Cold Sweets for Hot Days

During warm sunny weather there is a natural distaste for hot dishes, and housekeepers must therefore adapt their cooking to these conditions. It should also be noted that in such heat spells as we have recently had only light lunches or dinners ought to be served, the majority of people having no inclination for anything in the nature of heavy meals. For the finish of a light repast nothing better can be recommended than a cold sweet. Fortunately there is a great variety of these dishes, and the cook has no difficulty in making frequent changes and thus tempting the faded appetite.

These sweets are quickly and easily made, and the best time for preparation is in the cool of the evening. They can be made most attractive and appetizing by the addition of whipped cream which must just be made before serving. Jellies, of course, are in great demand in the summer time. It should, however, be borne in mind that in hot weather the jellies must be prepared with a smaller amount of water, otherwise there will be difficulty in getting them to set.

Sago Snow.

Wash three tablespoonsful of small sago and soak it in a teacupful of cold water for one hour. Put a pint of milk on to boil, add to it the soaked sago, and keep stirring until the sago is clear and ready. Remove the pan from the fire, add sufficient sugar, sweeten and a little flavouring. Pour into a crystal and set aside to cool. Separate the whites from the yolks of two eggs, beat the whites to a stiff snow. Put half a pint of milk on to boil, add a little piece of lemon rind to it, and when the milk boils remove the rind. Poach the white of egg in the boiling milk in spoonfuls, and when firm drain for a second. With the yolks of the eggs and the milk left over from poaching the whites, make a custard sauce and flavour it with sherry, adding a small dessertspoonful of sugar. Pour the sauce on the top of the sago, and pile the snow eggs on top.

Rice Cream.

Take some cold rice pudding (whole rice), or boil some rice specially for the purpose and allow to get quite cold. Break up the rice with a fork, add sufficient sugar and flavouring, sherry or vanilla. Whip up a jar of cream, mix the rice with it, pile on to a crystal and decorate with one or two chopped cherries. This sweet may be served with cold stewed fruit.

Pineapple Shape.

Put three breakfastcupfuls of milk on to boil, and when at boiling point, stir in 3oz. of moistened cornflour, and keep stirring until ready, allowing at least five minutes after boiling. When sufficiently cooked, remove from the fire, add a drop or two of lemon flavouring, sugar to taste, a small teacupful of tinned chopped pineapple, half a teacupful of pineapple syrup from the tin, and the whites of two eggs stiffly beaten. Put into a wetted mould, and allow to remain until quite cold. Make a custard sauce with the yolks, etc., and let it get cold also. Turn out the shape and pour the sauce around it.

Orange and Banana Salad.

Peel three oranges and slice them across, removing pit and stones. Peel and slice three or four bananas. Have a syrup previously made with ¼ lb. of loaf sugar and a teacupful of cold water. Allow the syrup to boil ten minutes, then set aside to cool. Take two tablespoonfuls of chopped nuts, walnuts or other kinds, or, instead of the nuts, the same amount of desiccated coconut will do. Arrange all these in layers in a crystal, and pour the syrup over. Serve with whipped cream.

Fig Jelly.

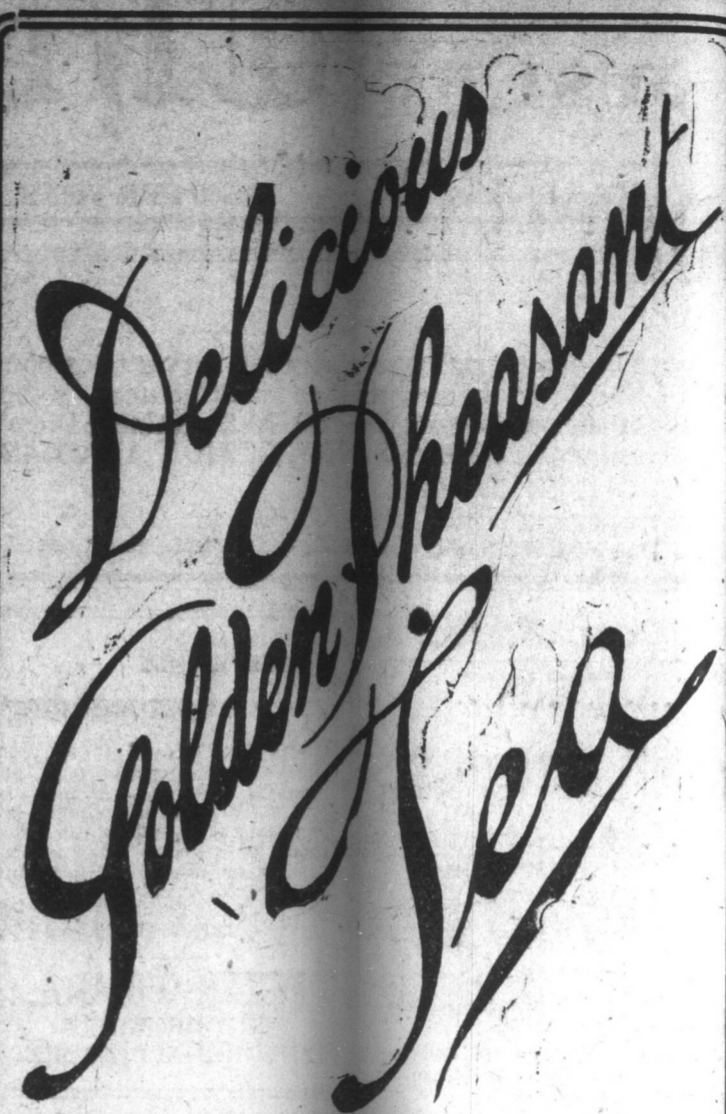
Wash ½ lb. of figs and remove the stalks. Stew the figs until tender in a breakfastcupful of water. When ready, pour off the syrup, reserving it for the jelly; cut the figs in pieces. Dissolve a pint of lemon jelly, using a teacupful less of water, allowing for the syrup from the figs. When the jelly is cool, add the figs with the syrup. Pour into a wetted mould, or simply pour into a crystal, and when set, pile whipped cream on top, if put into mould, turn out and serve with a border of whipped cream around the shape. A cold custard makes a very good accompaniment to this jelly. —BETTY.

CHINA DEPT.

British Foreign Secretary Has Proof of Soviet Influence in China

Agreement Between Canada and West Indies Signed--Security Pact Negotiations to Begin Shortly.

CHINESE TROUBLE.
LONDON, July 6.—The subject of the relations between Great Britain and Russia came before the House of Commons today. Mr. Austen Chamberlain, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, made it clear that the Government had not yet made a protest to Russia regarding the situation in China, and announced that the Government reserved full liberty to take whatever action it might think fit. This was generally understood to mean that such action would be taken only in concert with other powers interested in China. Mr. Chamberlain further declared that the Government considered the speeches recently made by the Soviet Ambassador, M. Karakhan, in Peking, sufficient proof of the Soviet influence in fomenting trouble, and he added, "I have other evidence which I consider expedient to publish."

SECURITY PACT DISCUSSION IN THE LORDS.
LONDON, July 6.—That formal negotiations for a security pact were likely to begin within a few days was announced in the House of Lords today which threw little additional light on the British Government's view on that question. The debate initiated by the Earl of Oxford and Viscount Grey, and largely on the subject of armaments, and Lord Balfour for the Government deprecated Great Britain's assumption in Eastern Europe of any responsibilities beyond those already undertaken under the League of Nations.

NADA-WEST INDIA AGREEMENT SIGNED.
OTTAWA, July 6.—(Can. Press)—The Canada-West India Trade Agreement was signed at night to-night in the office of the Minister, by Hon. J. A. Robb, Hon. T. A. Low, Hon. George P. Graham and Hon. J. E. Sinclair, on behalf of Canada, and by representatives of various Colonial Governments of the West Indies. Under the new agreement increased tariff concessions and steamship facilities will be mutually granted. The new services which are to connect the products of the colonies direct to Canadian ports without transshipment are mentioned in the agreement. The full text of the treaty has been published to the Colonial Office in London to-night and will be announced simultaneously in Canada and the West Indies on Wednesday. The agreement comes into effect on a date mutually agreed upon.

RUM FLEET DEPARTS.
BOSTON, Mass., July 6.—Several all rum ships lying off the New England coast have departed and new ones have been sighted since recent campaign of the coastguard vessels. It was asserted today at the Guard Headquarters. The announcement was made in connection with reports that a new fleet of ships anchored off Swampscoot where the Coolidge is spending his vacation. At the Nahant Coastguard station, a short distance from Swampscoot, it was said that the only liquor in the vicinity were the three Cape Ann, fully 30 miles from Swampscoot. They have been there several weeks. The only ship sighted from Swampscoot to-day was a private yacht which entered Marble

report that they experienced a distinct tremor. NEW YORK, July 6.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in the Federal Court today against the Commonwealth Finance Corporation which was organized in South Dakota in 1920 with a capitalization of \$10,000,000 for the primary purpose of making loans on automobiles.

NEW RACING RECORD.
CLEVELAND, July 6.—Lafayette, Ben White's mare, set a new world's record for the three quarter mile heat in the 2:18 trot at North Randall Grand Circuit races today, making the distance in 1:32 1/4, clipping one-fifth second off the record set here last week.

MACMILLAN LEFT BATTLE HARBOR YESTERDAY.
HALIFAX, July 6.—Radio messages intercepted here, broadcast by the steamer Peary, of the Donald MacMillan Expedition into the far north, stated that the Peary and Bowdoin left Battle Harbor, Labrador, this morning, called at Domino, proceeding again toward Hopedale, on the Labrador coast, which they expected to reach to-morrow, ice permitting.

FALLS TO HIS DEATH.
DARTMOUTH, July 6.—Samuel Fullerton, aged 73, foreman at the Acadia Sugar Refinery, here, was found dead this morning at the foot of an elevator shaft. The coroner's jury found death was due to skull fracture, caused, it is thought, from a fall down the shaft from the fifth floor. No blame was attached to the company or the equipment.

DEATH LIST 44.
BOSTON, July 6.—With the recovery of more bodies today from the ruins of the building which houses the Pickwick Club, a night life resort, the list of known dead from the collapse of the building in the early morning of July 4, had reached 44. When District Attorney O'Brien opened the Grand Jury investigation of the disaster today, several victims had not been identified.

KRIM SEVERELY DEFEATED.
FEZ, July 6.—The French severely defeated Abdel-Krim's tribesmen in two engagements yesterday. The Rifians attacked near Ain Matour and Kiffane; they lost heavily at the first place and were routed in the second.

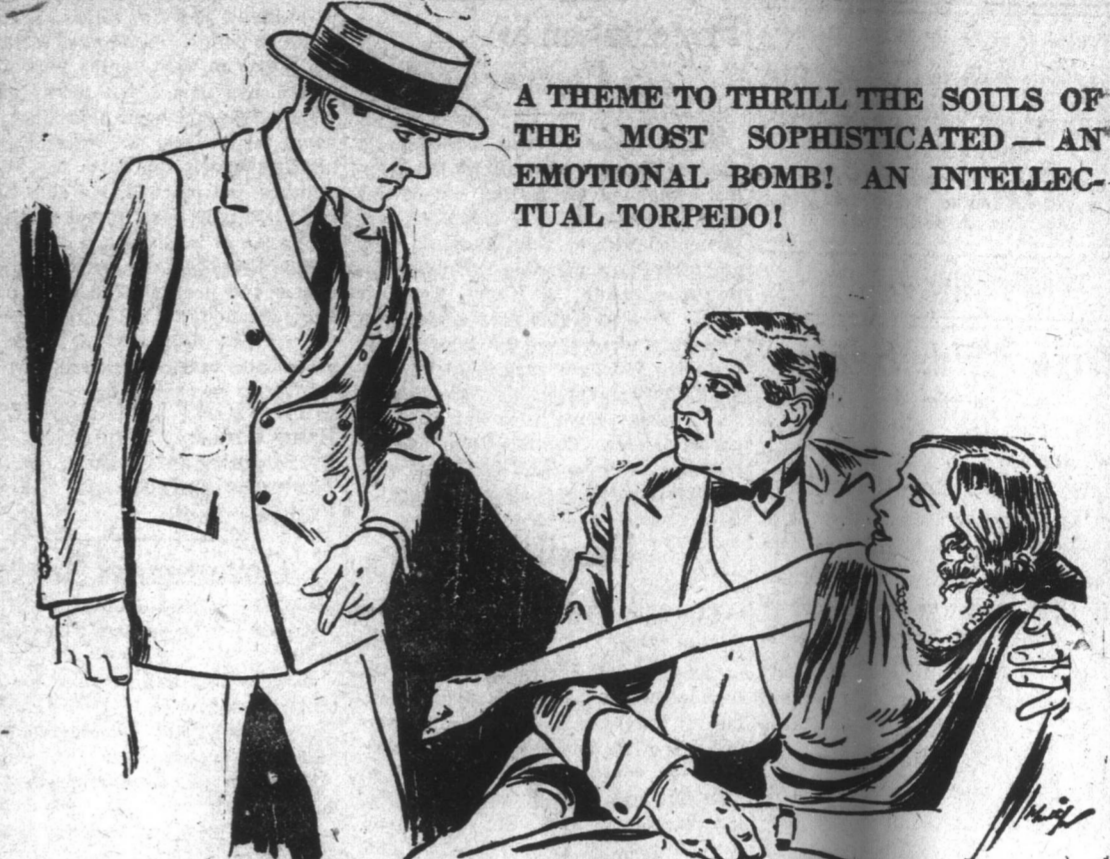

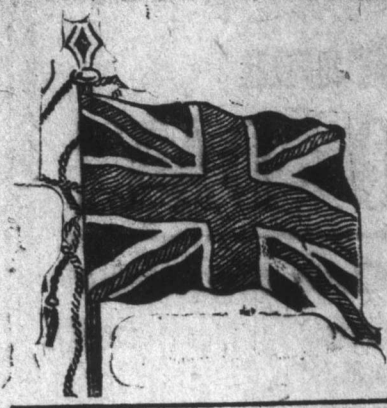

SENTENCES OF DEATH ON RUSSIAN OFFICIALS. MOSCOW, July 6. Former Generals Blavin and Icanoff of the red army and Magistrates Vlasoff and Sholokhoff were executed here to-day. The first two were sentenced to death after a trial at Kiev, where they were found guilty of espionage for Poland. The two magistrates were found guilty of granting immunity to criminals and accepting bribes.

CARDIAL RE-UNION OF NORTH AND SOUTH. LONDON, July 6. Prominent men from both the North and South of Ireland attended dinner last night at the Irish Club here, the affair developing into one of cordiality and great harmony. Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, was absent owing to the death of his brother and William T. Cosgrove, President of the Free State Executive Council, was unable to attend, but the guests included Timothy Healey, Governor General of the Free State and the Duke of York.

TOGOLAND TAKES KINDLY TO PROHIBITION. GENEVA, July 6. Prohibition is making rapid progress in Togoland, the Mandate Commission of the League of Nations has been informed by British Commissioner Mansfield of the gold coast. Owing to the sobriety of the natives. There is little importation of alcohol and practically no smuggling.

8 DROWNED IN SMALL LAKE. ST. THOMAS, Ont., July 7. High Court of Justice. KING'S BENCH DIVISION.

WILLS KAYED WEINERT.

Greb Outpointed Walker in Great Fifteen Rounder.

POLO GROUNDS, New York, July 2.—Harry Greb, of Pittsburgh, world's middleweight champion, successfully defended his title in a furious fifteen round match, the main attraction of the Italian Hospital Fund matches at the Polo grounds last night when he gained a judges' decision over Mickey Walker of Elizabeth, N.J., welterweight champion.

The battle was one of the fiercest and most thrilling fights since Dempsey and Firpo fought their thrilling bout at this same park two years ago. Greb was the aggressor the major part of the way but he found an ambitious slinger in Walker, who, badly battered, fought gamely right to the end. There were no knockdowns. Charles Weinert, the Newark actor, crumpled under the shattering force of Harry Wills' charges in the second round of the scheduled fifteen round semi-final. Wills had the edge all the way, and showed more aggressiveness tonight than he has in years.

A Quick Finish.

As the boxers in the semi-final came into the ring Wills' weight was announced as 213 and Weinert's as 184 1-2.

The fight by rounds follows.— ROUND ONE.—Wills started to rush Weinert as he sprang from his corner but the Newarker tied him up. Wills scored twice to Weinert's body. Weinert countered with a left to the chin. They exchanged body blows at close quarters. Wills continued to batter away at Weinert's ribs. A stiff right evaded Wills' guard and the negro backed up Wills battered Weinert in a corner, hitting relentlessly as the Newarker covered up. A stiff right knocked Weinert from the ring but he got back before the count had started. The bell found them in a clinch.

ROUND TWO.—Wills was warned for hitting on the break in the first skirmish. The negro landed five straight blows with his right to Weinert's jaw without a return. Another right almost felled Weinert. The Newarker was absorbing plenty of punishment. Weinert went down for a count of ten, helpless against the aggressiveness of his opponent. The end came after one minute and forty seconds of the round had been fought.

GREB-WALKER FIGHT, ROUND BY ROUND.

The main bout by rounds follows:— Round One—Walker took the lead at the bell, boring into Greb Walker's right caught Greb at the belt. They fought furiously in the centre of the ring, driving rights and lefts recklessly. A stiff right uppercut rocked Walker's head. Walker countered with two rights to the jaw and Greb went back to the ropes. Greb measured Walker with a right to the jaw. They were fighting willingly, trading punches at will. They sparred for an opening at the bell.

Round Two.—They traded punches to the body at close quarters. Greb rushed Walker to the ropes, where he poured a furious head and body attack to the challenger. Walker's head rocked from a furious right. Another right drove him to a corner. Walker landed a beautiful left to Greb's mid-section and followed it with a right to the same place. The milling was furiously fast. Greb rocked Walker with a right and left to the head and the welterweight king stumbled to his knee, but he was up immediately. They stood toe to toe, slugger mercilessly at the bell.

Four times Greb's right found Walker's chin just as the bell rang.

Round Eleven—They wrestled around the ring, neither landing effectively. A clean right staggered Greb when it landed on his uncovered jaw. Greb missed his right and Walker scored twice on his uncovered jaw. The fighting was tremendously fast. Walker landed to the head with both his right and left and Greb drove to cover, as the jammed park yelled its

applause. Another clinch upset the referee again. They stood in a neutral corner and punched furiously at will while the referee was struggling to his feet. The bell ended the milling.

Round Twelve—They smashed at each other's jaw, both landing cleanly. In a maddened exchange of blows they punched each other at will. Walker staggered Greb with a vicious right to the head. Walker landed effectively to the body and head and Greb clinched. Greb landed with terrific force to Walker's jaw, but the welterweight came up for more. The crowd gasped as the battlers stood up under the fierce punishment. They were locked in a clinch at the bell.

Round Thirteen—They stood toe to toe in Walker's corner and matched blow for blow. Walker's left eye started to swell as Greb continued to pepper at Walker's face. Greb missed a downward right. The one-two punch backed Walker to the ropes. They continued to batter each other openly at long range. Greb rushed Walker to the corner, and the bell interrupted an interesting skirmish.

Round Fourteen—Greb continued his aggressiveness but Walker was willing and they smashed away openly, both landing telling blows. Greb started to dance and Walker came into a one-two punch which forced him to clinch. A stinging right to the jaw rocked Walker to his own corner and he staggered about the ring helpless against Greb's furious attack. He was almost out but he pulled himself together and staggered Greb with a short left to the face. Gamely, Walker fought on, badly battered but taking everything Greb could throw and standing upright under the tremendous punishment. The bell saved Walker further punishment.

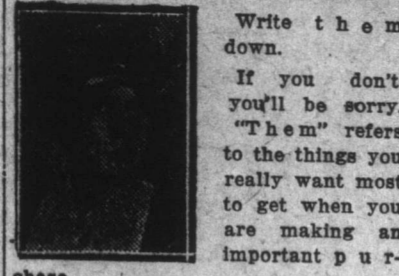

Last Link in Trans-Canadian Highway

VANCOUVER, B.C., June 28.—Before the end of the present year the Fraser River canyon route will be completed and British Columbia will have constructed the last link in the chain of roads that will connect the West Coast of Canada with the East.

Construction has been rushed along the Fraser during the summer months with the result that progress has been even more rapid than was at first expected, and the road may be completed before the first snow falls.

For years the trans-continental highway has existed with one single gap—that between Hope and Princeton. Now that gap is being bridged and when the road is finished it will add one of the most impressive scenic highways on the continent to the all-Canadian artery. The possibilities of the route in the development of tourist traffic between the coast province and the prairies are regarded as beyond calculation.

Difficult as the construction of the Fraser Canyon route is proving, even greater were the engineering problems faced more than half a century ago by the little band of Royal Engineers who, were assigned the task of carving out a passage road along the Fraser River shore to connect the coast with the goldfields of the Cariboo. In many places the new highway picks up the ancient road built by the Royal Engineers, who, with the primitive tools then available, performed one of the most remarkable engineering feats known to the west. In many parts of the route it was necessary to cut a way through solid rock rising precipitously above the rising canyons.

The old road was commenced in 1861 under instructions from Governor James Douglas, who was one of the first to be impressed with the possibilities of the Cariboo goldfields.

The new route will be of tremendous historic interest as well as one of extraordinary scenic grandeur, for following the route north along the old Cariboo road, it will be possible to reach the old gold country that brought fame sixty years ago, and many of the settlements along the route are much the same to-day as they were in their heyday.

A Test Hook-Up

EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.

Often you have to test a fixed or variable condenser, an audio frequency transformer the coils of a variocoupler or variometer or numerous other radio devices. In the circuit shown above is a simple test circuit consisting of an ordinary dry cell and a headset. One terminal of the dry cell is connected to one terminal of the headset. The other terminal of the dry cell is connected to a long piece of flexible wire, as is also the remaining headset terminal. When these two wires are touched together (their ends being bare, of course) a click will be heard in the headset. If you desire to test the windings of an audio frequency transformer or condenser simply touch one wire from the test set to one terminal of the primary of the audio frequency transformer and the other wire from the test set to the other terminal of the primary of the transformer. A click will be heard in the headset. This click, probably, will not be as loud as the one obtained when the two test wires themselves are touched as the resistance of the primary of the transformer will cut down the strength of the current. The secondary of the transformer can be tested in like manner. The click will be much less pronounced however, as the secondary has a much higher resistance than the primary. If no click is heard in either case the windings are open. It is also a good idea to test for a "ground" by touching one terminal to one end of the primary and the other terminal to the iron core of the transformer. If a click is heard the wire of the primary coil is touching the iron core at some place. In a like manner the secondary coil should be tested for a ground.

When testing condensers, if a very loud click is heard when the test wires are touched to the two condenser terminals the condenser plates are short circuited. In testing a variable condenser the two test wires are attached to the terminals of the variable condenser and the rotary plates of the condenser are slowly turned. If at any time during the process a loud click is heard the plates of the rotary part of the condenser are bent out of shape and are touching the stationary plates at some point. By holding the condenser up to the light and looking "through" it in such a manner that the position of the rotary plates in respect to the stationary ones can be seen, it is possible sometimes to see where the plates are touching. A thin knife blade can be inserted between the rotary and stationary plates and the rotary plates can be bent back so they do not touch.

With this test hook-up it is also possible to test by-pass condensers, variometers, tuning coils, other head-sets and a variety of other radio appliances.

Besco Does Not Desire Settlement of Strike
DECLARES LABOR MINISTER.

(Sydney Post, July 4.)

The following letter from Hon. Jas. Murdoch, Minister of Labor, to International President John L. Lewis, of the United Mine Workers of America, was made public last night at District 26 headquarters at Glace Bay: "En route to Ottawa, June 29, 1925.

Mr. John L. Lewis.

"Dear Sir.—I am now enroute from Sydney, N.S., to Ottawa, having held conferences with the officers of your District No. 26, and with the Vice-President of the British Empire Steel Corporation, Ltd., in connection with the strike of miners in District No. 26 that has been in effect since March 6, last.

"On the evening of June 18 when I left Mr. J. W. McLeod and his associates, I was given to understand that they intended to consult you on the Company's proposals for the settlement of the strike, and that the matters involved would be by a referendum vote referred to the miners in the District.

"I am sending you herewith a copy of Mr. McLarg's letter of June 17th, offering terms of settlement, also a copy of my letter of the 18th addressed to the President of District No. 26.

"I learned during my visit to Sydney that the Company was not desirous of making any settlement with the officers of District No. 26; and the Company's officers would, I think, rather let the situation go on indefinitely as it is, with about 1,000 troops scattered throughout the territory, in the belief that finally the organization would be dissolved, and the workmen ready to work at the Company's terms.

"As you have my noted by Press reports of some weeks ago it was not the intention of the Company to offer settlement with your organization, and the proposal of the Vice-President in his letter of June 17th addressed to me is practically the only concession that the Company now makes.

"At the request of Mr. MacLeod and the District Board I endeavor to secure from the Vice-President of the Company a modification or withdrawal of his proposals, Nos. 5 and 9. Mr. McLarg remained insistent that No. 5 must stand, but intimated that if it would help the District Board to accept his proposals, No. 9 might be withdrawn.

"I am firmly convinced that better terms of settlement cannot be secured, and believe that the men will be in a better position for future concerted organized effort if they accept the Company's terms of settlement now instead of permitting the matter to go further to defeat and loss of organization.

"I am hoping that you will be able to advise your District Board under the circumstances to accept the terms of settlement offered; and I shall, if necessary, return to Sydney for the purpose of meeting further the District Board and the officers of the Company when the vote of the miners has been secured.

"I will be in the office at Ottawa for the next few days in the event that you should require additional information.

Treasure Hunt
DIVERS LOCATE WRECK OF SUNK-STEAMER—NOW SEARCH FOR BULLION.

NEW YORK, June 30.—The two trawlers Foam and Spray, which slipped out of New York Harbor three weeks ago on a \$4,000,000 treasure hunt, backed by a group of wealthy sportsmen, have accomplished the first part of their mission. It was announced to-day. A diver sent down from one of them has located the treasure ship Merida. The next step will be to cut through the iron walls of the storeroom and bring up nearly thirty tons of gold and silver bullion.

Fourteen years ago the Ward liner Merida sailed from Mexico for New York. On board was \$4,000,000 worth of treasure which had been smuggled out of Mexico by the adherents of Madero and Diaz. When the ship was off Cape Charles, Virginia, it was rammed and sunk by the Admiral Farragut. It rests on the bottom at a depth of thirty-five fathoms. Since then it has been the goal of treasure hunters.

German Castings for British Warships

Representatives of the Admiralty, say they have no knowledge of nor do they believe that German steel castings are being used in the construction of a British warship now being built on the Mersey. Mr. Conolly, the Labour M.P. for Newcastle, E., however, asserts that he has been told that £20,000 worth of German material is being incorporated in the vessel, and he avers he will raise the question again in the House of Commons, in spite of the fact that a denial has also come from Mr. R. They merely followed Government when dealing with Britain in connection with the war debt. Cash down, or a satisfactory endorsed note, was demanded in respect to the war debt. Cash on the nail had to be paid to the United States treasury before the presentation flag was admitted.

Those flags were admitted gladly and received a warm welcome at the City of York at the hands of the Duke of York and many prominent people and a press of citizens. This year the advertising men meet at Houston, and Britishers thought to return the courtesy, of their United States fellows by presenting a British flag to the City of Houston. An explanation to the customs officials was met with a demand for twelve dollars. United States advertising men and a deputation from Houston in New York to meet their overseas guests protested against the discourtesy, but the customs would have its twelve dollars, or the flag would not hang on the walls of Houston town hall.

Sir Richard Temple, the celebrated Indian administrator, was, by a long way the ugliest man in the British House of Commons, says Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen in his interesting book of reminiscences.

"It was a matter on which no division of opinion was at all possible, and was probably the one thing about which both sides of the House were in complete agreement; but in spite of this undeniable fact about his physical attributes, he thought himself a perfect Apollo.

"I don't know why they call my wife and myself the beauty and the beast," he once complained; "she is not so bad looking after all."

Canadian Prayers in English Book

ANGELIC LADY MOVE TO HAVE SOME FORMS INCLUDED.

LONDON, June 22.—(C.P.)—The House of Laity of the Church of Eng-

land, comprising the lay branches of the Church Assembly which, subject to the final approval of Parliament, legislates for the Anglican Church, recommends that the proposed new prayer book of the Anglican Church include forms of prayer to be used in families as appearing in the Canadian revised prayer book. It also recommends that the family prayers be both patriarchal and apostolic.

On the motion of Sir Edward Clarke the House disapproved of any passages of Apocryphal books being used as liturgical epistles. By a vote of 80 to 40 the House registered the undeniability of the Thursday after Trinity Sunday being used for the commemoration of the Holy Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ. Lord Hugh Cecil, the mover of the motion, said that to adopt the House

of Clergy's proposal to appoint Corpus Christi would vex Evangelists very much by creating the false impression that it carried with it belief in transubstantiation. Another speaker said that the day had been observed by 3,000 Anglican churches for over a century.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(C.P.)—The suggestion that a women's division be formed in conjunction with the Empire Service League was made by the Hon. Field Marshal the Earl Haig, when he spoke to the Ottawa Women's Canadian Club at luncheon in the Chateau Laurier. The Earl and Countess Haig spoke briefly to an audience of 200, one of the largest gatherings of club members held in some years.

"While England owes a deep debt of gratitude to the boys who fought for her, it is to the mothers of the Empire that she owes the greatest debt. It is to them that the greatest tribute should be paid." These were the words of Earl Haig, who gave the highest praise to the splendid spirit of the Canadian Corps.

The desire to form one organization for the best purposes of all parts of the Empire, was evident in Canada and the need of such organizations as the Canadian Club was very great.

"My heart is so full, just from the recognition you have given my husband and myself," Lady Haig said.

"Now I turn to the work done by the women during the war," Lady Haig continued. "I feel sure it is such as was done in England. But why did they do it? Just for the men who fought for us. What a pleasure it is to feel that we can do a little in that direction. The Women's Canadian Club represents, I know have worked very hard and are still continuing to do so."

History Repeated

London Times: This is not the first time in our history, as Lord Emmott recently reminded the House of Commons, that the immediate outlook has been anxious, gloomy and menacing. A century ago, after the Napoleonic wars, it was infinitely worse. What he rightly called the enormous improvement in the position of working classes which has taken place since that period there is, as he said, a good deal of consolation to be found. His prayer is that the country may not be ruined by the experiment.

The job is about as interesting as must be that of the coral insects who climb upon a pile of other coral insects and die and fossilize there, until at last an island can thrust itself above the ocean.

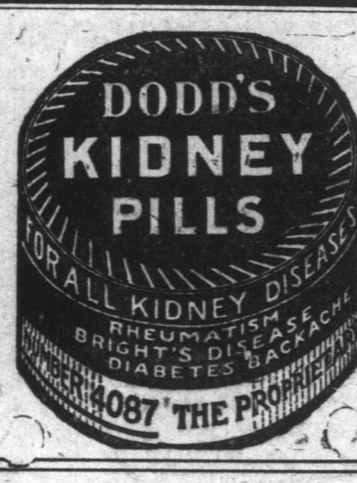
Yet foundation building has been going on since the beginning of civilization and still continues.

That will mean the end of disease, the prolonging of life, the promotion of happiness and the dissemination of beauty.

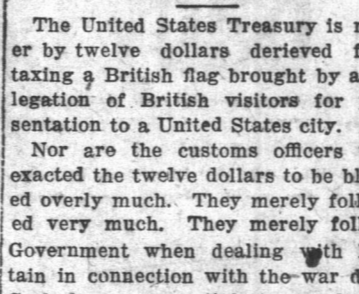

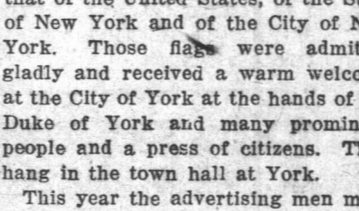

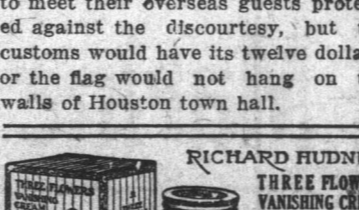
