



Rush wrote out a memorandum of agreement which he headed "An Ar-I rangement." The document is written on one side of a single sheet of paper and is dated April Twentyeight, Eighteen Hundred Seventeen. Here is a copy:

"1. The Naval Forces henceforth to be maintained upon the Great Lakes shall be confined to the following vessels on each side:

"2. On Lake Ontario one vessel, not to exceed one hundred tons burden, carrying not more than twenty men and one eighteen-pound cannon. "3. On the Upper Lakes two versels, of same burden, and armed m a like way.

"4. On Lake Champlain one vessel of like size and armament.

"5. All other armed vessels to be at once dismantled, and no other vessel of war shall be built or armed along the Saint Lawrence River or on the Great Lakes"
