





Fearful Carnage

Among Retreating Germans When 30,000 Infantry Fell on a 16 Mile Front-French Drove the Germans Into the River at Point of the Bayonet.

Paris, Sept. 28.-News from Cham-. pagne tells of fearful carnage among the retreating Germans. This is, in fact, one of the bloodiest battles and which for the number of victims surpasses any previous combat in French warfare. On a front of only 16 miles 30,000 Germany infantry fell, which, in addition to over 20,000 prisoners, makes the total German losses more than an army corps. The suddenness and vigor of the attack are clearly llustrated by the number of guns

That the retreat was swift and bloody, especially north of Beausejour, is shown by the frightful slaughter on a hill above the Dormoise river. The impetuous rush of the oncoming Frenchmen charging with the bayonet drove the Germans from the crest of Hill 200 into the river below. The shouts of the victorious French, mingled with the screams of the fugitive Germans as they plunged into the swift-running river, and as the current swept the Germans off their feet, they clutched one another by the necks in a desperate death grip. It is not exaggeration to say that in a few minutes the rushing stream accounted for several German companies, and at certain points it could be forded across on their

heaped-up bodies. This hurried retreat, however, was saved from becoming a regular rout by the German batteries which opened fire from the other side of the river and stayed the onrushing French, who contented themselves with retaining the important position conquered.

How Samoa Was Taken

Admiral's Short Way With Germans. The story of the well-planned and admirably executed New Zealand expedition which seized German Samoa, in the Pacific is told in an official White Paper. The brief and pointed letters interchanged between Rear-Admiral Patey, commanding the Allied fleets off Samoa, and the Acting Governor, S. N. Rimburg, have not befere been noticed and are worth

quotation. Admiral Patey wrote: "I have the honour to inform you that I am off the port of Apia with an overwhelming force, and in order to avoid unnecessary bloodshed I will not open fire if you surrender immediately.




