Thanksgiving Day in United States.

To-day (Thursday), the last of November, is set apart by proclamation in the United States of America as a general day of Thanksgiving. In referring to the features of this particular occasion, the World Almanac publishes the following article from an early edition of the London Times, which will be read with great interest, coming from such an authoritative source.

"The first Thanksgiving Day in America was celebrated by the little band of Plymouth Colonists in 1621, though they had little to be thankful for except that they were alive. One of the reasons why they were alive was that among the food resources of the new land, besides water fowle there was a great store of wild Turkies'; and it shows how well known the bird must already have been in Europe that Bradford should thus have identified it off-hand and assumed that the name needed no explanation. And we know that the festivities of the very earliest Thanksgivings centred largely in the consumption of 'fowles':-

'Our harvest being gotten in, our Governor sent four men on fowling, that we might after a more special manner rejoice together, after we had gathered the fruits of our labours. They foure in one day killed as much fowle, as, with a little help beside, served the company almost a week.'

This earliest festival of the Colonists was a mere holiday after the toll of the harvest, a 'frolic' such as may still be seen in many parts of England, with little or no religious associations or observances. It was a time of dancing or feasting, sports and trials of strength or skill, of rest and relaxation after the labours of the year. Merry-makings at harvest-home were prevalent in England, we know, in, at least, the 16th century; and the Pilgrims did but reproduce, in this as in most other things, the institutions with which they had been familiar at home. As the plantations in North America prospered, the custom persisted and spread and, under Puritan influence, it came to assume throughout New England a more religious character. Still a season of rejoicing, it had for its central episode the gathering at the place of worship to listen to the Thanksgiving Sermon, more secular than other sermons of the year, in which the politics and material topics of the day could be discussed from the pulpit more freely than on ordinary Sundays. In this form it spread from New England over the country, first through the Middle States, and so to the further West, finally and more slowly through the South, until Thanksgiving came to be the most popular and universally observed of all the national holidays hardly excepting the more ebullient and demonstrative Fourth of July. Its associations with the carrying of the harvest came, with the growth of industrial prosperity and the emergence of large cities, to be partially obscured. Above all, it grew to be recognized as a family festival, a day of reunions in the old homestead and for the renewing of old affections, a season of charity and mutual helpfulness

First Thanksgiving Proclamation. In 1789, in response to requests from both Houses of Congress, George Washington issued the first Thanksgiving Proclamation, appointing Thursday, November 26, as a day to he set aside for 'acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favours of Almighty God, especially by affording them (the people) an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness,' and, in particular, for 'the favourable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war.' Six years later, February 19, 1795, was similarly appointed a day of Thanksgiving for the 'divine beneficence' as shown especially in the suppression of the recent Insurrection (the Whisky Rebellion) and for the continued stability of those 'constitutions of government which unite and by their union establish liberty and order.'

In 1798 the relations of the new Republic with Great Britain were again strained almost to the breaking point, and President Adams proclaimed Wednesday, May 9, as a day of humiliation and fasting inasmuch as the United States was placed 'in a hazardous and afflictive situation by the unfriendly disposition, conduct, and demands of a foreign Power,' but with the prayers and supplications were to be mingled thanks for many blessings, including 'a wonderful increase in population.' In the following year, the situation being still acute, Thursday, April 25, was similarly dedicated to 'humiliation, fasting, and prayer,' in that 'the most precious interests of the people of the United States are still held in jeopardy by the hostile designs and insidious acts of a foreign nation, Once more thanks were also to be rendered for many blessings, especial reference being made to the labor of the husbandmen so that there may be food in abundance for man and beast."

It certainly reffects great credit on the part of all those who have gone into poultry raising on such a large scale, and for the great care and attention that had been exercised in arranging to have the poultry placed on exhibition. The collection of birds, numbering 700 in all, is the finest exhibit arranged since the inception of the exhibition. They are classed by sections, and placed in their various pens. The S.C. White Leghorn consist of a very large exhibit, while a large collection of Rhode Island Reds, Wyandottes and Barred Plymouth Rocks are to be seen. The White Plymouths are a beautiful string of birds in particular, while a fine assortment of White Chinese Geese owned by the Department Agriculture are also on exhibition, but are not entering into the competition. Also on exhibition is a model commercial poultry run, made from paper, which is the work of Mr. W. K. Chancey of Grand Falls. The farm is built on a large area of ground judging by the scale of measurement, and contains up-to-date poultry houses, barns and outhouses. It is indeed a fine piece of workmanship and was viewed with much admiration by those who had the pleasure of seeing it last night. There is also on display a fine collection of eggs, eight entrants taking part in the competition. Many of the eggs are very large and compare very favourably with those previously shown. The Association also has a large model poultry house on exhibition near the entrance of the building. It is well built and shows exactly what a hen's house should really look like. The measurements are 12x12 and it is divided into three sections. This will be lotteried, many of the tickets having been already disposed of last night. During the evening Professor Landry gave a lecture on poultry culture in the gymnasium of the Armoury, which was illustrated with moving pictures. ROOSTS ON LOFTY LEDGES-HAS WING EXPENSE OF 12 FEET.

Scientists have determined that the California condor exceeds in size its cousin, the condor of the Andes of South America, and is larger than the giant or wandering albatross, which travels the ocean lanes of the Pacific, south of the equator. The extreme wing expanse of the California condor is close to 12 feet. Through careful measurements, the scientists learned that the condor of the southern countries is smaller in all respects.

One of these largest birds that fly is on exhibition in the Natural History Museum at San Diego, Cal. Beside the condor, the turkey buzzard, a smaller relative, appears to be a dwarf. Both birds are carrion eaters, a fact which has contributed substantially to the near-extinction of the condor. Naturalists of earlier years record that the condor was once fairly common in

Ranchers and settlers have been indirectly responsible for the killing of many condors through the placing of poisoned meat intended for consumptien of coyotes, bobcats and panthers. Large numbers have also been wantonly killed through the indiscriminate use of firearms.

The condor's favorite haunts for roosting and breeding are at elevations of 10,000 to 16,000 feet. There. during the months of February and March, on inaccessible ledges of rock, at deposits two white eggs, from three) four inches in length, its nest coneisting merely of a few sticks placed around the eggs.

England Does Not Need Gulf Stream.

LONDON.-Science has come for

ward recently to destroy another of man's long cherished illusions, but at the same time it has removed a source of constant anxiety to those who would attempt to understand the causes of climatic conditions. M. Danois, the well-known hydrologist, Tho has made a special study of the waters of the Atlantic, has declared that the temperate climate of the British Isles and the northern coast of France does not depend on the Gulf Stream, and that its diversion would not therefore leave this section of the world in the grip of an Arctic winter, M. Danois claims to have proved that the Gulf Stream, rising to the north of the Antilles, does not pass the Sargasso Sea, and the notion must be discarded that it traverses the Atlantic to bathe the shores of England and France. He expresses the view that the Gulf Stream is merely the backbone of the equatorial currents. Summer heat provokes dilations of the heavily salted equatorial waters, which translate themselves into permeations of the more lightly salted Arctic and Continental waters. It is these permeations in the eastern Atlantic which have been mistaken for branches of the Gulf Stream. They are, however, purely local currents and vary according to

Only a Match-Stick.

THAT LITTLE BIT OF WOOD WHICH WE THROW AWAY CAUSED SCIENTISTS MICH TROUGLE.

Probably no object in everyday use receives less attention than a matchstick; such a simple thing doesn't seem worth bothering about.

Simple it may be, but the perfect match-stick has to satisfy quite a number of conditions, and thousands of chemical and engineering experiments had to be tried before all the requirements were satisfied.

The perfect match-stick must be strong enough not to break when the match is struck. It must hold the chemical "head" securely. The shape and texture should be such that the flame quickly gets a good hold. When the match is blown out the charred stick must not glow, nor must the head drop off

It must be long enough to burn for a reasonable time without burning the fingers. There must be no danger of splinters entering the fingers. Lastly, the appearance must be attractive—a requirement that is best met by a white wood.

Two woods stand out as specially suitable for match-sticks—white pine and aspen. White pine is a valuable wood, applicable to many uses, whereas aspen is suitable for little else than matches. Aspen, therefore, has been adopted in England and on the Continent.

Why it is Square.

After careful consideration it was decided that the best shape for a match is square. A square match is stronger than a round one because there is more wood in it. Moreover a square stalk is the best for holding the head, since there is a larger surface for the chemical paste to grip. Another condition met by the square stick is that of easy ignition, due to the corners catching more rapidly than would a round stick.

It is impossible to form a round splint without compressing the fibres of the wood to some degree, whereas a square stick can be made by splitting, which leaves the material more open in texture—a condition which not only aids combustion, but also allows the stick to absorb the fireproofing solution more readily. The fireproofing prevents the afterglow of the match when the flame has been blown out, and also keeps on the "spent" head.

Japanese Not White, Says U. S. Law.

Japanese are not white within the meaning of American law and are not entitled to citizenship in the United States, the Supreme Court held on November 14. The High Court affirmed a decision of the California Court of Appeals in a test case brought by Takao Ozawa of Honolulu, who claimed he was "white" and was eligible for naturalization as an American citizen. At the same time the court upheld the State of Washington Supreme Court in denying citizenship to Takuji Yamashita and Charles Hio Kono of Seattle. The decision held that the two Japanese were not entitled to naturalization under the United States laws and therefore could not enter a business partnership. The Supreme Court's decision in these cases has long been awaited, particularly on the Pacific Coast, where anti-Japanese feeling exists.





(2) Vessels to race with their orlinary fishing gear on board; with heir usual ballast, with the sails they have used in fishing, and with heir ordinary fishing crews.

(3) Abolish existing rules as to sail areas and water-line and permit any bona-fide fishing vessel to enter the races without handicap or restriction provided that she sails in precisely he same condition as when engaged

n fishing. Briefly these are the changes, which | Set in Rubber \$2.40 doz., 25c. ea. o our mind, are desirable in the runing of future flishermen's races. They are, of course, subject to necesary elaboration and it is our hope to e able to present a full and comprenensive draft of our suggestions in a uture issue of the Fishing Gazette. To elaborate our own ideas on the subject, we believe that by permitting fishing vessels to enter the races without restrictions and requiring them to sail in their fishing rigs, the expense of overhauling and fitting out schooners especially for the contests will be reduced to a mimimum, and a greater number of schooners will be entered by owners who would otherwise be deterred by the costs of fitting out their vessels for racing. As to water-line and sail area restrictions. Why should there be any? If a fishing schooner is in the habit of carrying a certain amount of sail during her fishing operations, what is the sense of having her canvas reduced or enlarged for the purpose of racing? If she is in the habit of carrying so many tons of ballast in fishing, what is to be gained by adding or subtracting from it to increase or shorten her water-line to concur with the present regulations of the Trophy
