

In accepting the Imperial Government's declaration of its andonment of that policy, which ha o seriously menaced the good relations between the two countries, the Government of the U.S. will rely upon the scrupulous execution hence forth of the now altered policy of the Imperial Government, such as will remove the principal danger of the good relations existing between the U. S. and Germany.





After several other witnesses were examined Judge Hutchings instructed the Supt. of police to keep an eye on the house, but in the meantime he had already bound Noseworthy to the peace, which bond was broken. Noseworthy was therefore fined \$10 or 30 days, and to give two bonds of \$100 each or serve an additional thirty days. Cook was remanded until Thursday next pending a doctor's report as to his condition.

The Cymric left New York April 29 with an enormous cargo of war munitions. As she usually makes the voyage from New York to Liverpool in 10 days, she was, therefore, within a day or two of her destination. It is considered probable that in the ab-sence of definite delays the disaster to the Cymric occurred off the West Coast of Ireland, but whether on the northerly or southerly route cannot be stated. The fate of the steamer is not yet known, although an early mes-sage received in London reported the Cymric sinking. The crew aboard numbered about 100 men, but the steamer carried no passengers.

CYMRIC TORPEDOED.

QUEENSTOWN, To-Day. "Cymric was torpedoed." The above despatch filed by the Associated Press correspondent at Queenstown is the first direct announcement regarding the torpedoing of the White Star liner. "Irish men and Irish women, in the ions from which you received the old traditions of Nationhood, Ireland, through us, summons her children to her flag and strikes for her freedom, having organized and trained her manhood through her secret revolutionary organization, the Irish Republican Brotherhood, and through her own military organization, the Irish Volunteers and the Irish Citizens

"Having patiently perfected their discipline and resolutely waited for the right moment to reveal itself, she now seizes that moment, and, supported by her exiled children in America and by her gallant allies in Europe, but relying on her own strength, she strikes, in full confi-

lence of victory. "We declare the right of the people of Ireland to the ownership of Ireand and to unfettered control of Irish destinies, to be sovereign and indeeasible. Long usurpation of that right by a foreign people and government, has not extinguished that right, nor can ever be extinguished except by the destruction of the Irish people

"In every generation the Irish people have asserted their right to a national freedom and sovereignty. Six times during the past 300 years they have asserted it in arms. To properly pasturize milk put gallon of water over the fire in a clean pan or kettle. When the water boiling hard take the kettle from the fire and allow it to stand on the able for ten minutes uncovered. Then out in the filled and corked nursing ottles and leave them for half an our, covering the kettle meanwhile with a blanket. At the end of half an nour remove the bottles and cool hem as quickly as possible to fifty legrees and put them where they will keep cool when needed.

When it is time to feed the baby take out a bottle and set it in a pail of warm water over the fire to heat. After the baby has finished, the bottle should be emptied, rinsed and filled with cold water. At some convenient hour of the day the mother will wash all the used bottles with soap and warm water, using a bottle brush to clean the inside of them. She should then rinse them and boil them in the same pan or kettle in which they were pasturized.







Met to Form a Municipal Govern-ment for St. John's—Their Resolutions, Bye-Laws, etc.

(By James Murphy.). March the second, 1826, a very neral and respectable meeting of e inhabitants of this town was held, or the purpose of taking into considcation the necessity of having some etter regulations in future.

Thomas H. Brooking having been called to the chair and having stated the object of the meeting, Mr. P. Morris addressed the meeting at coniderable length on the utility and ab-olute necessity of having bye-laws and a better police establishment for the internal regulation of this town, and concluded by moving the follow-ing resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Stewart and carried unanimous-

regulations for the better security of property from fire and promoting the inhabitants of this town, is a great and growing evil, and very prejudicial to the good order and well being of the

s expedient that a committee or cou the inhabitants, with full powers accomplish these desirable objects; that the powers of the committee should be limited (in the raising of funds for the purposes above men ioned) to an ass ed property within the limits of the town, one half to be paid by the landord and the other half by the tenant

Gill, and carried unanimously: Resolved,—That it is the decided opinion of this meeting that both landlord and tenant, should be made mutually liable for all the expenses that may be requisite for carrying the intended regulations into effect, and if the present act be insufficient to effect that purpose, that an applica-tion be made to His Excellency the landlord and tenant to contribute as equal portion of the expenses incur red by the committee, this being com sidered the only basis on which th resent meeting would recommend His Majesty's Government the ap-

A War Prophecy and Its Origin.

Remarkable Story Told in a British · Paper.

The Staffordshire Advertiser of Saturday, March 18, contained in Onookers' Column of Events of the Week the following:—
I do not vouch for the accuracy or

otherwise of the incident referred to below, but it comes from a correspondent whose bnoafides are indisputable: The wife of a tiller of the soil was washing up the dinner things one day recently and had the misfortune to drop a plate on to the floor and broke it.
