offences without arrest, and to prevent the humiliation and disgrace of persons, who, through thoughtlessness, passion or temper, or in a spirit of frolic or mischief, have given cause to be considered offenders.

And just here we wish to protest against any policeman or constable being encouraged in the use of a club on a man's head when arresting such a man. This can only be resorted to strictly in self defence, and when the officer has reasonable apprehension of serious bodily harm from the violence with which the assault upon himself was made by a prisoner, and when the officer had reasonable grounds for belief that he could not otherwise preserve himself from such harm.

An arrested person should not be treated with harshness, and therefore it is held that an officer has no right to even handcuff a person whom he has apprehended, unless he attempts to escape, or it is necessary to prevent him from escaping.

Officers are liable in damages nine times as much for handcuffing arrested persons. Of course the right to handcuff persons in custody must depend upon the nature of the charge.

Anyone who has suffered from the cruel clubbing of an officer in this town or county should go to the county crown attorney, Mr. H. H. Wickwire, K. C., at Kentville and make the facts known to him. I am convinced, would not hesitate to make a thorough investigation and where an officer has used his club on a man's head to have such officer prosecuted for an assault causing actual bodily harm, and if convicted the offender would be liable to three years in the Dorchester.

ODDS AND ENDS. Principal Robinson, of the Dartmouth schools, who is under appointment to succeed Principal Merzeau as head of Horton Collegiate Academy, has been elected secretary of the Provincial Teachers' Union, in succession to the late Principal Kennedy. The late secretary was the life and soul of the organization, and the executive was a long time in finding a suitable man to take his place. They believe, that Mr. Robinson they found the right man for the position.
