This is by all odds the most successful fishing by any party ever before on the South-West. When Mr. Lawlor heard the news here today he said, "They must have caught them in a pound-net near the locks." We may say, however, "I know stranger than that fiction."

Hymeneal.  
A happy affair took place yesterday at St. Dunstan's Church. The parties to it were Mr. Dennis E. Hanlon of this city, and Miss Nelly McManley of St. John. A large number of spectators gathered inside and about the church to witness the ceremony which was performed by Rev. J. C. McDevitt. The bride was the recipient of a number of presents. We wish the couple success.

Disgraceful.  
Any one who wants to see a disgraceful road and the almost extent to which our city council neglects its duty, need but walk along from the head of town to Government House. The entire piece of road here is a series of ponds and wells, that are perpetual reservoirs of rain. The wonder wells at Grand Falls, principally, are pro-Russian and very disagreeable. It is dangerous after night to go along here, and not an easy task by day. If the council continue to neglect their duties to the public and to maintain dangerous traps along our streets, and go on as it has been going, much longer, the management of our citizens is to turn out one night and clear out the council chamber, and then form a committee for the management of town affairs till next election time.

Picnic.  
The picnic season is upon us. Yesterday the Carleton Seneca Band arrived here and gave its annual picnic at the grounds, and it is not said the music was of the very best, and the day's enjoyment the fullest. It is pleasant truly, under the shade of the wide-spreading trees to dance on the cool, green grass, as ladies were wont to do before printing was invented. And yesterday, as we enjoyed the picnic, a young man from the city had on his horizon, a young man from this city had to seek a doctor to sew up his head. In the evening the Exhibition was turned into account, hundreds flocking thither to the top. Bryson's Band played its popular music, which several feet responded heartily. The lively stable proprietors were busy yesterday—and so were the hotels and dining houses. There were about 200 up from Carleton.

Something About the N B R R.  
The city lately upon the line have concluded to purchase on the first of October. The delay was over the figures, which have settled upon \$900,000.

The N B R R is a good deal of money, but a large. For example the railway company owns nearly 2,000,000 acres of land, which at 45¢ per acre, would represent the whole of the purchase money. The purchasers therefore, would have all the labor of building in, within the road and its equipment, and a change will be a good one for the old company. The last few years bondholders drew six per cent, last year they drew only 4 per cent. The purchase to stockholders, in short would mean about this: A loss of the interest on the entire amount invested. In loss of say 7 per cent on the principal. But it would be a God-send to many of the stockholders to get their money back from the thousands of dollars invested, and to get more than this. Harrison Brothers, John H. Lamb, \$150,000 so that Mackay, and to Riviere du Loup; but this has been now abandoned. If the road be built, it will run to Riviere du Loup, and to the St. Lawrence at Riviere des Roches, where there is an excellent deep water terminus in summer season. **EARL DUFFERIN.**  
His Aristocratic Receptions at Saint Petersburg.  
The other day, Lord Dufferin, called on his French confere, General Chanzy, and coldly put him to this question: How on earth do you manage to kill time? From this simple anecdote you may gather some idea of the present state of the Russian capital. The English Ambassador is boring himself to death here; and that is saying a good deal; for never in my life did I meet a man who knew how to while away a dreary day better than Lord Dufferin. To begin with the ex-Governor of Canada is an unwearied worker. He has under him two or three young gentlemen who do nothing but run after each other—in other words, who do nothing. His excellency employs no one but his private Secretary, who sleeps in his neighborhood, and whom he relentlessly calls at all hours of the night whenever he is getting down on paper. From the moment they enter, Lord and Lady Dufferin assumed a prominent place in society here. While the other Ambassadors in St Petersburg have contented themselves with very mixed society, Lord and Lady Dufferin have entertained none, but the most aristocratic and select. So exclusive are his receptions that even some members of the diplomatic corps are not admitted to the most private ones. The Dufferins have been much talked about naturally, especially in connection with the charades that are acted at them. The host himself is the centre figure of these entertainments. He throws himself into the thing with the greatest ardor. One day, for instance, he welcomed his guests in the costume of a cupid—pink tights, wings and quiver all complete. On another occasion he dressed as a Scotchman, and appeared bare-legged. In some charade or other it was one night necessary to work in the word "river." Lord Dufferin calmly picked up two heaps of chairs, climbed to the top of one of them, took off his dress coat, waistcoat and white necktie, threw himself flat on the floor and began moving his arms and legs about frantically, like a swimmer in distress. He then got up, and beckoning to the band to strike up, opened the ball in a waltz with Lady Dufferin. The originality of these entertainments, and the systematic exclusion of all outside the pale of the most aristocratic society in the Empire make a great sensation. But singular accidents happened in even the most aristocratic circles of Russian society. One day Lady Dufferin's jewel, a diamond necklace, dropped a jewel worth about \$5,000 at an embassy reception. It was never found. You may imagine what satisfaction the non-elect had in circulating this story. A very similar affair took place during the transfer of the body of the Empress to the fortress. A court dignitary who was present in the little cathedral, and who carried the gold watch and chain. None but the highest court dignitaries were allowed in the church, and yet, curiously enough, the missing trinkets never reappeared, any more than Lady Dufferin's jewel. I should not have heard any more about them had I not been casually informed one day by a weary soldier who asked me to pay the cost of the ferry across the river for him, that he was the bearer of a warrant for the arrest of an officer in the guards for this very theft. All this does not prevent Lord Dufferin being bored.

**Telegraphic News.**  
**Rumblings of War in the East.**  
LONDON, July 28.  
The Montenegrins attacked the Albanians near Carniz, killed thirty-two persons, and carried off a quantity of cattle to Cetinje. Prince Nikita denied the restitution of the cattle, and also ordered a levy of men between the ages of sixteen and sixty.  
A Bucharest despatch says the most active influential political leaders of the principality are pro-Russian and should trouble arise between Austria and Russia this country may be regarded as a sure ally of Russia.  
The Paris Temps say that though the Powers are to a certain extent agreed, there is at the bottom rivalry between England, backed by Russia, and Austria backed, if necessary, by Germany. It is the duty of France to participate in the European concert as long as it lasts, but to revert to aggressive neutrality when the concert gives place to a conflict of interests which are not those of France.  
A Constantinople despatch says all the Sultan fears is the danger of a foreign fleet appearing before his capital. On this point though he has been reassured by his naval authorities, who declare that at the present moment no fleet could force the Dardanelles without losing a large proportion of its ships, and in a few days the defenses may be increased a hundred fold by mines and torpedoes. A Pasha, who has been on a tour of inspection, recommends the construction of ten new forts on the straits.  
The Government of Serbia has ordered all its transport vehicles to be ready for immediate use. It is stated in Belgrade that Bulgaria and Serbia are negotiating with a view to possible events taking place in the Balkan peninsula.  
A Constantinople despatch says the Turks believe they have nothing to fear from the military preparations of the Greeks, as the Greeks' own statistics state they can only bring 35,000 men to the front.  
It is stated on good authority that the Turks are quite indifferent to the proposed naval demonstration by the Powers.  
A Constantinople despatch says the Porte is trying to place the responsibility of rejecting the decision of the Berlin Conference on the Grand Council, but the Ambassadors have signified their belief that the Sultan is alone responsible. In the meantime troops and stores are being hurried to Albania. If Greece should move to occupy the territory, it is intended to convert the Turkish soldiers into Albanian troops. Many hundreds of Albanian dresses have been made at Constantinople for them. The tone of the Turkish is very violent towards the various European powers.

**The War in Afghanistan.**  
[PRESS DESPATCH.]  
LONDON, July 29.  
Regarding the reported disaster at Candahar, Mr. T. Lacy has just received from Scotland the latest selection of rubber coats we have seen for many a day. He is selling them at a small advance on cost; in the hope of working up a larger trade in this excellent line of goods. Most of the coats are reversible and at accommodating prices.

**Run-away.**  
Yesterday a horse belonging to Mr. John Moore, started away near the Cathedral, and ran madly up street, throwing its owner violently to the ground. It had a nice carriage attached when it started, but when it reached its own quarters, the "unsubstantial pageant" had faded, and there remained of the shafts, scarce enough to make a pair of awl handles.
